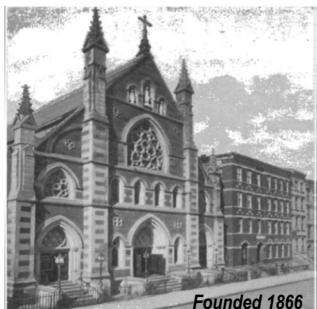

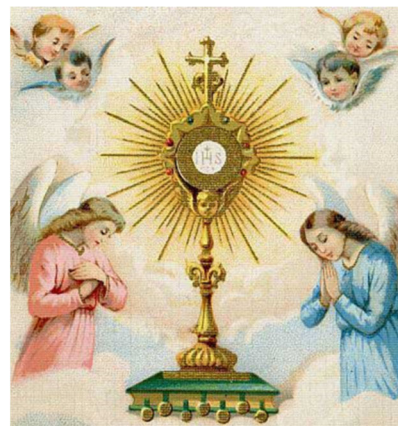

THE ICON OF BLESSED CHARLES DE FOUCAULD



Blessed Charles de Foucauld is represented on this icon, one hand holding a bead of his rosary, the other a scroll with the words: "Father, do with me what you will" (from his prayer of abandonment published in last week's bulletin).

Behind him is the desert and his hermitage. The mountains are done in an iconographic manner. They give a rhythm to the background.

Notice the inverse perspective of the building and the rocks. It makes them appear as if they are coming towards us, this means that God is coming to us through the icon. He reveals Himself to us. When we are in the middle of a straight road and are looking towards the end of it, we see a dot at the horizon. We are at the wider part, and the more we forget ourselves, the world becomes smaller around us (visually speaking, of course). The inverse perspective puts us at the smaller point, and the more we look at the Lord, He becomes larger and infinite, He is incomprehensible, deeper, immense and unfathomable in His love.

The border of the icon is traditionally dark red, symbol of the blood of the lamb applied on the doorposts and the lintel of every house, a sign of protection of every first-born (Ex 12, 1-13).

on Sunday, October 13 following the Sermon at the 10:30 a.m. High Mass. On that day the icon will be exposed in the church for the veneration of the faithful from 8:00 a.m. After its consecration, Holy Mass will be offered on top of the icon and the faithful will be invited to venerate it following Mass. On Monday, October 14 the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed on the icon for the usual time of adoration, completing the consecration ritual.

THE VEIL

St. Linus, the second Pope, forbade women to enter a church with uncovered heads. The Church has never changed its teaching concerning women wearing the veil. In Canon 27 of the New Code of Canon Law we read: "Custom is the best interpreter of law." The veil has two thousand years of being a custom to its credit. Women are wearing the veil because they have seen the disastrous effect of radical feminism and are trying to return to some form of tradition and reverence. Some wear the veil to express submission. Others wear the veil to show a sign of reverence in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. To be sure, the veil creates a distinct look of femininity that is reserved only for the house of God. Behind the wearing of the veil is the individual effort to offer a truly feminine spirituality to God, whom they are trying to serve and honor in a more perfect way. St. Paul. In his First Letter to the Corinthians, Chapter 11:5-7, states: "Every man praying or prophesying with his head covered, disgraceth his head. But every woman praying or prophesying with her head not covered, disgraceth her head: for it is all one as if she were shaven. For if a woman be not covered, let her be shorn. But if it be a shame to a woman to be shorn or made bald, let her cover her head." Jesuit Fr. John Hardon, whose Cause of Canonization has been introduced said that women should still be wearing the veil in church. And Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen in his book ***Three to Get Married*** calls it a Divine Prohibition for women to appear in church with their heads uncovered! Women, if you are wearing the veil, continue to wear it with pride! If you are not, please consider doing so.

APOSTOLIC LETTER
ROSARIUM VIRGINIS MARIAE
OF THE SUPREME PONTIFF
JOHN PAUL II
TO THE BISHOPS, CLERGY
AND FAITHFUL
ON THE MOST HOLY ROSARY
October 16, 2002

The Rosary of the Virgin Mary, which gradually took form in the second millennium under the guidance of the Spirit of God, is a prayer loved by countless Saints and encouraged by the Magisterium. Simple yet profound, it still remains, at the dawn of this third millennium, a prayer of great significance, destined to bring forth a harvest of holiness. It blends easily into the spiritual journey of the Christian life, which, after two thousand years, has lost none of the freshness of its beginnings and feels drawn by the Spirit of God to “set out into the deep” (*duc in altum!*) in order once more to proclaim, and even cry out, before the world that Jesus Christ is Lord and Saviour, “the way, and the truth and the life” (*Jn 14:6*), “the goal of human history and the point on which the desires of history and civilization turn”.

The Rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christocentric prayer. In the sobriety of its elements, it has all the *depth of the Gospel message in its entirety*, of which it can be said to be a compendium. It is an echo of the prayer of Mary, her perennial *Magnificat* for the work of the redemptive Incarnation which began in her virginal womb. With the Rosary, the Christian people *sits at the school of Mary* and is led to contemplate the beauty on the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love. Through the Rosary the faithful receive abundant grace, as though from the very hands of the Mother of the Redeemer.

The Rosary, precisely because it starts with Mary's own experience, is *an exquisitely contemplative prayer*. Without this contemplative dimension, it would lose its meaning, as Pope Paul VI clearly pointed out: “Without contemplation, the Rosary is a body without a soul, and its recitation runs the risk of becoming a mechanical repetition of formulas, in violation of the admonition of Christ: ‘In praying do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think they will be heard for their many words’ (*Mt 6:7*). By its nature the recitation of the Rosary calls for a quiet rhythm and a lingering pace, helping the individual to meditate on the mysteries of the Lord's life as seen through the eyes of her who was closest to the Lord. In this way the unfathomable riches of these mysteries are disclosed”.

OCTOBER 2019 - EXTRAORDINARY MISSIONARY MONTH

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

For the month of October 2019, I have asked that the whole Church revive her missionary awareness and commitment as we commemorate the centenary of the Apostolic Letter *Maximum Illud* of Pope Benedict XV (30 November 1919). Its farsighted and prophetic vision of the apostolate has made me realize once again the importance of renewing the Church's missionary commitment and giving fresh evangelical impulse to her work of preaching and bringing to the world the salvation of Jesus Christ, who died and rose again.

The title of the present Message is the same as that of October's Missionary Month: *Baptized and Sent: The Church of Christ on Mission in the World*. Celebrating this month will help us first to rediscover the missionary dimension of our faith in Jesus Christ, a faith graciously bestowed on us in baptism. Our filial relationship with God is not something simply private, but always in relation to the Church.

Through our communion with God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, we, together with so many of our other brothers and sisters, are born to new life. This divine life is not a product for sale - we do not practice proselytism - but a treasure to be given, communicated and proclaimed: that is the meaning of mission. We received this gift freely and we share it freely (*cf. Mt 10:8*), without excluding anyone. God wills that all people be saved by coming to know the truth and experiencing his mercy through the ministry of the Church, the universal sacrament of salvation (*cf. 1 Tim 2:4; Lumen Gentium, 48*).

The Church is on mission in the world. Faith in Jesus Christ enables us to see all things in their proper perspective, as we view the world with God's own eyes and heart. Hope opens us up to the eternal horizons of the divine life that we share. Charity, of which we have a foretaste in the sacraments and in fraternal love, impels us to go forth to the ends of the earth (*cf. Mic 5:4; Mt 28:19; Acts 1:8; Rom 10:18*).

A Church that presses forward to the farthest frontiers requires a constant and ongoing missionary conversion. How many saints, how many men and women of faith, witness to the fact that this unlimited openness, this going forth in mercy, is indeed possible and realistic, for it is driven by love and its deepest meaning as gift, sacrifice and gratuitousness (*cf. 2 Cor 5:14-21*)! The man who preaches God must be a man of God (*cf. Maximum Illud*).

This missionary mandate touches us personally: I am a mission, always; you are a mission, always; every baptized man and woman is a mission. People in love never stand still: they are drawn out of themselves; they are attracted and attract others in turn; they give themselves to others and build relationships that are life-giving. As far as God's love is concerned, no one is useless or insignificant. Each of us is a mission to the world, for each of us is the fruit of God's love. Even if parents can betray their love by lies, hatred and infidelity, God never takes back his gift of life. From eternity he has destined each of his children to share in his divine and eternal life (*cf. Eph 1:3-6*).
