Fr. Mike's Musings



When Jesus comes to us how does He come? Every time we receive the sacraments Jesus comes to us, and there is a visible sign of Jesus coming to us invisibly through His sacraments. Just as the Holy Spirit came upon David when he was anointed with oil by Samuel, and just as Jesus used the matter of clay and water for the healing of the blind man, Jesus comes to us in each sacrament when *matter* is used together with prayer, and we call the prayer the *form*. So the matter and form of every sacrament is the visible sign of Jesus coming to us invisibly but powerfully in the sacrament.

- In the Sacrament of Baptism, the matter is water which is poured over the head to baptize—symbolizing washing—“*I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit*” which is prayed at the same time as the water is poured.
- In the Sacrament of Confirmation, the matter is the bishop using his thumb to anoint the forehead with the oil of chrism. “*Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit.*”
- In the Sacrament of the Eucharist, the matter is bread made from wheat and wine fermented from grapes. The form is the words of the consecration at Mass over the bread and wine:

“Take this all of you and eat it, for this is my Body which will be given up for you.

Take this all of you and drink from it, for this is the chalice of my Blood, the Blood of the new and eternal Covenant...”

- In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, the “matter” is not something that we can see as in the other sacraments or something that touches our senses; instead it is our sorrow and repentance and the penance we perform after receiving absolution.
- In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, the matter is anointing with the Oil of the Sick on the forehead and on the palms of the hand. “Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you through the grace of the Holy Spirit [anointing on the forehead] ...May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you, and raise you up [anointing on the palms].”
- In the Sacrament of Holy Orders in which deacons, priests and bishops are ordained, the matter is the imposition of hands by the bishop on the head of the man being ordained. The form, the Prayer of Consecration immediately following the laying on of hands, differs whether it is a deacon, priest, or bishop who is being ordained.
- In the Sacrament of Matrimony, the matter and form of the sacrament is the mutual self-giving and self-acceptance by the couple as they hold each other's right hands.

Every time we receive the sacraments, Jesus comes to us by touching our senses and there is a visible sign of Jesus coming to us invisibly through the sacrament. God uses the ordinary elements of nature to convey His power and healing to us. Jesus touched the blind man and Jesus touches us with a lasting and efficacious power.

"Lord, If You Had Been Here..."

Where Jesus is, there life is; where he is not, sin has power to wound and to kill. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." How many people can say today: "Lord, if you had been here, the war that killed my brother would never have happened; the driver who killed my sister would not have been drinking; the hunger and disease that kill children every day would not have been ignored"? How many deaths are due to human cruelty? When we exclude God from our world, from our thoughts and our decision-making processes, we invite selfishness, cruel indifference, destructive greed and violence.

It is not just physical death we are talking about. How many times can we say, "Lord, if you had been here, if you had been speaking through these people, acting in this community, our brothers and our sisters would not have turned away from love or given up hope. They would not have lost faith in themselves, in other people, in the Church, in God. Something in them would not have died."

Jesus is "the resurrection and the life." But he is this not only in himself but also in his Body on earth. He acts through us. The woundedness we see around us need not "lead to death." We can respond to sin and to sickness of heart in such a way that "the Son of God may be glorified." Jesus' risen presence in the world can be revealed and his power made manifest through the life-giving, healing love we show to all in need—to victims and violators alike.

When Jesus said, "Let us go to Lazarus," the apostle Thomas said, "Let us also go, that we may die with

him." Thomas spoke as a prophet; Jesus indeed gave life to the world by dying. And we can give life only if we die with him in order that others may live. The dying we must accept is giving our flesh for the life of the world as Jesus did. And this means to give expression in the flesh to truth, to hope, to love.

Jesus came as the Word made flesh. He was the truth of God expressed visibly on earth. In his teaching God's words were "made flesh" in the physical sounds of his voice. In his lifestyle the values of God were literally embodied. He was killed for bearing witness to the truth. And on the cross, more important than the pain he suffered was the love he expressed through it.

To express ourselves is to be vulnerable. We are afraid to drop all the masks we hide behind, to be ourselves, to reveal ourselves,

to express ourselves. Just as we use clothes to hide our bodies, we often use our bodies to hide our emotions and thoughts. We don't want the "word" of our souls to be "made flesh" in nakedness, even to give life to those around us.

This is what our baptismal priesthood is all about: We were anointed at Baptism to share in the priesthood of Jesus. But a priest has no function except as a minister within a community. To accept our baptismal consecration as priests is to accept our role of *active ministry in the community of the Church*. And this means *giving expression* to the truth and love within us by grace. Saint Paul writes, “You are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you.” God is revealed through our words and actions so that no one will ever have to say, “Lord, if you had been here....” Every member of Christ has “the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good” (see 1 Corinthians 12:7). This is the fulfillment of God’s promise made to Ezekiel, “I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves.... I will put my spirit in you, and you shall live.” When we surrender ourselves to let God express his truth, his love through us, Jesus can empower us as a community of priests to “roll away the stone” that keeps others in their tombs, and can say to us, “Unbind them and let them go free.”

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Fifth Week of Lent

Pray daily: Father, help us to be like Christ your Son, who loved the world and died for our salvation. Inspire us by his love and guide us by his example. Amen.

Monday: John 8:1-11. “The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery... making her stand before all of them.” People are frequently exposed in their sinfulness. Are you ready to “stand before” your friends expressing your faith? Do you respond and sing at liturgy? Do you express your faith at work, home and in your social life?

Tuesday: John 8:21-30. Jesus said, “[T]he one who sent me is true, and I declare to the world what I have heard from him.” Are you willing to tell the world that what you have learned from Jesus in the Church is true? How do you feel when unpopular truths are criticized? To whom are you sent to speak about Jesus?

Wednesday: Luke 1:26-38 (Annunciation). “And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus.” Do you believe you are called as truly as Mary was to conceive thoughts in your head through the seed of Christ’s word, and bear fruit by giving them flesh in action? How do you open yourself to his words?

Thursday: John 8:51-59. Jesus said, “I know [the Father], and if I would say that I do not know him, I would be a liar like you. But I do know him and I keep his word.” How do you show publicly your love for the Father, for Jesus, for Mary? Are you willing to share your experiences of God? With whom?

Friday: John 10:31-42. Many came to Jesus and said, “John performed no sign, but everything that John said about this man was true.” Do you realize and accept the power you have to bring others to Jesus through the witness of your own faith and lifestyle? What do people see in your life that indicates that you take Jesus and your faith seriously?

Saturday: John 11:45-57. Caiaphas, the high priest, said, “[I]t is better...to have one man die for the people than to have the whole nation destroyed.” Is it better that you should suffer for speaking the truth, or that little by little, through everyone’s silence, whole nation or culture should accept many falsehoods, prejudices and wrong values?

SEVERAL SUGGESTIONS FOR LENT

Prayer: Try praying with someone this week—at home, at work, on a date—anything from just saying the Our Father together or talking over a Scripture passage.

Fasting: Is there anything in your life you could stop doing (or stop not doing!) just because it doesn’t express your real values and beliefs?

Almsgiving: How could you give someone a gift out of the riches of your faith and religion? What do you have as a Catholic that others may not have but might like to know about? How can you make a gift to others by expressing your devotion in liturgy?

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
