What if we could reach back in time and change those things, wiping away our failures and sins, fixing the wounds, rebooting relationships and restarting habits? We cannot, because we are limited by time and space. But Christ can, because he has 'passed through the heavens' and stands at the 'throne of grace', beyond the limits of time and space. God's mercy is powerful enough to reach back into the past and re-dimension it in accordance with his wisdom - this is what re-demption is all about: not undoing the past, but redeeming it.

*To every things there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven. (Eccl 3:1)*

Only in Iowa can you have tornados touching down one day and snow falling in the same week. But the snow this past weekend is a reminder that winter is on the way. When there is inclement weather, whether it be snow, ice, or extreme cold, we sometimes have to cancel faith formation to ensure the safety of our students. Here are some guidelines to follow

- If West Central Valley School District cancels school for the day or lets out early because the weather, we will not have faith formation. (Late starts do not count.)
- If for some reason the weather worsens, but school is not let out early, we will send out a mass email announcing there will be no classes that evening.
- Always use your discretion. In town driving and country driving can be quite different. If the roads do not seem safe or you do not want to send your children out in the weather, please keep them home.
- When in doubt, call the church office. Our primary concern is the safety of all involved with our faith formation program.

But who among them would be prepared? Those who would be first, become last; those who expect to be great will become servants. Jesus did not come to be served, but to serve. Those who would accompany him would also serve.

We might think we should get what we want, but we only get what God plans for us and grooms us to be. I don't believe that we have no say in that whatsoever; how we serve others before ourselves no doubt plays a role. It's hardly fair to expect entitlements without earning them. Most people would rather have with them those who are worthy of their placement. God wants us to be worthy of our placement in heaven.



**Father Tony's Corner**



Today's first reading from the book of Isaiah, written about six hundred years before the birth of Christ, was one of various prophecies about how the Messiah would save God's people: through suffering. God was preparing his Chosen people to recognize the promised Messiah by 'affliction' and by 'being crushed in iniquity'. And it was precisely through those sufferings that Jesus would take all of our sins upon himself, atone for them, and re-open the gates of heaven for us. Jesus goes into more detail about his coming fate. He gives a play-by-play account of what will happen to him - the unjust condemnation, the physical torture, the mockery, the crucifixion. He knows what awaits him in Jerusalem, and yet he does not turn aside. This shows that everything he will suffer will be suffered willingly, not for any benefit that will accrue to him, but for our salvation. Jesus became incarnate, lived, and died for our sake. He had no self-centered item on his agenda; he came to serve and to give his life for others. The Apostles, as we hear in today's Gospel, had not studied the prophecies of Isaiah closely enough. Their idea of the Messiah was a powerful political and military leader who would make Israel back into a player on the international scene. And so, James and John, looking forward to that day, try to reserve their spots in the King's cabinet. Jesus has to remind them that his Kingdom is about sacrifice and service, not power politics and self-indulgence. Trust is the foundation stone of salvation. Original sin, which broke down mankind's relationship with God, was a failure of trust. To rebuild that relationship, which is the only place the human heart can find happiness, God had to win back our trust. And he did that by suffering and dying on the cross, proving once and for all that nothing we can do, no matter how terrible and evil it may be, will turn away his love. Christ suffered to win back our trust. But it is not enough to understand this with our minds. We have to learn to trust him with our lives, in our hearts, in all that we do. A privileged way to do that is through how we deal with our own suffering. When God permits us to suffer, especially if the suffering is not the result of our own sin or stupidity, he is giving us a golden opportunity to exercise our trust in him. In his suffering, Christ showed beyond all doubt that he is faithful to us; in our suffering, he gives us that chance to learn to be faithful to him. In that relationship of mutual faithfulness lies the secret of life's true meaning. Let us really bring our sufferings to Christ today, and let his grace nourish our trust in the Lord. Jesus is our representative in heaven. He is there interceding for us - first of all, grace - the strength and light we need to deal with the challenges of today and tomorrow. And second of all, mercy - the total forgiveness and healing of our past. Healing our past is one of the things God most delights in doing. Maybe it is because it is one of those things that only God can do.
