A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Just a couple of housekeeping notes this week as we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King and prepare for the season of Advent. I don't mind the use of the of the term "holiday season" because in all reality that is what it is, a season of holy days, but at the same time it must be remembered that Advent is a season in its own right and is a time to seriously focus a bit on the spiritual renewal of our mind and heart.

To that end there will be some materials available to you at the entrances of the churches. There are two Advent guides, one from Magnificat and the other from Word Among Us, and there is a book by Matthew Kelly on the Holy Eucharist. As always, confessions are heard on the days when Mass is celebrated, and if you are able, please consider attending a daily Mass each week during Advent. When Christmas day arrives, please do not be one who looks back with regret realizing that you have not done anything to take a step closer to Christ.

On the ACA front (Annual Catholic Appeal) it seems that we got off to a wobbly start and then tipped over. These past couple of years we were able to simply get the campaign done and move on, yet here we are a month into this year's campaign and we are pretty far behind. I have not done an analysis of the situation but I will look more deeply into it after Thanksgiving. If you have not yet made your contribution to the ACA this year, please take some time this week to make your offering. On a personal note, when the ACA is not fully funded and does not reach its goal, then all of the programs funded by the ACA get cut across the board and that includes the Guatemala Mission. I am the director of the Mission and there is just no way to adequately communicate to the folks in Guatemala why we have to draw back our financial support. *Just a wee bit of Catholic guilt there.* But as I have said, the ACA is not a fundraiser for the bishop, it is an annual collection that funds some of his ministry as the Bishop of Helena.

Outdoor nativity scene placement at Sacred Heart will take place on Saturday, December 2nd at 1:00 pm followed by a soup social. All are welcome!

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Starting on the First Sunday of Advent we will be fulfilling Bishop Vetter's request to begin Mass with a brief common prayer followed by two minutes of silent meditation. The prayer is a prayer composed by St. Anselm and it will be recited by all immediately after the announcements followed by the silence. The motive of the time of prayer and silence is to assist people to prepare and enter more intentionally into the celebration of the Mass; to open ourselves to its mystery and its fruits in our daily lives. This prayer is to accompany the Campaign for Catholic Life which has already begun in the diocese and will arrive in our parish next May. The Campaign for Catholic Life is a campaign aimed at outreach and evangelization, support for retired clergy, and the formation of seminarians. Much more on this later. Prayer cards will be available in the pews.

And finally, please make a note in your calendars that Sacred Heart in Ronan will be hosting a Lenten parish mission this year, the 25th (a Sunday) through the 27th. The presenter of the mission is a good friend of mine, Fr. Bryce Lungren of the Diocese of Cheyenne, and the author of the book *The Catholic Cowboy Way*. Fr. Bryce will be speaking on some of the contents of his book and books will be made available for purchase in advance of the mission. I am really looking forward to this.

That is about all for now. I hope you had a great Thanksgiving and during this next week please do think of that one thing that you can do this Advent to take a step closer to Christ.

Solemnity of Christ the King: Background About Christ the King

On the last Sunday of each liturgical year, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, or Christ the King.

Pope Pius XI instituted this feast in 1925 with his encyclical Quas primas ("In the first") to respond to growing secularism and atheism. He recognized that attempting to "thrust Jesus Christ and his holy law" out of public life would result in continuing discord among people and nations. This solemnity reminds us that while governments come and go, Christ reigns as King forever.

During the early twentieth century, in Mexico, Russia, and some parts of Europe, militantly secularistic regimes threatened not just the Catholic Church and its faithful but civilization itself. Pope Pius XI's encyclical gave Catholics hope and—while governments around them crumbled—the assurance that Christ the King shall reign forever. Jesus Christ "is very truth, and it is from him that truth must be obediently received by all mankind" (Quas primas, 7).

Christ's kingship is rooted in the Church's teaching on the Incarnation. Jesus is fully God and fully man. He is both the divine Lord and the man who suffered and died on the Cross. One person of the Trinity unites himself to human nature and reigns over all creation as the Incarnate Son of God. "From this it follows not only that Christ is to be adored by angels and men, but that to him as man angels and men are subject, and must recognize his empire; by reason of the hypostatic union Christ has power over all creatures" (Quas primas, 13).

The Church calls us to acknowledge Christ's kingship with our whole lives:

He must reign in our minds, which should assent with perfect submission and firm belief to revealed truths and to the doctrines of Christ. He must reign in our wills, which should obey the laws and precepts of God. He must reign in our hearts, which should spurn natural desires and love God above all things, and cleave to him alone. He must reign in our bodies and in our members, which should serve as instruments for the interior sanctification of our souls, or to use the words of the Apostle Paul, 'as instruments of justice unto God.' -Quas primas, 33

Today, religious freedom for many people means that we can believe whatever we want in private, but when we enter the public square or the marketplace, we may not speak of anything that relates to our faith. However, the Church acknowledges the reign of Christ, not only privately, but publicly. This solemnity encourages us the celebrate and live out our faith in public. "Thus by sermons preached at meetings and in churches, by public adoration of the Blessed Sacrament exposed and by solemn processions, men unite in paying homage to Christ, whom God has given them for their King" (Quas primas, 26).

For Christians, when our faith is repeatedly marginalized in public life, we can fall into the habit of compartmentalizing our lives. We love Jesus in our private lives, but we shrink from acknowledging the kingship of Christ in social life. When we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, we declare to the world and remind ourselves that Jesus is the Lord of the Church and of the entire universe.

Catechism of the Catholic Church:

Until everything is subject to him, "until there be realized new heavens and a new earth in which justice dwells, the pilgrim Church, in her sacraments and institutions, which belong to this present age, carries the mark of this world which will pass, and she herself takes her place among the creatures which groan and travail yet and await the revelation of the sons of God." That is why Christians pray, above all in the Eucharist, to hasten Christ's return by saying to him: Maranatha! "Our Lord, come!" (CCC 671)
