holiness ourselves, our baptism gave us another life-goal, namely that of bringing other people into God's family. We are Christ's ambassadors in the world; we are his apostles. As his followers, we are, like him, 'the light of the world'. And through our words, actions, and example, each one of us is called to lead others into friendship with the Lord. Jesus came to earth in order to call forth God's pleasure on sinful mankind, to lift us back into membership in God's family and give us, once again, the hope of true, lasting happiness. He did not keep his distance from the sinful, rebellious human family, but he came and took our place, uniting his divine nature to our human nature. But for us to experience the benefits of this saving grace, we in turn have to unite ourselves to Christ. Now this is not something that happens from one minute to the next. Developing our friendship with Christ is the main project of our whole life. But even so, we can identify three steps that can help us focus our ongoing efforts to become more and more united with our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ: knowing him, loving him, and imitating him. When we were baptized, God's own life was poured into our souls; it was planted like a seed in fertile soil. But every seed, in order to grow to maturity, needs three things: water, sunlight, and nutrients. The seed of divine life in our souls also needs three things in order to grow to maturity: to know, love, and imitate Christ a little bit more every day. The more fully we come to know Christ, especially through prayerful reading of the Gospels and time spent with him in the Holy Eucharist, the more we will come to love him. And the more we love him, the more we will want to follow and imitate him, especially in his perfect fulfillment of the Father's will and his tireless, active love for all people. If we let these three motifs of knowing, loving, and imitating Christ set the rhythm for our daily living, we too can please the heart of God and be filled to overflowing with his life-giving love, just like our Lord. Today, as Jesus renews his commitment to us in this Mass, let us thank him for coming down to our level and taking our place, and let us renew our commitment to our life-mission of holiness and apostolate.

As young Catholics, we learned in our religious education about the sacraments. We learned which ones we must receive and those we can receive. There seemed to be a general order of receipt of the sacraments, basically beginning with Baptism followed by Reconciliation, Eucharist, Confirmation, Matrimony or Holy Orders, and Anointing of the Sick. In our faith, we generally baptize babies, and at least in smaller parishes, baptisms take place one or two at a time. It is a special time and can be a private family event or involve the congregation.

When Jesus was baptized, He was an adult of 30 years among a crowd of sinners. Jesus of course knew how His life would play out and why He, the son of God, was there with criminals, murderers, thieves and other sinners. Jesus planned to be like those he was to redeem. After all, Jesus had no sin, and thus no need to be baptized. The crowd suspected nothing unusual about this baptism, until the radiant light of the Holy Spirit hovered over the place of Jesus' baptism and the voice of His Father was heard. As Jesus was called to be like humanity at the time of His baptism, through baptism we are called to become children of God.

Father Tony's Corner



Saint Luke tells us that at the time of Jesus' baptism, which marked the beginning of his public ministry, the people were 'filled with expectation'. There were two reasons for this. First, rumor had it that according to the prophecies of Daniel, the time was ripe for the arrival of the promised Messiah, the King anointed by God to restore the independence and greatness of the long-suffering people of Israel. Scholars at the time did not agree about the actual characteristics and identifying marks of that Messiah, but a sense that the time had come was widespread. Second, no true prophet had arisen in Israel in over two centuries. And so, when John the Baptist came onto the scene, they knew something big was afoot. Many hoped that he himself was the Messiah. The prophecy of Daniel and the preaching of John the Baptist, then, were clear, dramatic signs sent by God to indicate the coming of Jesus. Even so, Christ found a welcome in only a few hearts; the majority gave him up to be crucified. Why? Could it be that the people of Israel were expecting one kind of Lord, and God wanted to give them another? We often fall into the same trap; we know clearly the things we want, but God sends us others, and we resent it. But if Jesus is truly the Lord, and if the greatest prophet of all time was not even worthy to 'loosen the thongs of his sandals' (a job reserved to slaves at the time), why do we expect him to do things our way? God often acts in unexpected ways, so it is up to us to adjust our expectations, or else we may miss his grace altogether. By being baptized, even though he had no need to be cleansed from sin himself, Jesus takes our place. And we in turn, when we are baptized, are called to take Jesus' place. The sacrament of baptism, then, is the gateway to the rest of Christian life. From the moment of baptism, our life-mission no longer consists of mundane things like becoming successful in the eyes of the world, making a lot of money, become famous and powerful, or maximizing our experience of life's pleasures. Those are the life-goals of pagans. But we who are Christians have two very different life-goals, and all our other activities are directed towards achieving them. First, holiness. Holiness is God's word for happiness. It consists first in following the moral law that God built into human nature – the ten commandments and the moral teachings of the Church. And secondly, pursuing holiness also involves growing in our friendship with Jesus Christ through daily prayer, the sacraments, and our efforts to follow his example. This pursuit of holiness is the primary life-goal of every Christian, not just priests, monks, and nuns. But in addition to pursuing
