THE EASTER SEASON

The Great Feast of Easter, which is fifty days in length, invites Catholics to practice in their daily lives the joy of the resurrection. In the readings during the season, we hear stories of the risen Lord appearing to disciples in the garden tomb and on the road to Emmaus, in the upper room and on the shore of the sea.

Jesus appears to His disciples for forty days before His Ascension, to ensure that the newly formed Church is alive in her faith.

Although Jesus does not appear to us in bodily form, the Resurrection is just as real for us as it was on the first Easter morning.

We are an Easter people. We pattern our lives on the Paschal Mystery and testify that no sin and suffering can destroy the sift of life God promises us in Christ Jesus. These fifty days are an opportunity for us and the whole Church to radiate the inexpressible joy of Easter to a world waiting for peace together with Easter hope that crowns the season at the celebration of Pentecost.

There is no evil to be faced that Christ does not face with us. There is no enemy that Christ has not already conquered. There is no cross to bear that Christ has not already borne for us, and does not now bear with us. And on the far side of every cross we find the newness of life in the Holy Spirit, that new life which will reach its fulfillment in the resurrection. This is our faith. This is our witness before the world.

REFLECTIONS FROM CATHERINE DOHERTY ON GOSSIP



A person who is a gossip is a frustrated personality, often a mousy creature who passes unnoticed, but actually craves to be the *center of attention*, at the price of anybody's reputation. It is a pathological state. It is the only sin for which the Church demands public restitution, the only way to restore a reputation is to publicly announce that the gossip is untrue. It is interesting to note that in civil law, one can sue a person for defamation of character, that is for gossip. *Listening to gossip is participating in it.* If there were no listeners, there would be no gossip.


I presume that you will not participate in gossip, and I suggest that you do what I try to do when people gossip. I have to listen, because I cannot stop other people from talking, though I try. However, if this is impossible, then I simply say nothing. This usually acts like a cold shower. Definitely I never show any *curiosity*. I listen with a bored face which at least stems the flow of the gossip. At the end of the story I usually try in some gentle, charitable way to minimize the whole affair. I try to say something good about the person, and gently to point out about the evil of gossip.

APRIL - MONTH OF THE HOLY EUCHARIST

To St. John Paul II, it is not enough for Catholics to receive the Eucharist. One also must contemplate it. He said that when one ponders the love that is present in the tabernacle:

". . . love is ignited within us, love is renewed within us. Therefore, these are not hours spent in idleness, when we isolate ourselves from our work, but these are moments, hours, when we undertake something that constitutes the deepest meaning of all of our work. For no matter how numerous our activities, our ministries, however numerous our concerns, our exertions – if there is no love, everything becomes meaningless.

When we devote our time to ponder the mystery of love, to allow it to radiate in our hearts, we are preparing ourselves in the best possible way for any kind of service, for any activity, for any charitable work."

BLACK is for the sky when He died on the Cross, suffering to redeem our loss.


PINK, YELLOW, and ORANGE are for the dawn on the morn when His tomb was empty and hope was reborn



ST. PEREGRINE LAZIOSI, OSM

In 1283 Saint Philip, Prior General of the Friar Servants of Saint Mary, attempted to lead back to obedience to the Apostolic See the citizens of Forli then under interdict. He was driven out of the city with insults and violence. While this true follower of Christ was praying for his persecutors, one of the crowd, an eighteen year old by the name of Peregrine of the famous Laziosi family, repented and humbly asked Philip for forgiveness. The holy Father received him with love. From that moment the young man began to scorn the vanities of the world and to pray most fervently to the Blessed Virgin, asking that she show him the way of salvation. A few years later, guided by the Virgin, he received the habit of Our Lady in the priory of Siena where he dedicated himself to her service. There, together with Blessed Francis of Siena, he committed himself totally to the Servite life.



After some years he was sent back to Forli where, because of his love for God and Our Lady, he gave himself to the recitation of psalms, hymns and prayers, and to meditation on the law of God. On fire with love for others, he lavished a wealth of charity on the poor. It is said that he miraculously multiplied grain and wine during a severe shortage in his area.

Above all else, he was outstanding in his love for penance; in tears, he would reflect on the errors which he thought he had made and would frequently confess to the priest. He afflicted his body with various forms of mortification: when tired he would support himself on a choir stall or a rock; when overcome by sleep, he preferred the bare earth to a bed. As a result of this type of life, at the age of sixty he suffered from varicose veins which degenerated into cancer of the right leg.

His condition deteriorated to the point that a physician, Paolo Salazio, who visited him in the priory, decided, with the consent of all the friars, to amputate the leg as soon as possible. The night before the operation Peregrine dragged himself before the crucifix in the chapter room. There he became drowsy and seemed to see Jesus descend from the cross to heal his leg. The following day, the doctor arrived to perform the amputation but could find no sign of the cancer, or even of a wound. He was so shocked that he spread the news of the miracle throughout the town. This only increased the people's veneration of Peregrine. The saint died of a fever about 1345 when he was almost eighty years old. An extraordinary number of people from the town and countryside honored him in death. Some of the sick who came were healed through his intercession.

His body rests in the Servite church of Forli where it is greatly honored by the people. Pope Paul V declared him blessed in 1609 and Pope Benedict XIII canonized him in 1726.

The sick do not suffer alone. All of us, by our crosses and trials, can assume an active role in the work of redemption.

In conjunction with the National Shrine of St. Peregrine at the Basilica of Our Lady of Sorrows in Chicago, Holy Innocents has a small pilgrim image of "the Cancer Saint" to travel to the homes of our parishioners who suffer from cancer or other serious life-threatening illnesses such as AIDS, their loved ones, caregivers and health care providers. If you would like to welcome this special image to your home for a week or more of prayer, please contact the parish office. Included with the image are prayer cards and leaflets as well as petition slips which you can mail to the Shrine in Chicago.

At The Church of The Holy Innocents, we invite you to name your child(ren) and to have the opportunity to have your baby's name inscribed in our "BOOK OF LIFE". Here, a candle is always lit in their memory. All day long people stop to pray. On the first Monday of every month, our 12:15pm Mass is celebrated in honor of these children and for the comfort of their families. We pray that you will find peace in knowing that your child(ren) will be remembered at the Shrine and honored by all who pray here.

We will inscribe the names of babies who have died before and at birth in our Book of Life, and as always, we invite you to visit the Shrine if you are in New York City.
