

### A Fountain of Life

he lovelorn column in the local newspaper
shared a letter from someone who felt adrift.
She had everything she needed or wanted
—a marriage, a job, a home. Yet she felt there had to be

more to life, but she didn't know what it was or where to go. She wondered, Could anyone help me?

Like the woman from Samaria who happened upon Jesus when she came looking for water at the local well, she and the letter writer were both eager

for "living water." The woman at the well would then no longer need to come each day for her household needs, and the letter writer would have her deeper thirsts quenched. Both wanted something more out of life, not unlike most people at one time or another.

Long before Jesus encountered the woman at the well, the people who were led by Moses through the desert grumbled to him about their thirst, which triggered Moses to grumble to God about the people. The result

was finding water in the desert, the most unlikely of places. As a result, they realized that God was taking care of them, that God was ultimately their source of life.

We may decide what will bring new life—a new relationship, a new job,

a new home. Yet just as often the answer comes from totally unexpected sources: the deserts of our lives. Also just as often, we somehow miss the answer. When we do recognize it, however, we say, "Thanks be to God."





#### Fr. Mike's Musings

#### **Baptism: Part 2**

In the post-Resurrection era of the Church when people had first heard the Gospel proclaimed and professed their faith in Jesus they would immediately be baptized. But when the persecutions from the Roman authorities and the elders of the Jerusalem Temple began in earnest, the Church required that a set period of instruction in the faith be given before the sacrament was



administered. The reason being that if done were to recant their faith in the face of torture and death it would reflect an initial lack of true faith in Christ and would have made a mockery of the sacrament---"faithful when convenient". As most early baptisms were adults the season of Easter became the time of choice for the newly instructed catechumens to fully enter the faith through Baptism, Confirmation, and the reception of the Eucharist. This same model exists today in the RCIA program which culminates in the full initiation of catechumens in \to the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil.

As Christianity expanded, infant baptism became more common. This would not have seemed strange as the practice of baptizing entire families was the norm throughout the early years of the Church. Infant baptism is rooted in the Gospel example of Jesus welcoming the children into His presence. It is a sign that we are all "children" of God by virtue of baptism, whether actual children or more along in years. This "new" practice can also be traced to the Jewish practice of initiating young boys into their faith through circumcision eight days after their birth. For Jewish converts the baptism of infants would have been familiar and acceptable, over time this would be the norm for most Christians until the start of the Protestant Reformation. Parents who bring their children to be baptized must be fully aware of the responsibilities that are expected of them, chief of which is a serious intention of raising the children in the beliefs and practices of the Catholic faith. In the baptismal rite parent make a solemn promise before God and the witnesses in their parish community that they will carry-out this responsibility. Parents pray for and with their children, be the primary teachers of the faith by word and example and guide them along the way in their faith lives to the other sacraments of the Church. If the parents become lax in this carrying through on the promises or simply fail to raise their families in the Catholic faith, they, like their ancient forebearers in the Church (see above) make a mockery of the sacraments of the Church and actively deny their children the promises and graces of God acquired in baptism. To give moral and actual support to parents in this great undertaking the presence of godparents/sponsors is vital. They not only represent the faith community outside of the primary family, but also teach their godchildren by their own example of the faith in word and in practice. And should an unforeseen event befall the parents, the godparents take on the responsibility of raising the children in the faith until the age of majority is reached (16-18 years old).

Regardless of the age a person is at the time of their baptism there are certain essentials that must be present for the sacrament to be effective and valid. Water and sincere devotion to the faith are the root elements of the baptismal rite, with these are other features which hearken to the ancient lineage of the Church as well as securing a firm joining of the divine and the earthly aspects of the "newborn" Christian.

Blessed oil (Oil of the Catechumen) and Chrism signify the comfort and strength to be found through the Holy Spirit. The baptismal candle is a sign of the "light of Christ" that resides in our hearts and guides us on the right path to God's Kingdom. The white garment that is worn for the baptism reflects the words of St. Paul in his letter to the Galatians: "For all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ." (3:27) White being the color of purity and joy for we are now cleansed of the stain of Original Sin. It is not by coincidence that these same elements of baptism are also present at our departure from this life in the Catholic funeral rite. Our faith lives on earth have come around completely and we are now entering into a journey into the eternal, armed with the protection and graces given to us at baptism.

Catholics believe that baptism frees us from slavery to sin, unites us to Christ' death and Resurrection, incorporates us into the life of the Church, and sets on the right path to eternal salvation. This is God's gift to His children and cannot be earned or bought, but baptism is a gift that invites a response. It is birth to a new life following and imitating Jesus Christ. It is not yet salvation complete, it is the beginning of a life-long journey to achieving that promise, only to be realized when we enter Christ's full presence in the Father's Heavenly Kingdom.

#### This Sunday's Gospel Reflection:

We help build the Kingdom. Jesus astounded the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well by asking her for a drink. She could hardly believe that he, a Jew, would take a drink from a Samaritan, or that he, a man, would request a drink politely from a woman. In the Bible, wells are places where courtships happen. Jesus makes friends with the Samaritan woman, not so she will be his wife, but so she will believe in him, the Messiah and Savior of the world. This woman not only believes but becomes a disciple to the people of her town. The Samaritans were outsiders to the Jews. The Assyrians defeated the 10 northern tribes of Israel and moved tribes from their part of the world into Samaria. Five tribes that worshiped other gods settled the cities of Samaria. These tribes intermarried with the Samaritans, so Jews regarded Samaritans as people who no longer worshiped Yahweh, the God of Israel. When Jesus tells the woman she has had five husbands, he is saying that her ancestors have worshiped five false gods. What convinced the woman Jesus is the Messiah is that Jesus is reaching out to Samaritans after seven centuries of them being outsiders. Jesus tells the woman that not only is there a well in the ground where she can get water—she also has a well inside her, a place where spirit gushes up instead of water. This Holy Spirit is also inside of us and makes us seek to know God. All who believe in Jesus share the gift of God's Spirit, now



As we Redemptorists like to say, "With God there is plentiful redemption." God's mercy is everlasting and overflowing in its abundance. As we continue in Lent, let's remember that Easter is the sign that God forgave even the great sin of the crucifixion of his only Son. Time and time again throughout the Scriptures, Jesus demonstrates this bountiful mercy. He forgave Zacchaeus, the tax collector. He forgave the woman caught in adultery. He was tender with the Samaritan woman we hear about in today's


