A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

As you could very well imagine I field an awful lot of questions about what to do for Lent. When it comes to Lent many people are simply at a loss which can be another question for another day, but let's approach the question from this angle as at least a place to begin, an examination of the precepts of the Church. The precepts are the positive laws of the Church that constitute at least the very bare minimum that one would need to do to consider themselves to be a card carrying Roman Catholic. Below are the precepts as they are found in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Take some time and thoughtfully and prayerfully review the precepts and then form specific resolutions asking God for the grace to make good on those resolutions. As I said, it is a place to start and next week we will look at some thoughts regarding confession and how to make a good confession.

The Precepts of the Church

2041 The precepts of the Church are set in the context of a moral life bound to and nourished by liturgical life. the obligatory character of these positive laws decreed by the pastoral authorities is meant to guarantee to the faithful the indispensable minimum in the spirit of prayer and moral effort, in the growth in love of God and neighbor:

2042 The first precept ("You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation.") requires the faithful to participate in the Eucharistic celebration when the Christian community gathers together on the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord. The second precept ("You shall confess your sins at least once a year.") ensures preparation for the Eucharist by the reception of the sacrament of reconciliation, which continues Baptism's work of conversion and forgiveness. The third precept ("You shall humbly receive your Creator in Holy Communion at least during the Easter season.") guarantees as a minimum the reception of the Lord's Body and Blood in connection with the Paschal feasts, the origin and center of the Christian liturgy.

The fifth precept ("You shall observe the prescribed days of fasting and abstinence.") ensures the times of ascesis and penance which prepare us for the liturgical feasts; they help us acquire mastery over our instincts and freedom of heart. The faithful also have the duty of providing for the material needs of the Church, each according to his abilities.

Catechism of the Catholic Church:

The evangelists indicate the salvific meaning of this mysterious event: Jesus is the new Adam who remained faithful just where the first Adam had given in to temptation. Jesus fulfils Israel's vocation perfectly: in contrast to those who had once provoked God during forty years in the desert, Christ reveals himself as God's Servant, totally obedient to the divine will. In this, Jesus is the devil's conqueror: he "binds the strong man" to take back his plunder. Jesus' victory over the tempter in the desert anticipates victory at the Passion, the supreme act of obedience of his filial love for the Father. (CCC 539)


What does salt symbolize in the Sacrament of Baptism?
