A Church on the Way

n July 2013, as part of a visit to Brazil, Pope Francis met with the Latin American conference of bishops. Speaking informally, bishop to bishops, he said, "At times we lose people because they don't understand what we are saying, because we have forgotten the language of simplicity and import an intellectualism foreign to our people."

I thought about how his words could be applied in my parish, so one Sunday I asked the people in the pews what they looked for from the Church. I was impressed and touched by their answers: wisdom to make their way through life; where and how to find God; a desire to be treated like adults; compassion for themselves and for others; guidance to reach out to the needy in society; a link between faith and life; a place to find some peace and quiet; wisdom for the political process. It was a list by which we who lead need to examine our consciences.

The charge from Pope Francis is to be a Church that speaks to people where they are with the words of everyday life. We look for wisdom that enables us to become our best selves. And that is what healthy religion is about: to guide rather than to control; to inspire rather than to shame; to participate fully rather than to simply "pray, pay, and obey."

What have you found in the Church and what more do you long for?

Fr. Mike's Musings

"My child, when you come to serve the Lord, prepare yourself for trials" (Sirach 2:1) Trials certainly can take many forms. They may present themselves as a financial crisis, a reorganization of the Mass schedule, or by changing flowers without consulting the parish decorator(s). No matter how a crisis may present itself, there is no doubt that our patience and charity will be challenged. But the challenge itself is not the difficult part, the difficult thing is to keep Christ at the center of our dealings without becoming agitated.

Many times the peace I need comes from my lifelong passion for books and reading. In high school we were assigned several novels to read which I still have a hard time picking-up and reading—some authors, despite their "greatness", just aren't that great. One of these is Herman Melville, the author of "Moby Dick". I'm not a fan of this work but there was an important lesson from it that has been a help to me when navigating the waters of temperament in ministry. I remind myself how anger and a fixation on a singular matter (hunting the great, white whale) ultimately led to the mental and physical destruction of the novel's antagonist Captain Ahab,

When I first drew that conclusion nearly forty years ago it hit me like a ton of bricks and made me reflect upon my own obsessions and anger. It certainly gave me pause and the opportunity to endure with joy and prayer the difficult moments of life.

To be honest, criticism and dealing with complaints is generally the least satisfying aspect of priestly ministry. It is like facing a firing squad without the blindfold. A priest friend recently recommended that parishes set-out "Suggestion Boxes" in the entryways of churches. Another mutual priest friend responded: "No, I can only handle one grenade at a time, John."

We often pour so much of ourselves into our ministry that it is very hard to not take things personally. The same can be said for the laity in the Church. Many take their careers and responsibilities so seriously that they become a part of their being, so much so that any comment or critique on those matters can be perceived as a personal attack on them

However, the Lord offers us a wonderful example through His own life of how to not succumb to our passions. We must be prepared to encounter opposition in our roles as servant leaders or responsible workers and family providers. Maintaining our personal peace of mind is paramount, especially when we would like to offer a piece of our mind. We must truly be willing to be soldiers for the Lord, keeping in mind always that we are indeed in a war for our hearts and souls, even if we do not qualify for combat pay. Christ will see us through our troubles, but only if we place our trust in Him, work to keep our cool, and not allow our personal passions to destroy us—body, mind, and soul.





Dear Padre,

I would like to do more spiritual reading, but everything I've tried is either over my head or too sweet and pious for me. Do you have suggestions for any down-to-earth authors?

You might try reading shorter works. More is not necessarily better. Consider several publications available at Liquori.org. In My Own Words is a series of books that gathers excerpts from different authors: Dorothy Day, Sr. Thea Bowman, Pope St. John Paul II, and others. Also consider the Wisdom series for Advent and Christmas or Lent and Easter. These include the writings of ancients and a few more current authors like Pope Francis, Henri Nouwen, and Thomas Merton. Daybreaks for Advent and Lent are booklets of short meditations for each day of each season. Catholic Update, a four-page newsletter from Liquori, features indepth articles on contemporary topics written by expert authors.

C. S. Lewis was a prolific and popular Christian author. His Mere Christianity is practical and informative. A Grief Observed is a beautiful meditation for those who have lost someone dear to them, as is Henri Nouwen's In Memoriam. Merton's New Seeds of Contemplation has inspired readers since it was first published in 1949.

Finally, the best place to start might be the Gospel of Mark—not to study or analyze. Rather, read it just to get to know Jesus a little better.
