LIVING OUR FAITH

We know from the creation stories in the Book of Genesis that God breathed life into God's people. In the same way, Jesus breathes on his disciples when he greets them in the locked room. Life comes from God and we see throughout today's gospel, where Jesus is named and claimed as God.

We hear at the end of today's gospel the purpose for writing it: "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son if God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name." St. John makes it very clear that life in Christ is what the gospel is all about.

From the very beginning of his gospel, St. John lets us know that Jesus is the Son of God, the Word that was from the beginning. Today's gospel puts that truth in the flesh, in a lived context. In his profession of faith, Thomas makes a clear and concise Christological statement, based not on theological discourses but in relationship and belief: "My Lord and my God!" What an incredibly powerful "end" to the story.

Questions for the week: Have you ever experienced a miracle or something miraculous in your life? When you are feeling anxious, do you focus on solving the problem leading to your anxiety, or do you focus on finding peace in the situation? How might finding peace before all else benefit you?


ONE MILLION ROSARIES FOR UNBORN BABIES

If you are unable to join us physically, please join us in prayer from wherever you are! Thank you.






