A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Today humanity, in all the radiance of her immaculate nobility, receives its ancient beauty. The shame of sin had darkened the splendor and attraction of human nature; but when the Mother of the Fair One par excellence is born, this nature regains in her person its ancient privileges and is fashioned according to a perfect model truly worthy of God.... The reform of our nature begins today and the aged world, subjected to a wholly divine transformation, receives the first fruits of the second creation. Andrew of Crete, Sermon 1 On the Birth of Mary {A.D. 733}.

Sometimes it is said that the Church "created" a new dogma in 1854 when Pope Pius IX solemnly declared the truth of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Is this what happened? Did the Church "create" a new dogma? Clearly not, and this is not how the Magisterium of the Church functions.

When Christ gave His teaching authority to the Church He left with Her all of the treasures of His sacred doctrine to be carefully preserved until He returned in glory. The deposit of the faith is like a bag of goodies that Christ gave to His Church, or we can simply think of it in terms that our Lord once used, a "storeroom" out of which one obtains supplies: every teacher of the law who has been instructed about the kingdom of heaven is like the owner of a house who brings forth from his storeroom new treasures as well as old. (Mt 13:52).

The teacher is the Church, and after having rummaged around the storeroom among the things that are "old," She brings forth and presents, or rather presents "anew" something that has always been there. And that is the key, it has to have always been "there."

As Pope Pius IX was working on the issue of the Immaculate Conception, he began the task by sending scholars and theologians into the "storeroom" of the treasures of the Church to do some rummaging around, and suffice it to say that with very little effort they were able to produce and bring forth evidence that the Church has always believed in the utter uniqueness of the Blessed Virgin Mary precisely so that she might become the fitting Mother of God. How could it not be otherwise?

I began with a quote from Andrew of Crete from the year 733, which might not sound all that old, but I choose it because it is personally one of my favorites, but I want to you to note the dates on the following quotes from the Fathers of the Church so

that you may tell me whether or not the dogma of the Immaculate Conception was "made up" in 1859 or not. Enjoy!

He was the ark formed of incorruptible wood. For by this is signified that His tabernacle was exempt from putridity and corruption. Hippolytus, Orations Inillud, Dominus pascit me {A.D. 235}.

Thou alone and thy Mother are in all things fair, there is no flaw in thee and no stain in thy Mother. Ephraem, Nisibene Hymns 27:8 (A.D. 370).

O noble Virgin, truly you are greater than any other greatness. For who is your equal in greatness, O dwelling place of God the Word? To whom among all creatures shall I compare you, O Virgin? You are greater than them all O Covenant, clothed with purity instead of gold! You are the Ark in which is found the golden vessel containing the true manna, that is, the flesh in which divinity resides. Athanasius, Homily of the Papyrus of Turin 71:216 {ante AD 373}.

Mary, a Virgin not only undefiled but a Virgin whom grace has made inviolate, free of every stain of sin. Ambrose, Sermon 22, 30 {A.D. 388}.

A virgin, innocent, spotless, free of all defect, untouched, unsullied, holy in soul and body, like a lily sprouting among thorns. Theodotus of Ancrya, Homily 6, 11{A.D. 446}.

The very fact that God has elected her proves that none was ever holier than Mary, if any stain had disfigured her soul, if any other virgin had been purer and holier, God would have selected her and rejected Mary. Jacob of Sarug {ante A.D. 521}.





"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. By faith we understand that the universe was created by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things that are visible." -Hebrews 11:1,3

How do we teach someone such faith?

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd provides a place of discovery and wonder where the child and the adult explore the rich depths of the scriptures and the signs of the liturgy.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd was designed for children to discover their relationship with God. It does this by taking a tangible thing that can be seen (like a mustard seed), an aspect of God that cannot be seen (such as The Kingdom of God), and through wondering, encourages the child to discover how those two things are connected. Put another way, "Signs and parables...are composed of two elements, which we could call a departure point (for example, the mustard seed) and the point of arrival (in this case, the kingdom of God); what the 'reader' of the parable must do is to establish the relation between these two poles" (The Religious Potential of the Child, pg. 129-130).

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd works through the catechist, through the material, and through the environment.

The *catechist* proclaims the essential parts of Christ's life in the scripture and in the liturgy in as few words as possible. The source the catechist uses is the whole parable, the whole text, which allows the child to respond to the whole of that part of the scripture or sign. In order to do this well, the catechist "will find himself in a position of extreme poverty" never being able to have the sense of knowing everything about the sign (The Religious Potential of the Child, pg. 132). That poverty allows the catechist to become a fellow listener with the child as they explore together the inexhaustible realities of the sign or parable.

Next, the *materials* appeal to the child's senses and connect him to a concrete person (Jesus Christ). The material itself shows the catechists' love for God through the way they craft the truths of the sign or parable into the physical object. Then these physical materials become the point of entry for the child and catechist to engage the unseen truths.

Lastly, the *environment* provides a place for life, not instruction, and the crafted environment provides a place for creative work.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd provides an exhaustible environment for the child and adult to connect to God. And Catechesis of the Good Shepherd has a place for you. We invite you to:

- 1. Come for yourself
 - a. If you do not know what some of the signs and gestures mean in the Mass, or if you are ready to explore the inexhaustible riches of the Parable of the Good Shepherd, the Parable of the Mustard Seed, and many other parables, then this training is for you.
- 2. Come for your family and your neighbor's family
 - a. We need future catechists to help form our children. This training will provide necessary formation for you to be able to do that.
- 3. Come craft the love of God into our materials so our children can see that He is good.
