A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Last week I had mentioned that we would spend the next two weeks of Advent looking at the Church's intention with regards to our full, active, and conscious participation in the Mass...something that is easier said than done, and as I had mentioned in one of my homilies a few weeks back, we have a long way to go. I believe I had said that this "initiative" was actually begun by Pope Pius X at the beginning of the 20th century, and here we are over a hundred years later still wrestling with the issue and what it means.

Participation is considered under two aspects, exterior and interior, and this week we will look at the exterior dimension, without laboring under any illusion that everything that can be said will be said especially in the limited space afforded by a column in a Sunday bulletin.

To begin with we need to start with one of the most fundamental and basic realities of the Mass and that is that the Mass is wholly the action of Christ. One of the problems during the time of Pope Pius X was that the Mass was generally thought of as something that the priest did up at the altar while the laity were largely involved in some kind of devotional activity, i.e., praying the rosary, and bells were used during the Mass to signal to the people when certain things were taking place on the altar, such as the Consecration when the Host would be elevated and shown to the people. I am really generalizing here and trying to keep things brief given the limited space for these remarks, but I think if you are old enough you know what I mean. Pope Pius X was troubled by this and saw that the laity were acting as though they were mere spectators.

This brings us closer to the heart of the issue. People are not spectators. If the Mass is the action of Christ, and it is, then it is the action of His whole body which includes the baptized, and not just of the Head represented by the priest standing in the Person of Christ (*in persona Christi*). What came of the initiative of Pope Pius X in further developments was what came to be known as the "dialogue" Mass in which the people were asked to join in all the parts of the Mass that were sung, such as the Gloria and the Sanctus, as well as respond with the servers by saying "and with your spirit" when the priest said "the Lord be with you."

Unfortunately, and this I experienced when previous bishops had asked me to offer the Traditional Latin Mass, is that many folks held the so-called "dialogue" Mass in disdain thinking that it diminished the transcendent and vertical dimension of the Mass and made it far too horizontal by bringing something so holy down to earth that even lay people would participate in it. This is, as you already know, simply absurd. But nonetheless most folks simply preferred to remain mute and as a priest of 26 years I have seen this carry over into the revised Order of Mass which is what we celebrate today.

To be honest, the Second Vatican Council placed great emphasis on the participation of the laity in the Mass not (Continued on page 2)

wanting to see anyone simply be a mute spectator. In fact, this participation on the part of the laity was and is still considered to be the highest value to be sought in the Liturgy and liturgical reform. Why? Because as baptized souls the laity have a right to such a participation precisely because they are members of the Body of Christ offering with and through the priest (standing in the Person of Christ) His Eucharistic Sacrifice and themselves together with it. The action of the Mass is the action of Christ, the *whole* Christ, Head and Members of the Body.

These are just some basic principles and yes, they are generalized and brief, but I think we can begin to see where this is all heading. If the Mass is the action of the whole Christ, then the Body has to do what the Head is doing and do it in a unified way, that is together and not as individuals with all of our own personal preferences and devotional inclinations. This is accomplished by opening the Roman Missal and faithfully doing what the Church says is supposed to be done and using the texts of the Mass that are assigned to each celebration during the week on special Memorials and Feasts, and also on Sundays and other Holy Days of Obligation.

I will acknowledge that with the liturgical reforms that came out of the Second Vatican Council there also came great abuse and excess and frightful liberties taken with the celebration of the Mass. But it needs to be stated clearly that correlation is not the same as causation, in other words, Vatican Two is not the problem, but poor theology and formation are and will always be a problem. But let's also make this point equally clear, when a priest or bishop changes or alters anything with the Mass, its texts, rubrics, and gestures, they impede the possibility of the laity participating in the Mass as intended by the Church precisely by withholding or making changes to parts of the Mass that they have no authority to change. The night before He died Christ instituted the Sacrifice of His Body

and Blood and then He entrusted the Mass to the Apostles with the command to "do this" in His memory. The Holy See is the only authority that can reform or modify the form of the Mass without doing violence to its essence.

Having said all of that and with what space there remains let's just say this about external participation. First and foremost, the text of the Mass is what is used for each Mass and those parts that are sung are to be sung by the laity, and where responses are expected responses are to be made. Do you know that even to this day there are many folks who do not even say "Amen" when they are shown the Body of Christ right before receiving Holy Communion? Gestures too are important, when to sit, kneel, and stand, and even in the manner of receiving Holy Communion (the norm in the U.S. being to receive standing, but due to tradition one cannot be refused Holy Communion if they choose to kneel). The point of the "externals" is not a mere matter of regulating what people do but rather to show forth our unity as a Body united to its Divine Head in an act of worship. That's why these things are important.

Next week we will continue and touch on the interior aspect of our participation in the Mass. I hope your Advent is going well and always remember that it is never too late to make that one resolution that will bring you one step closer to Christ during this Holiday Season.




