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LIVING OUR FAITH

Today we begin a new liturgical year. Marking time through the liturgical year is an important part of our Christian journey, as it allows us to more deeply align our hearts and minds with Christ and enter more fully into the paschal mystery. It is important to remember that the waiting we experience now during this time of preparation for the coming of God is intimately connected to not only Christmas, but also the whole of Christ's life, death and resurrection.

The gospel today reminds us that as Christians we wait for something more than the celebration of the historical coming of Christ at Christmas. Jesus tells his disciples that a day will come when all must stand before the Son of Man. Like the disciples, we too wait for the coming of Christ at the end of time, time where sin, fear, and injustice will be no more. This waiting is an important part of the twofold nature of Advent.

Questions for the week: If we view "justice" as safety and security, how is it present in your own family and community? Is our parish a "just" place for parishioners? How does putting a priority on love contribute to a nation of safety and security?




The St. Andrew Christmas Novena, traditionally prayed 15x per day from November 30th - Christmas

Around the Advent Circle

November 28, 2021 • First Sunday of Advent • Year C

Be alert at all times.

—Luke 21:36

OPENING PRAYER

Reader: We gather together to begin a new

church year as Advent begins.

All: Lord, thank you for this time to slow down and reflect during this busy season.

Reader: We gather to reflect on how we might live this

coming month more intentionally.

All: Lord, help us to hear what your invitation is to us this Advent.

Reader: We gather so that we can support one another on our Advent journeys.

All: Lord, help us to be your presence to each other. Amen.

SHARING

Thanksgiving has passed, but we still have a long holiday season ahead of us. Our society wants us to jump right to Christmas, but as Catholics we have the four week Advent season to immerse ourselves in before we come to December 25. This period can be a welcome excuse to remove ourselves from some of the unrealistic expectations of the culture we live in. Secular society fills these weeks with extra social obligations, over-eating and drinking, consuming and spending beyond our needs, and all-around over-indulgence. By honoring the quieter spirit of the season of Advent, we can arrive at Christmas more centered and grounded than in the past when we may have spent December rushing to keep up with everything around us.

- How do you feel as we begin Advent now? Overwhelmed? Somber? Contemplative? Hopeful? Why?
- What are your hopes for how you would like to experience Advent this year? Is there anything different you are hoping to do than in past years?
- What are you looking for in this time of prayer and reflection with this group?



LISTENING:

1 THESSALONIANS 3:12-4:2

May the Lord make you increase and abound in love.

As a flawed human like all of us, St. Paul displayed a wide range of emotions in his many letters to the church communities he started in the decades after Jesus' resurrection. Just as we sometimes shoot off a text or email in the heat of the moment, so did Paul, only with a quill and scroll. Some of his writings were full of frustration, impatience, and even outright anger. At other times we can hear his hopefulness, affection, and gratitude for the people to whom he is writing—just as we send similar texts when we are feeling the love. Such is the case in the passage we read today from 1 Thessalonians.

The first half of this passage is Paul's prayer for the Christian community in Thessalonica. The Thessalonians are lucky to be on the receiving end of his prayers for an increase in love for one another and a strengthening of their hearts. Fortunately, we believe in something called "the communion of saints," that all good people who have gone home to God before us continue to pray for our well-being and growth. So St. Paul's prayer of 2,000 years ago is a prayer for us, too.

The second half of this passage is Paul's plea to his readers to continue living as Jesus taught and to strive to do so even more. These verses encourage us to do the same. Most likely we do live good lives in general, but we know that we can always do better and become more Christ-like.

SHARING

- In what ways would you like to see your love for others increase and abound during this Advent season?
- In what relationships or areas of your life are you doing well in striving to act like Jesus? (It's okay to acknowledge these—it doesn't have to be bragging!)
- Are there one or more people you can commit to praying for this Advent season, either for an increase in love and "heart" strength or something else? Who are they?

REFLECTION: LUKE 21:25-28, 34-36

Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life, and that day does not catch you unexpectedly, like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. Be alert at all times...

Advent always begins with a Gospel reading in which Jesus tells his listeners to be on guard, alert, and watchful. In that context, Jesus was referring to his Second Coming and the end of the world as we know it. (The Gospel writers and Jesus' followers were certain Jesus meant this would happen in their lifetimes.) Two thousand years later, we don't usually assume that the world will end at any moment, so what are we to be vigilant and on guard for?

We may not be worried about the apocalypse happening tomorrow, but we can still take Jesus' words to heart because none of us know when we or our loved ones will die. Anyone who has ever received the news of a scary medical diagnosis or had a friend or relative receive one will recognize how quickly it can change our perspective. Unimportant things that we spent our time on suddenly don't seem very important in light of the love we want to give and receive before death occurs.

If our hearts are confused with distractions (read: wasting time on social media, watching Netflix, overeating or drinking, or generally living in a frenzy doing less-than-meaningful things), Jesus wants us to reevaluate how we spend our time. There are children to read to and tuck into bed, aging parents and relatives who long for our companionship, friends to re-connect with, grudges and past hurts to be reconciled. Hungry people

need food today, homeless men and women are longing housring, respect, and dignity, and sick and lonely people need someone to reach out to them. How would Jesus want us to spend our time if we were to die tomorrow? Let's be alert to that.

SHARING

- Have you ever had a significant life event that drastically changed your perspective on what is important and what isn't? Please share.
- In what ways have you slipped into "drowsiness," distraction, or a pattern of wasting time on unimportant matters which you would like to change?
- What do you want to be more vigilant about this upcoming week? How do you think Jesus is inviting you to spend your valuable time and energy?

CLOSING PRAYER

Reader: Gracious God, we thank you for this time to reflect on your Word in

scripture.

All: Help us to slow down and notice you this Advent season.

Reader: Give us the grace to be more aware of your presence.

All: May we be more in tune with how you want us to use our time and energy.

Reader: Grant that we may be more alert to the chances we have to love others and receive their love. We ask this all in Iesus' name.

All: Amen.

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
