

# catholic immersion

"Catholic Immersion" is actively integrating the Catholic Faith into the entire experience of our students, families, and staff at our Catholic schools. It goes beyond simply identifying as Catholic. We place Christ at the center of all decisions and learning, allowing students to experience Him in the curriculum and in their everyday decision–making. The best way to become fluent in a foreign language is to surround oneself with native speakers and immerse in the language and culture. We aim for a similar kind of experience in our schools—a Catholic culture in which our students and their families cannot help but be influenced by Catholic virtues and the Catholic worldview. At a time when only 31% of Catholics still believe in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist (Pew Research Center, 2019), it is of the utmost importance to form our families in the Faith.

# **CURRICULUM**

From our faith-integrated English and math standards to our interdisciplinary approach that builds basic skills, makes thematic connections across subjects, and teaches critical thinking, our students learn to appreciate the truth, beauty, and goodness of God's creation. The knowledge they gain disposes them to develop an understanding of God at work throughout salvation history, and this informs the moral decisions they face. In short, they learn to see through a Catholic worldview. Our students grow into excellent communicators, able to articulate and express themselves effectively.

# SACRAMENTAL DEVOTION

Our students have ample opportunities to attend Mass and grow closer to Christ through adoration, reconciliation, and prayer. Families have opportunities to grow in their faith through the school, and intercessory prayer teams offer prayer for the school.

# VIRTUES AND SERVICE

Our students learn about the virtues through our curriculum and have opportunities to apply these virtues and works of mercy through service opportunities, helping the poor and marginalized in a spirit of missionary discipleship. They develop care for each other and our world, seeking to be good citizens in this life with a goal of becoming saints in heaven.






### DEMOGRAPHICS BY RACE

Pensacola offer Morning Star
programs to educate students
with various special needs while
providing them with an authentic
Catholic school experience. These
students regularly interact with their
peers who are not in Morning Star
and experience an individualized
academic program, taking general
education classes where appropriate.

Our faculty and staff are the heartbeat of our Catholic schools. The difference they make in the lives of our families cannot be measured; it will be felt for the entirety of our students' lives. They are the role models of faith and service who inspire the next generation.

Teachers work hard to attain and maintain professional credentials, as well as catechetical certification. Our catechetical certification program provides a common formation in the Catholic Faith. All teachers, regardless of subject or personal faith, actively participate in the program.





# faculty spotlight

Chris Holcomb and Patricia Young were model Catholic school teachers who felt God calling them to a deeper ministry.

Chris, a 2003 graduate and eight-year veteran of Catholic High, entered the diocesan seminary in Fall 2019. He taught religion and math at Catholic High and religious education at Little Flower Parish.

Patricia, a 2008 graduate and six-year veteran of St. John Paul II, entered the postulancy of the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in Fall 2019. She taught math and served as athletic director for SJPII.

# Return of ACE Teaching Fellows

In the Fall of 2018, Notre Dame's Alliance for Catholic Education re-established its Teaching Fellows program in Pensacola. Four teaching fellows joined the faculty as full-time teachers while they pursue their Masters of Education degrees during the summers at Notre Dame.

# academic excellence

Our Catholic schools offer a rigorous curriculum, teaching fundamental skills, including critical thinking, writing, and advanced use of technology. An important part of our academic program is the integration of the Faith into all subjects as we teach Christ across the curriculum. We seek for students to see the truth, beauty, and goodness in what they are learning.


Our students consistently outperform the national average on standardized testing, and this past year's high school graduates collectively earned eight figures in scholarship money to colleges. Elementary students take the Terra Nova assessments, while high school students take the ACT and SAT. The graphs show the aggregate performance of our students by grade according to grade equivalent, which describes academic performance in terms of grade level and month. For example, if a third grade student taking the Terra Nova at the ¾ point of their school year scores a 4.2 on the third grade reading test, this means the student scored as well as a fourth grade student in the second month of the school year if given the same third grade reading test.


The average amount of scholarship dollars offered per graduate was \$63,584 - almost double the average four-year tuition for Catholic high schools in our diocese.


# 8th Grade Class of 2019 Performance Over Time










37% of our eligible high school graduates were awarded Bright Futures Scholarships.

