All Chings Considered

The beginnings of an Annual (Arch)diocesan Campaign go back to 1920 when Bishop Michael Gallagher was building Sacred Heart Seminary.

Citing a "grave shortage of priests" in Michigan, Bishop Gallagher called on Catholics at that time to raise \$4 million to build a new seminary. That's about \$60.3 million today. "New parishes cannot be established, new churches cannot be built, until the supply of priests is augmented," noted a 1920 advertisement for the Sacred Heart Seminary Campaign.

On the outskirts of the city at that time, seventeen acres at the corner of Joy Road and Linwood Avenues were selected. Bishop Gallagher never dreamt small, so he engaged one of Detroit's preeminent architectural firms of that time, Donaldson & Meier.

Work began in 1921. Then, in the presence of what *The Detroit Free Press* claimed was "an incredible 100,000 people," the cornerstone-laying ceremony took place in 1923. The gigantic complex housing 400 seminarians would open in 1924. It remains in service now not only as a seminary, but also a graduate house of theology for a wide range of students.

This past Saturday, the Baccalaureate Mass followed by the Commencement Exercises was celebrated

there. Three of the 105 receiving degrees this year will go on to ordination in service as priests in the Archdiocese of Detroit.

Without any surprise, the operation of Sacred Heart Major Seminary still commands a significant amount of the financial resources of local Catholics. While the students of the Sacred Heart are no longer on a single path to priesthood, the school serves as a source of higher theological training for parish ministers who fill jobs in the Catholic Church all over the country. Sacred Heart has survived at a time when many other seminaries have folded – including some prestigious European ones like Louvain.

Think about the sacrifices of generations of Detroit Catholics for our Seminary over past years, and add your sacrifice when it comes to this year's Catholic Services Appeal.

Although Sacred Heart Seminary now houses all sorts of activities, I'd venture a guess that only a small percentage of Catholics living in Southeastern Michigan have ever been inside its doors. I'd like to add the Seminary onto one of our future Motor City Makeover Tours.

When that happens you will be taken by its impressive Neo-Gothic architecture and seemingly endless hallways of Pewabic tile connecting classrooms, student housing, faculty residences, gymnasium, an auditorium seating six hundred, two libraries, dining facilities, two small chapels and one grand chapel located in the center of the complex with German stained glass, a Casavant pipe organ and a hand-carved altar reredos from Oberammergau.

At its opening, Sacred Heart also housed a convent of sisters to staff an infirmary. It even had its own barber shop, music practice rooms, a radio studio, motion picture projection abilities, and its own power-generating plant. You can see its Gothic tower

from downtown Detroit and vice-versa.

An interesting aside, is that while Sacred Heart Seminary was being built, our founding pastor – P.J. Cullinane – contracted Donaldson and Meier to build our parish church building. While that firm built hundreds of structures across the country, they only built two in the Tudor/Gothic Collegiate Style. Sacred Heart and St. Ambrose. Ours is a chip off the old block.

We'd like to get going on this year's Catholic Services Appeal as soon as possible. Our share of the tab for 2023 is \$97,755. Raising that kind of cash at a time when attendance is down and when we're engaged in our own restoration of our Donaldson & Meier church building and Casavant pipe organ is a challenge.

But let's be clear about a couple of things. Although I've focused on buildings in this column today when about the CSA, overwhelmingly, those funds are earmarked for people and outreach ministries. That breakdown you'll find on the previous page. What you will never see are any CSA funds going towards the settlement of any lawsuits involving the AoD, its priests or employees.

We had hoped to already have a letter out to you asking for your support in the 2023 CSA. But some essential materials like the pledge cards were not yet printed by the Archdiocese. (Seems like they are surprised every year about the timing.) When we receive what we need, we'll get it out to you quickly by direct and electronic mail. Your response can be by mail or electronically.

Over the past three years, the AoD wanted to help by taking over the CSA solicitations. Their handling of it

left a lot to be desired. So, since the parish is going to be on the hook for the CSA quota no matter what kind of program the Archdiocese runs, a few pastors (priests in solidum) like me have opted to do the campaign in-house like we successfully have for decades.

I already know that there will be some overlap and confusion. There always has been with the CSA office. I can't guarantee that you won't also get a solicitation from the AoD in addition to one from the parish. The AoD and the parish will both print a QR Code for you to use. One will take you to their website, the other to ours.

We think that we can give you more personal attention if you channel your gifts to the CSA through St. Ambrose. You certainly can use the Archdiocesan mail and electronic addresses. Eventually everything, as long as it is clearly marked with "St. Ambrose," will end up in our tally. And since all contributions for the CSA are still sent out of state to post (for some strange reason) it often takes weeks for checks to get cashed and credited toward our goal. Please be patient.

In his letter from May 1920, asking for support for the first diocesan-wide appeal, Bishop Gallagher wrote:

"If God has been good to you, now is the time and occasion to do something handsome for Him. Today God asks you for His interest. What you may have accumulated of this world's goods in the past years is yours only in virture of His Divine providence. In the same generous spirit, return to Him a proportionate share of those blessings. Make your contribution a spiritual investment that will pay you good dividends of an imperishable nature ..."

Our Casavant will find the right musician

The Casavant at St. Ambrose Church in Detroit/Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan has 36 ranks of pipes on three manuals and pedal, with two expressive divisions. Designed in the English style and Installed in the 1940s, its warm and colorful tone palette serves the needs of the Sacred Liturgy admirably. The Parish has embarked on an organ restoration program and is looking for a part-time Minister of Music to help guide that restoration and to assume the duties of three weekend masses, with cantors at each. Additionally, one choir rehearsal is expected when in season. Holydays are integral to the contract.

St. Ambrose has for decades maintained an eclectic programming style which assimilates many different musical styles. A music minister should be willing to work in tandem with the pastoral staff to create a pleasing, varied and engaging musical program. This position would work for a musician who has other employment during weekdays, since funerals and weddings are extraneous to this contract. We believe that the Casavant will find the right musician. Pay commensurate with experience. Start date is July 1, 2023 or earlier.



Faith Formation Station

May is a month dedicated to Mary in a special way. It is customary to honor Mary with special devotions during the course of this month. On Mother's Day, we celebrate not only our own mothers and the special women in our lives, we Catholics remember Mary, the Mother of all Humankind.

While we may not be in a formal classroom during the summer months ahead, every day brings us opportunities to learn and grow in our faith and to live the teachings of Jesus about love, compassion, forgiveness, generosity, and justice. I want to thank our dedicated catechists whose ministry is one of dedication, faithfulness, patience, kindness, and love. 
Our Dead
