



Fr. Mike's Musings

Over the past few weeks, I have been discussing the whys and the wherefores of the ordained priesthood in Roman Catholicism.

We (priests) are a special segment of the Church population, and as such have been entrusted and empowered with a variety of duties, traditional practices, and even gestures that are unique to our ministry and provide the significance of the task of continually bringing Christ to His people, and to the world. Sometimes these faculties are subverted, either through ignorance or obstinance, and this can lead to confusion about one's professed faith, and the role that each of us, clergy and laity, have in that faith.



A discussion that is common in Catholic parishes between the more orthodox members of the parish and the more "progressive" members is whether or not the faithful should use the Orans Posture during the 'Our Father'. When such a question comes up, the obvious solution is to go to the rubrics. Unfortunately, in this case, the General Instruction on the Roman Missal (GIRM) is relatively silent on the topic. Because of the GIRM's silence, many people have taken this to mean that the faithful may do whatever they want. However, this is not the case. In the document, "Instruction On Certain Questions Regarding the Collaboration of the Non-Ordained Faithful in the Sacred Ministry of Priests", issued by the Vatican in August of 1997, it is noted:

"In eucharistic celebrations deacons and non-ordained members of the faithful may not pronounce prayers — e.g., especially the Eucharistic prayers, with its concluding doxology — or any other parts of the liturgy reserved to the priest.

Neither may deacons or non-ordained members of the faithful use gestures or actions which are proper to the same priest celebrant.

It is a grave abuse for any member of the non-ordained faithful to "quasi preside" at the Mass while leaving only that minimal participation to the priest which is necessary to secure validity" (Section 6, Paragraph2).

What the above statement means is that we may not say the Eucharistic prayers along with the priest — believe it or not, I occasionally see people mouthing the words along with me every week. More importantly to this topic, this also means the faithful may not use the same gestures that are reserved for the priest-celebrant. As mentioned above, the "GIRM" is silent with regard to the posture of the faithful during the Our Father, however, the Roman Missal (the book of prayers for Mass used by the priest) states that the celebrant is to pray the 'Our Father' with hands extended. The faithful are not to use gestures or actions proper to the priest-celebrant. Using this argument, one would think that the rubrics could be used to appeal to the faithful. Unfortunately, many of the faithful view the rubrics as another set of rules and those of us who wish to enforce the rubrics are no better than the modern-day Pharisees.

In that regard, let us look instead to another reason why the Orans Posture and the holding of hands are not appropriate gestures for the faithful during 'Our Father'. This prayer takes place during the 'Liturgy of the Eucharist'. This time of prayer and offering is directed to God, as is the entire Mass, but more specifically during the 'Liturgy of the Eucharist'. As it is directed toward God, the extending and/or holding of hands creates a horizontal emphasis (keeping it among us) on the prayer, as opposed to the vertical emphasis (directing it to God) that it demands. Many people who prefer hand holding or the Orans Posture argue that the 'Our Father' is a community prayer, and as such holding and/or extending hands is a visible sign of that community. However, the 'Our Father' is a community prayer, not because we hold or extend our hands, but because we pray it together as the Body of Christ!

In late-1958 the faithful were given permission to pray the 'Our Father' with the priest. However, the faithful maintained the same posture as before - standing, with their hands folded in prayer. Prior to this, the priest prayed the 'Our Father' on behalf of the faithful. The Orans Posture is representative of praying on behalf of others. The next time you are at Mass, watch the priest's gestures closely. Anytime he offers prayers on behalf of the faithful, he uses the Orans Posture. Anytime he is offering other prayers, his hands are folded together. Having a better understanding of what particular gestures mean will lead to a better understanding of the Liturgy. It is of the utmost importance that we treat the Mass with the respect it deserves. This is not the time nor the place to get creative and inject one's own style and preferences.



Dear Padre,

Christians teach that Adam and Eve were the first man and woman and that they were created by God. How does the Catholic Church reconcile this belief with the theory of evolution?

Chapter 1 of Genesis contains the seven-day account of creation that we usually refer to when we reflect on the beginning of our world. The very next chapter contains a second account. The editors of the Bible were not distraught over the two differing



accounts; they left them side by side because they weren't interested in giving either a historical or scientific explanation for the world's origin. Rather, they were emphasizing deeper truths, such as the goodness of the earth as created by a loving and caring God. Scripture tells us that the Creator held human beings as especially precious.

Cannot these same values be maintained if we believe creation (or evolution) took longer than seven twenty-fourhour days? Perhaps God actually spent seventy billion years bringing forth the world's beauty. Details and numbers don't change the message of Genesis: God is good; God created the cosmos, heaven and earth, "all things visible and invisible," as we profess in the Nicene Creed, and all of creation is good. Furthermore, scientific discoveries surrounding space, matter, and all forms of life "invite us to even greater admiration for the greatness of the Creator, prompting us to give him thanks for all his works and for the understanding and wisdom he gives to scholars and researchers" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 283).