On October 5, 2018, our Catholic schools held their first ever Data Day. The purpose of this professional development, conducted at each site with a common set of objectives across the diocese, was to break into teams and study student performance on standardized testing, looking for patterns in data and finding areas where students needed to grow. Areas of strengths and weaknesses were identified and strategies were formulated to address these weaknesses at the class and student levels.



YEAR & GRADE LEVEL



Accreditation plays a vital role in validating the excellence of our Catholic schools. Our elementary schools are accredited through the Florida Catholic Conference (FCC), which uses the National Standards and Benchmarks for Effective Catholic Schools as its guiding principles. Our high schools are accredited through AdvancED, a national accrediting agency.

Much preparation goes into an accreditation self-study and visit, as stakeholders team with staff to evaluate and seek avenues for continuous improvement. The Office for Catholic Schools supports these efforts, culminating in a visiting team from the outside inspecting all aspects of the school.

# St. Paul

St. Paul Catholic School became the 8th school in Florida to earn FCC's prestigious STREAM accreditation, reserved for schools that exemplify quality in integrating Science, Technology, Religion, Engineering, Arts, and Math into a comprehensive curriculum. During the process, the school was commended for its interdisciplinary approach to instruction, connection of the student body with the Eucharist, and effective branding of the school.

# Sacred Heart

Sacred Heart completed its midterm three-year accreditation review. The visiting team affirmed the positive trajectory of the school and its progress in continuous improvement. During the process, the school was

commended for the presence of the pastor in the life of the school community, the seamless integration of the Catholic Faith and worldview with liberal arts courses in the Humanities program, and the differentiated curriculum and mainstreaming of Morning Star students.

# St. Rita

St. Rita Preschool was the first early learning center in our diocese to earn FCC accreditation. The school was commended for classrooms being well-organized and child-focused, health and safety protocols being in place at an exemplary level, and parent communication being consistent through the use of technology. Our other early learning centers are well into the process of becoming FCC accredited.

# school finances


Our Catholic schools and early learning centers practice fiscal responsibility, working closely with their pastors, advisory councils, and the diocesan pastoral center. We seek to be good stewards of our funding, using it to provide quality educational experiences for our students, centered in Christ.


As we seek to keep tuition as low as possible for our families, schools hold fundraisers and annual fund drives to bridge the gap between tuition and the cost to educate students. School families are encouraged to apply for financial aid through the Florida Tax Credit Scholarship and Family Empowerment Scholarship programs. Families may also apply for grants from their school or parish where applicable.



# DID YOU KNOW?

According to an analysis by the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops, our diocese's Catholic schools saved the State of Florida \$12,636,508.72 during the 2018-2019 school year. This figure is the projected cost of publicly educating all Florida children enrolled in our Catholic schools minus the total value of all state-funded scholarship awards to these children.

# FLORIDA TAX CREDIT (FTC) SCHOLARSHIP

Based on household size and income, the FTC Scholarship allows qualifying families to attend the private school of their choice through scholarships.

### **GARDINER SCHOLARSHIP**

Based on qualifying diagnoses, students with certain special needs can be eligible for an average of \$10,000 in scholarship funds each year to cover approved education-related expenses including private school tuition, tutoring, therapy, and educational technology.

### MCKAY SCHOLARSHIP

Based on IEP or 504 Accommodation Plan; students with specific special needs who have an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or 504 Accommodation and have previously attended a public school can be eligible to attend the private school of their choice with a scholarship up to full tuition.

# **VOLUNTARY PRE-KINDERGARTEN (VPK)**

A program providing state funding to help every 4-year-old in Florida to attend the Pre-K of his or her choice, in order to build a strong foundation that ensures kindergarten readiness.

# THE FAMILY EMPOWERMENT SCHOLARSHIP (FES)

FES is Florida's first voucher program for low and middle-income students. Like the McKay Scholarship for students with special needs, FES is funded from the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP), an operational formula that funds K-12 student choices in district schools, charter schools, and private schools. The scholarships will average between \$6,775 and \$7,250 depending on the grade level and county of the student. The program is projected to cost about \$130 million in its first year, which is less than the cost to educate the students at a traditional public school. Students must have attended a Florida public school for the prior school year. Exceptions include students entering kindergarten, foster children, and children of members of the United States Armed Forces who transfer to Florida with

permanent change of station orders. Students must be living in a household earning at, or below, 300 percent of the Federal poverty level, or in foster care or out-of-home care. That equals \$77,250 for a student living in a household of four.
