A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

I believe in One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church.

These have been words that I have been reflecting on a bit during my travels this week, attending Bishop Flemming's ordination in Great Falls and then the ordination of two priests for our diocese here in Helena.

Our Church is apostolic in that the fullness of the governing spirit is passed on from bishop to bishop by the laying on of hands and to them has been entrusted the deposit of the faith. They are the true successors of the Apostles, and every bishop has a lineage that goes back to one of the Twelve. The ordination of a bishop is a wonderful thing and it is a great privilege to be a witness of the Church's tradition as it moves forward through time and history as God's plan for the salvation of souls unfolds before our very eyes.

I am not wanting to deny that we have our fair share of difficulties in the Church, the Lord Himself knows our trials well, and certainly things in our nation and in the world are going off the rails, but nonetheless, in spite of all of this, the Lord is faithful to His promise to be with us always, and ordinations of bishops and priests are a sign of that promise.

When we come to Mass we step oh so briefly out of the cares and preoccupations of this world in order to step into heaven and taste something of the sweetness of the promises that Jesus Christ has made and receive in our Holy Communion a foretaste of that perfect union with the Lord that the Saints in heaven already now enjoy. And to attend the ordination of bishop is an added joy. It is an added joy because despite everything that causes us grief, inside and outside of the Church, we can see God continuing to carry out His designs in a way that is hidden from the world (for lack of faith) but is perceptible to us because we believe.

Having faith does not mean that we do not become anxious and concerned, we are human beings, we have an immortal soul that for a brief span of years animates our corruptible bodies and we live in a constantly changing world. And people generally speaking do not welcome or embrace change very easily. But, having faith ought to mean that we are not afraid. Peace is the gift of the risen Christ to us, and it should not be lost on us that just as the risen Christ appeared to the Apostles after His resurrection, so at Mass, after the sacrifice has been effected and right before we receive Holy Communion, the priest greets the faithful with the peace of Christ and that peace is shared between the faithful. Jesus is Lord. He always will be. No Fear.
