

The Light of Wisdom

he dark of night can unsettle and frighten children, but darkness can disturb adults, too. It's not so much the feeling when the lights go off that unsettles us grownups as it is the dark of uncertainty. We graduate from school and wonder what to do with our lives. Should we stay in a relationship? How do we find meaning again in the midst of grief and the loss of someone we love? And sometimes most of all, where is God when we need God? We may even wonder whether to believe. At such times, we bump and bruise our way through the obstacles that life's darknesses cause.

Leonard Cohen's song "Anthem" echoes a note of hope when we feel lost in the dark as he sings about how light always seems to find a way to seep in between the cracks of our everyday living. Like stars that are visible only at night, new opportunities are often most readily recognized when we find ourselves stumbling through the dark.

Long before Leonard Cohen, Jesus told the parable of ten virgins, some wise and some foolish. In the midst of that story, he tells of a bridegroom who comes to the waiting virgin attendants at midnight. In other words, it is the Lord God who comes into our lives in the darkest times, if only we are wise enough to recognize such a coming.

How then to negotiate the darkness? Stay the course. In time, wisdom reveals a path. Trust that light will come, all in God's time and not ours. Finally, wisdom always comes in the darkest of times, seldom when our lives are bright as day.

so they can be delivered to Coopersville Cares. Thank you for your support and generosity. May God bless you as you have blessed others.





Fr. Mike's Musings

This past week we celebrated the memory of our beloved deceases on November 2, 'All Souls Day'. A practice many parishes have is to either have a Mass in the parish cemetery (if there is one), or set a space aside for the placement of photos of family members who have recently passed-on alongside a book where the names of those who have died in the past year. A practice that I have adopted is



to locate and consecrate cemetery sections that have been designated as the burial sites for those who did not have the means to cover their own funerary expenses, the so-called 'Potters Field', and for those children who were either stillborn, had died at birth, or had died before they were baptized. Older cemeteries such as the one at St. Mary commonly had a section set aside for this purpose as the indigent may or may not have been baptized and as noted, these children were not. Under the old statutes of Canon Law, and for centuries previous, those not cleansed of the stain of original sin could not rest within the confines of consecrated cemeteries, churchyards, or parish-

In the doctrine of original sin everyone is born with a sinful nature. So, with this inherited fault already weighing on the human soul, what happens to babies who die without having been cleansed through baptism? Do babies go to Hell? Do they go to Heaven? Do they go someplace in between? St. Augustine believed that unbaptized infants share in the common positive misery of the damned (i.e., Hell), and the very most that St. Augustine concedes is that their punishment is the mildest of all.

Eight hundred years after Augustine, a French philosopher named Peter Abelaard said dead infants went to a "cooler" (not as hot) place on the edge of Hell. He called this place the 'Limbo of Infants'. The word limbo comes from the Latin word limbus meaning edge. St. Thomas Aquinas reaffirmed this somewhat in his writings on salvation.

Fortunately, Catholics don't agree with either Augustine or Abelaard any longer. In the 1980 "Instruction on Children's Baptism", the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith reaffirmed that: "with regard to children who die without having received baptism, the Church can only entrust them to the mercy of God." Trusting a lost child to the mercy of God is a lot more compassionate that condemning them to Hell or having them stuck for eternity in a space where they are neither damned nor saved—they just are.

The undeniable truth is God gives grace to all of us, young and old alike. We are not judged by how good or bad we are. We are judged by our response to Jesus. So what happens to babies who die? Do babies go to Hell on account of original sin? This question has led to much confusion and handwringing. It has caused some to abandon the faith (because God is cruel) and others to embrace universalism (because a good God could never do this). Uncertainty over their children leaves parents riddled with anxiety and prone to deception. Bad questions lead to bad responses. What would Jesus say if He was asked about babies and young children? He would say "The Kingdom of God belongs to such as these." (Luke 18:16) However, because we have swallowed so much mumbo-jumbo, we doubt whether the Kingdom really does belong to such as these.

We have been fed the Augustinian lie that babies are bad to the bone. We've heard the Calvinist trollop that infants are depraved little sinners. Some say that babies will be judged according to the light of their revelation. But how much revelation does a newborn have? What about a miscarried baby? Others say God looks into the baby's future and judges them for what they would've done. This is absurd. The baby died. They didn't do anything. How can a just God judge them for what they were not able to do?

What happens to babies and children who die young? They go to be with Jesus. EVERY, SINGLE, ONE—no exceptions! If an infant or child has been lost, we can be 100% certain about this. We should not listen to those comfortless frowners who say a child is unredeemed and condemned but trust the One who said His Kingdom belonged to such as these. It is a mistake to say babies to say babies are sinful and damned or righteous and holy. So how do we deal with verses that say things like "... without holiness no one will see the Lord" (Hebrews 12:14)? We don't. We give those verses to God and trust in His wisdom and mercy.

Happily, God's mercy is vast beyond all comprehension. His mercy trumps any judgment that may come against children. If we could see Heaven right now, we would find that it is full of the "lost" children--deceased babies, HIV babies, aborted babies, and miscarried babies. I don't know what age they are in Heaven, but I firmly believe that they are there. Because if grace is for anyone, it is for babies and children such as these.



Dear Padre,

I was taught that Catholic churches are built on consecrated ground. How can a church be torn down and replaced by a shopping mall if it's sacred ground?

Church buildings are blessed and considered by the Church to be sacred places. But when they're damaged and can no longer be repaired or their repair is impractical or they no longer effectively serve their purpose for the faithful of God, the bishop can remove that blessing. By doing this, the bishop opens them for nonsacred use. Subsequently, they can be torn down or sold, as long as the new purpose is not scandalous to the people of God.

In the end, what is truly sacred is not the brick and mortar or even the soil, but the purpose for which they were built. Churches are blessed and declared sacred because we perform sacred rituals within them. When those rituals are no longer being performed in that location, there is no longer a need for them to be declared sacred.



When a church is closed, it is often a sad event. Many people carry deep emotional ties to their parish churches. But a diocese cannot always maintain all of its churches. Catholic populations shift, local needs change. Money is limited, and good stewardship demands that bishops sometimes make the difficult decision to close or merge parishes. Remember what is truly important and of ultimate and sacred value—our worship and service of God. •
