A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Last week I had mentioned how the Mass here on earth incorporates us into the worship of God in heaven and that it is not some stretch of the imagination that prompts us to say that on the altar earth *does* unite with heaven to sing the song of a creation made new by the Pascal Mystery (the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.)

For those who follow Bishop Barron on *Word On Fire*, you already know that he is preaching each Sunday on the Book of Revelation, since readings from this book figure prominently in the liturgical prayer and worship of the Church during the Easter Season. Again, as I mentioned last week, the Book of Revelation gives us a glimpse of what is taking place in heaven while we press forward here on earth making our pilgrimage in this valley of tears, and not just a glimpse, but a clearer insight into what we do each Sunday in the celebration and the offering of the Eucharistic Sacrifice, which draws us up into heavenly realities. *Listen carefully to the preface of the Mass which always concludes with some reference to our voices being joined to the voices of the angles and the saints.*

Anyhow, in his sermon last week, or maybe it was the week before, Bishop Barron made a passing reference to the kind of music that is sung at Mass...he was very much thinking of the most recent document that the U.S. bishops had published in the fall of 2020 that spelled out the criteria of what constitutes a "liturgical" hymn and therefore suitable for Mass. Now before I proceed, I do want to say that there is a lot of really good religious music out there, but religious music is not the same as music that is suited and appropriate for the Mass. So, in his remarks, Bishop Barron did mention one song in particular that he found especially problematic, and that song was Gather Us In. It is not just that the tune itself reminds one of a theme song from a popular 1970's sitcom, but the words themselves are deeply flawed and contradict precisely what the Mass is in its essence. There are so many other songs like Gather Us In that have been sung for so many decades that little by little have shaped and formed our (mis)understanding of the Mass and the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. Music really does have this power. And so, we should not be surprised that barely 25% of Roman Catholics regularly attend Mass and of those many do not even believe that they are truly receiving Jesus Christ in Holv Communion.

treats up at the Sycamore Tree, apart from the silence and the solitude, is the opportunity to listen to the hymn of praise offered to God by the creation and the creatures that He has made and then pronounced good. There are not a few folks who have no taste for religion but find some kind of connection with God in the cathedral of the wilderness where they can pray and worship God in their own way. I am not suggesting that this is right, but I do understand it, and maybe these folks are a little closer to the truth of things than we would like to admit.

In nature, apart from the hectic and noisy world of men, everything is exactly as it ought to be, as God created it to be. In nature we see the wisdom of God in all of His works and His beauty in everything that He has made. The sound the wind makes in the pines, the chattering of squirrels and the voices of so many varieties of birds. And everything is busy, so very busy, doing exactly what God created everything to do, because God is busy continually creating and recreating and guiding everything that He has made. And in all of this God is glorified and receives praise from His creation. But here is the one little caveat; creation does not know God. Only a creature with the use of reason, the human person—we are not talking about angels at this point—can know God and freely choose to render Him praise and offer Him the worship that is His due.

In the person of Jesus Christ, God has revealed Himself to us and at the same time has revealed us to ourselves. Unlike the non-rational creatures that God has made, we must freely choose to be who we were created to be and bring our human nature into conformity with revealed truth. God does not have to reveal to non-rational creatures how to be because they simply are

and act precisely as they ought each according to their proper nature. This is at the heart of Christ's redemption, to restore us to our original dignity and orient our lives back toward God so that freely choosing to live and to be fully alive God may be glorified in the manner of our lives and in our worship.

In our worship of the Mass, we see how Christ reorders and reorients in His own person all things back toward God who is both the source and the final end of all creation, and it is into this great mystery that we are caught up and come to experience the joy of being saved. Our hymns then, not unlike the hymn of creation, must correspond to the mystery of our recreation when we celebrate and offer the Mass, ordering our minds and our hearts to the God who made us.
