LIVING OUR FAITH

"If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it; if one part is honored, all the parts share its joy." These words from our second reading remind us of our intricate and intimate interconnectedness with others and all of God's creation. There is power and strength in community. If we are willing to accept help from others during our difficult times, we must also stand ready to help others when they experience challenges and hardship. We cannot opt into community when it is convenient. Rather, part of living and working in communion with others is recognizing that we all succeed together or fail together.

Part of the communal reality is recognizing our gifts. When we can name our strengths without self-absorption or false humility, we are able to better recognize how we can use these gifts for the service of others. St. Paul writes, "God placed the parts, each one of them, in the body as he intended." When each person uses their individual gifts for the common good, the community grows and flourishes. The same is true for the working of our human body.

Today's gospel offers an example of this, as we hear the very beginning of St. Luke's writings. Luke tells us that he, like others before him, has compiled a narrative of the life of Jesus. Luke relies on the witness of others in the construction of this story; he himself was not an eyewitness. Rather, St. Luke uses the gifts God has given him to listen to the stories of those who walked and talked and ate with Jesus so that he may compile them for Theophilus and future generations. How do we us our own gifts and talents to share the life of Jesus with others?

Questions for the week: If someone were writing the story of your life, what sources would you want them to look at? Journals? Interviews with family members? Social media? Why? Why not? If you were sitting in the synagogue when your neighbor Jesus stood up and read this passage from Isaiah, how do you think you would react?

Provide for them love and support from those around them to help ease the burden they carry at this time. Help them to see the light of Your face and Your joy.


Delight in them and their child and grant them a spirit of wisdom and understanding to direct their path.



WHO WAS PAUL?

St. Paul was formerly known as Saul, a violent persecutor of the Lord's disciples. On his way to arrest them in Damascus, the risen Christ appeared to him in a brilliant light and said: "Saul, Saul why do you persecute me?" Saul was blinded by the light that was Christ. He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" and he was replied, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting." Following his baptism Paul became a powerful witness to Christ and established many Christian communities. He was martyred in Rome in the 60s AD.

"I am grateful to Christ Jesus our Lord, who has strengthened me, because he judged me faithful and appointed me to his service, even though I was formerly a blasphemer, a persecutor, and a man of violence ... The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the foremost. But for that very reason I received mercy, so that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display the utmost patience, making me an example to those who would come to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honour and glory forever and ever. Amen." -St. Paul (1TIMOTHY 1:12-17)


