here are moments when we realize the baton has been passed to us, and now we must conduct the symphony of our lives. One such moment may be when both parents have died. "They" say we never fully grow up until that occurs, for from that time on we can no longer go home. I know of a daughter who received a gift from her mother when the daughter moved out on her own. Inside, the daughter discovered a pair of apron strings, a symbol of her break with home. At various times, life hands us a bountiful serving of responsibility as we commit to a vocation, or for many, become parents for the first time. On such occasions, the future may weigh heavily upon us.

This week's Gospel is a farewell speech of sorts. Given to the Twelve on the night before his passion and death, Jesus promises he will not leave us orphans and that the Spirit will be given to us to do what we must do.

There have been any number of times when life has unfolded for me into new circumstances and life roles, occasions often filled with anxiety and sometimes even fear. I usually found I could deal with such realities by asking myself what would be the worst that could happen, and if it did, could I handle it? Every time, I found myself realizing I could handle the worst. Importantly, the ability to do what needs doing always seems to flow from God's Spirit that is given to each of us. If our faith in God is alive in us, our spiritual apron strings are never severed.



Fr. Mike's Musings

The modern structure and theology of the Sacrament of Reconciliation began to take form as far back as the I2th Century. The usage included a sincere sense of contrition (sorrow), confession of ones offenses to a validly ordained priest, satisfaction or penance to atone for the confessed sins, and the imposed forgiveness of those sins—absolution. It should be noted that absolution only takes effect when then penance has been satisfied by the penitent. These elements were formally codified by the Council of Trent in I551 in response to question about the sacrament were being voiced by adherents of the Protestant Reformation. In our current day this formula is the basic structure commonly used by the Catholic faithful in confession.

The Second Vatican Council (1959-1965) revised the sacramental pattern in order to express the spiritual nature and effects more fully. This revision incorporated more use of scripture as foundational evidence of the sacrament, emphasized the role of the confessor (priest) as bearing the healing authority of Christ, and offered options by which the sacrament in received.

The first of these options in the traditional form wherein an individual confesses their sins in the privacy of a dedicated confessional or reconciliation room, either faceto face with the priest or through the anonymity of screen between the priest and the penitent. The second is by means of a communal penance service where a congregation gathers to pray and prepare for the sacrament, and then go individually to confess their sins to a priest. Just attending the service and not availing oneself of the sacrament individually is not sufficient and has not the reconciling effect on the penitent. The third option, and the least frequently used, is the so-called "General Confession". This is used only in dire or emergency situations were there are not enough priests available to hear the confessions of a large number of penitents—i.e. soldiers departing for war. In this instance a common prayer of sorrow is made, but there is no individual confession of sins. The third option is never to be used in ordinary service in parishes or at special events conducted by the Church. It is for emergencies only. The chief reason for this final option being restricted is that is has never been in the Catholic tradition to confess ones sins publicly. This is a matter strictly between God and the penitent through the mediation of a priest-confessor.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is a meeting with Christ. Preparing oneself begins with prayer to become fully aware of His presence among us. This prayer should also be for the grace to see ourselves as Christ sees us—wounded pilgrims on a journey of faith and healing. Through this grace we come to a realization of our sins, understanding how we have offended God, and being able to confess them honestly and with regret. Many try to categorize or enumerate their sins by their severity (mortal vs. venial). However, we must never allow ourselves to fall into complacency about our offenses. A sin is a sin, big or small, and we can unknowingly allow the "smaller" sins to build-up by not acknowledging them, thus creating larger problems to weigh on our souls over time. Mortal sins are indeed the more serious, but the venial sins can be more insidious as we tend to ignore them and allow them to take us into even greater separation in our relationship with God.

After confession, thanksgiving should be offered to God for the healing grace of the sacrament and the penance given by the priest should be carried out as soon as possible. The penance can take many forms ranging from prayer, to service, to the self-denial of actions or things that may have led to the commission of the sins. The penitential acts serve to rectify any harm done through our offenses, and joins ever closer to Jesus, who suffered for us, and who has given us this sacramental gift so that we may enjoy the full fruits of that sacrifice. To ignore or misuse this gift cheapens His sacrifice of love and pulls us further away from that divine love. Confess regularly (once a month is recommended), it is good for the soul, good for our peace of mind, and in the end, good for all as it will always bring us closer to the Lord.

Dear Padre.

If the Catholic Church recognizes baptisms from other Christian denominations, why not confirmations?

Baptism signs us with an indelible mark. It defines our character and can never be repeated. A baptism is always held to be valid if a person is baptized with water using the Trinitarian formula (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1256). If a priest is unsure of the validity of a person's baptism, he would baptize the person conditionally, recognizing the earlier baptism if it happened and was valid. The minister of baptism is usually an ordained minister, but in necessity anyone can baptize, including a non-Christian, if the person intends what the Church intends.


Confirmation also leaves an indelible mark, as does holy orders, and they also cannot be repeated. What makes confirmation

different from baptism is that the minister of confirmation is ordinarily the bishop because this expresses the apostolic unity of the Church (CCC 1312). If someone had been confirmed in a Church that has apostolic succession,

their confirmation would be considered valid, and the person wouldn't be reconfirmed.

Most Christian churches have a common understanding of what the sacrament of baptism is, but while other churches might have communion, confirmation, and ordination, their celebration of those sacraments may not include all the requirements necessary for the Catholic Church to consider them valid. .
