Coming of Age, Coming of Faith

t is said we never become a believer before age thirty-five. I don't think there is anything magical about that age. Some in their seventies still have not yet come to be people of faith, and there are those who, at a very young age, seem to have entrusted their lives to God. What the age of thirty-five does say, however, is that most people need to have lived a while and experienced a few ups and downs to recognize there is a power in their lives greater than themselves.


This week's Gospel story of the man born blind encapsulates a lifelong journey of coming to see who Jesus is, compressed into a few days. When asked who cured him of blindness, the man first says the man Jesus did it. Brought to testify before the Pharisees, he says that Jesus must be a prophet. Confronted by the

Pharisees a second time, he testifies that Jesus must be of God. Finally, when he sees Jesus again, he calls him Lord, a name for God. The story is a parable of sorts about how we come to have faith, to see with new and different eyes.

Faith involves trusting, sometimes trusting an unseen Power who feels absent at times; about surrendering control over our lives to God, as we come to see in an entirely new way. It can take a lifetime to begin seeing in such a way.





Fr. Mike's Musings

The Eucharist: Part I

If any of us happens to be a contestant on 'Jeopardy' and the clue, we are given is: "The Catholic belief that ordinary bread and wine are supernaturally changed into the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ." Hopefully we can all reply: "What is Transubstantiation" – the idea that during Mass, the bread and wine used for Communion become the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ – the Eucharistic belief that is central to the Catholic faith. Indeed, the Catholic Church teaches that the Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life.



A Pew Research Center survey finds that most self-described Catholics don't believe this core teaching. In fact, nearly seven-in-ten Catholics (69%) say they personally believe that during Catholic Mass, the bread and wine used in Communion "are symbols of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ." Just one-third of U.S. Catholics (31%) say they believe that "during Catholic Mass, the bread and wine actually become the Body and Blood of Jesus."

In addition to asking Catholics what they believe about the Eucharist, the new survey also included a question that tested whether Catholics know what the Church teaches on the subject. Most Catholics who believe that the bread and wine are symbolic do not know that the Church holds that Transubstantiation occurs. Approximately one-in-five Catholics (22%) reject the idea of Transubstantiation, even though they know about the Church's teaching. The vast majority of those who believe that the bread and wine actually become the Body and Blood of Christ – 28% of all Catholics – do know that this is what the Church teaches. A small share of Catholics (3%) professes to believe in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist despite not fully knowing the Church's teaching on Transubstantiation.

The Catholic doctrine of the Real Presence is the belief that Jesus Christ is literally, not symbolically, present in the Holy Eucharist—Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. Catholics believe in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist because Jesus tells us this is true in the Bible: "I am the bread of life. Your fathers ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died. This is the bread which comes down from Heaven, that a man may eat of it and not die. I am the living bread which came down from Heaven; if anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever; and the bread which I shall give for the life of the world is my flesh. The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' Jesus said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you; he who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day. For my flesh is food indeed, and my blood is drink indeed. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him" (John 6:48-56).

The doctrine of the Real Presence that Catholics believe today was believed by the earliest Christians. This miracle of God's physical presence to us at every Mass is the truest testament to Christ's love for us and His desire for each of us to have a personal relationship with Him. If Jesus were only speaking symbolically about eating His flesh and drinking His blood, as non-believers and skeptics say, then what He really meant was "whoever persecutes and assaults me will have eternal life" — which, of course, makes nonsense of the previous passage. Bread and wine are not normal or natural symbols of flesh and blood. To call a man a "fox" is an understandable symbol for cleverness. To call a man "bread" is not an understandable symbol, without some explanation. Either the symbols would have been clearly explained (which is not the case) or Jesus spoke literally (which is the case). Catholics believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, meaning that what appears to be bread and wine is really Jesus' Body and Blood—not just a symbolic representation.

When Catholics receive Holy Communion, it is an expression of the unity among all those in communion with the Catholic Church throughout the world, who maintain the belief in the Real Eucharistic Presence of Christ. Therefore, only those who believe in the Real Presence may participate in this sacrament of oneness with Christ and His Church. Catholics believe that we cannot celebrate this unifying sacrament with other Christians while there are still disagreements about the Eucharist itself. However, Catholics pray for the day when we can reconcile with other Christians and share in the unity of God's people through the Holy Eucharist.

This Sunday's Gospel Reflection:

Jesus invites the man born blind to see in two ways. First, Jesus heals his physical sight. Jesus opens the man's eyes to see birds, flowers, faces, and sunlight coming through trees. The man born blind also comes to see that Jesus must be from



God if he can open a blind man's eyes. This is a second way of seeing: seeing and believing in Jesus, who brings us God's love and healing. Jesus invites us to use our eyes for both kinds of seeing—first to see the wonders of creation and of people, and second, to see God's love and goodness in these wonders and in his healing actions. May you see and appreciate together as a family the wonders of God's creation and the wonder each person is, and explore what Jesus wants us to see and believe about who He is.

Questions of the Week:

What in the story of the man born blind's journey to faith in Jesus is like your own faith journey? If you were blind and could suddenly see, who or what would you be most excited to see?

Family Lenten Activity: Instruct the members of your family to close their eyes for part of the Mass. Encourage them to pay attention to things they can smell, taste, hear, and feel. After Mass, discuss what you observed when you couldn't see.



Dear Padre,

Why should I bother to be more religious? I'm a good person. Isn't that enough to get me into heaven?

When asked for advice about how people should decide on a vocation, St. Ignatius Loyola, the founder of the Jesuits, said they should do an imagination exercise. "Imagine that you are on your deathbed," he said. "From that point of view what would you wish you had done in your life?" That is still good advice.

Here's another exercise: Imagine you have a grandmother who is completely generous and caring toward you. Throughout

your childhood, she was always there for you. But as a teen you belittled her and, in effect, told her that all she had offered is worthless to you. In a saner moment, won't you feel terrible about how you treated her?

Our life with God is much the same. God has given us absolutely everything, from our existence to every breath we take. God has also given us a way to know him through his Son, Jesus (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 73). And one way we know Jesus is through the Church and the celebration of the sacraments (CCC 1085). To refuse these gifts, to say, "I am already a good person. I don't need these gifts from God" is a bit presumptuous, don't you think?


To be "religious" is not just an outward show of piety. It's the way we have been given to learn God's language: the language of forgiveness, of faith, hope, and love.
