THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

First Reading: Isaiah 35:1-6a, 10

Isaiah tells us that when Christ comes, the weak will be made strong, the deaf will hear, the blind will see, and, above all, "sorrow and mourning will flee."

Second Reading: James 5:7-10

As the farmer waits patiently through winter and spring for the "yield of the soil" so, too, must we wait patiently for the coming of the Messiah.

Gospel: Matthew 11:2-11

While in prison, John sends a messenger to Jesus to ask, "Are you He who is to come or do we look for another?" Jesus replies by citing the miracles he has performed for the blind, the deaf, and the crippled. He concludes by identifying John as the messenger He has sent to prepare the way.

THE "O" ANTIPHONS OF ADVENT

The Sacred Liturgy notes a shift in emphasis on December 17th. Up until now, a primary theme has been preparing for the *Second* Coming of Christ at the end of the world. The color purple reminded us to reform our lives and to do penance. Now, on December 17th, the "O" Antiphons focus us on a preparation to remember and celebrate the *First* Coming of the Lord at Christmas.

The Roman Church has been singing the "O" Antiphons since at least the 8th century. They are the antiphons that accompany the *Magnificat* canticle of Evening Prayer from Dec. 17-23. They provide a magnificent meditation that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah. The popular hymn, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" is based on these texts.

THE "O" ANTIPHONS OF ADVENT

December 17 Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge! **December 18** O Leader of the House of Israel, giver of the Law to Moses on Sinai: come to rescue us with your mighty power! **December 19** O Root of Jesse's stem, sign of God's love for all his people: come to save us without delay! December 20 O Key of David, opening the gates of God's eternal Kingdom: come and free the prisoners of darkness! December 21 O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death.

December 22 O King of all nations and keystone of the Church: come and save man, whom you formed from the dust!

December 23 O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law: come to save us, Lord our God!
