


Not Just a Walk in the Park

multiple-choice question: Life is (a) purgatory, (b) a party, (c) drudgery, (d) a maze, (e) a trial. Many of us might be inclined to answer, "All of the above." Life takes us along many paths, through many fields, and down many blind alleys.

The Camino de Santiago is a hiking trail of about 500 miles that begins in France, makes its way through Spain, and ends at the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, where tradition has it that the remains of St. James are buried. Many walk the journey to discover who they are and what their lives are about. Walking ten to fifteen miles a day with little to think about other than one's life tends to turn the hike into a pilgrimage that thousands have made over the centuries for just that purpose. The pilgrimage is arduous, often plagued with rain, blisters, shin splints, and a discovery of how to

travel light. But then, such is all of life.

This week's Emmaus Gospel recounts a similar journey compressed into one day. Like life, it begins in confusion, is scattered with insights and revelations about what has just taken place and ends with the discovery that the Lord has been the one walking with them. Faith does not solve one's problems nor eliminate one's difficulties. It does help us understand life and find meaning in the midst of it all, and somehow it brings us to realize that we do not travel alone, making the journey worthwhile and blessed.

Fr. Mike's Musings

During the Holy Week liturgies there is a practice of the 'Washing of the Feet' which is done on Holy Thursday. It has always been my policy and practice to include those young people who are going to be receiving their First Communion later in the Spring in this rite. Sometimes, as it happened this year, I need to fill the empty seats with teens who are preparing for their Confirmation. On the surface this might appear to be dismissive of the Confirmation candidates (use only as a last resort). This is unfair as the journey these young people are undertaking is just as important as any of the other sacramental actions that we Catholics hold to so dearly in our faith lives.

Just as Baptism gives new life, Eucharist nourishes life, and Reconciliation restores life when it is broken, Confirmation strengthens that life by the gifts of the Holy Spirit. It is about strengthening what God has given, and continues to give, to His sons and daugh-

The Sacrament of Confirmation is not the Catholic equivalent to the Jewish bar mitzvah. Confirmation is not a "coming of age" celebration. True, most young people are just beginning to pass into early adulthood when they receive the sacrament. But Confirmation is not about coming of age. Reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation does not mark the end of formal religious education. We never outgrow a need for a deeper knowledge and appreciation of our faith.

The Sacrament of Confirmation is not a rite of passage, nor a graduation from religion class, nor a ratification of a personal faith choice. Rather, it's all about what God is doing for us, not what we are doing for Him.

So, what is God doing? Strengthening the Divine life which He gave at Baptism, nourishing us in the Eucharist, and reconciling with us in Penance. Why? So that the individual can better defend and witness to the faith through the gifts and workings of the Holy Spirit. And there are—and will be—many situations where we are called upon to defend and witness to our faith. And we need all the help we can get.


In the Sacrament of Confirmation, the Holy Spirit completes the grace of Baptism and offers the newly confirmed strength as a true witness of Christ. Thus, the newly confirmed is more strictly obliged to spread and defend the faith by word and deed. Except when there is a danger of death, anyone who is baptized and has the use of reason, is properly instructed and disposed, and can renew their baptismal commitment, is able to be confirmed. The proper age for reception of the sacrament is at the age of reason. Perhaps the requirement that one be "properly disposed" is the key to when the sacrament is received. Proper disposition refers to the recipient's willingness to cooperate with the gifts of the sacrament, which can happen at almost any age. But nowhere is the sacrament described as a ratification of the recipient's choice or decision about the faith. Rather, it is the gifts of the Holy Spirit offered to give the recipient the courage and strength to witness and serve—two responsibilities implied in Baptism—which are the grace and focus of the sacrament.

Thus, it is important not to view the Sacrament of Confirmation as a "rite of passage", a ratification of a personal choice, or a graduation from religious instruction. Rather, it is to be viewed, as are all the sacraments, as a distinctive working of God in a person's life. Perhaps we don't recognize these qualities as gifts of strength because they have become a part of our Christian living and appear quite natural—a fact that affirms how closely the Holy Spirit works with us.

Dear Padre,

Our planet's condition is now a serious problem. Why is climate change hardly mentioned in homilies?

Many people view climate change as a political issue more than a religious one. As such, some homilists avoid controversial, politicized topics altogether; others are selective in preaching about them; still others tend to use the pulpit as a soapbox for a single political issue or a variety of them. Moreover, preachers themselves are not apolitical, nor are they all centrist in their ideologies. Like those in the pews, homilists have biases, too.

So how did climate change become so politicized? Despite



decades of substantial evidence from many respected scientific experts, confusion exists about climate change because the issue's scope is massive and hard to digest, international cooperation is mandatory, and polaropposite opinions of politicians and their followers are often intransigent. Nevertheless, Pope Francis convened an international conference in 2019 to look at how religions can help the world reach sustainable ecological goals by 2030 to, he said, repair "the damage we have done. No branch of science or form of wisdom should be overlooked, and this includes religions and the languages particular to them."

Thus, according to the Pope, "religious voices" play a crucial role in addressing the serious condition of our planet. Inasmuch as religion has a fundamental responsibility to offer people faith and hope in a better world—and homilies help believers find meaning and purpose—taking action and speaking out about humanity's well-being are becoming less optional.
