





TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — God did not make death, nor does God rejoice in the destruction of the living (Wisdom 1:13-15; 2:23-24).

Greetings from Rome! For the first part of my vacation, I am taking a course on postulation, which is the canonical or legal process for recommending someone for sainthood. The course, which begins today (Tuesday), will be three days of intensive workshops that should be very interesting and useful.

WHEN DID I GET A DEMOTION?: As people of faith, we believe in the dignity of every human being, and we base this belief on the Bible itself. Genesis 1:26 explains why we believe that every human being, including those in the womb, deserve to be respected, protected and nurtured:

“God created humankind in his image; in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.”

Every human life is created by God and created in such a way that each of us reflects Him by our nature and is called to mirror Him by the way we live our lives. For this reason, we as Catholics, believe in and strive to preserve the sanctity of all lives, from conception to the end of life. We have a responsibility to take care of these lives because we recognize how precious they are. For this reason, we pray for the protection of the unborn, and participate in the March for Life every January.

Because this ethos is so central to our faith, it also challenges us and convicts us when we look at what is happening on our southern border: children being taken away from their parents and placed in detention centers, without any due process. In these past weeks, I have heard people say, “Well, I blame the parents.” I ask myself, when did we demote the dignity of human beings, and especially children, to the point where we are perfectly fine that they are being used as a punishment for what our own law calls a “misdemeanor”? When did we look at them and say to ourselves that they are no longer human beings, but pawns in a legal game? And when did God say that this was acceptable, just and good?

Please understand that I am not advocating for open borders or closed borders, or any kind of borders. This is not my point. My point is that, in dealing with and solving the situation that we are facing, we

are challenged to do things according to God’s way and God’s vision or suffer the consequences.

As it stands now, it seems that for us, every life is important to us while it is in the womb. Once the child is born, however, we can demote their dignity according to our whim. This makes us hypocrites. Jesus himself is quite clear on this. For example, in Matthew 18:1-8, we read:

At that time the disciples approached Jesus and said, “Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?” and said, “Amen, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. And whoever receives one child such as this in my name receives me. Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone hung around his neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea.”

Jesus draws the line in the sand for us. We are to either choose life, meaning *all* life, or we can choose death: the death of these children’s identities, safety, protection, and family, and the death of our own dignity, our humanity, and our relationship with God. As we face the crisis that has been set before us, which will we choose?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

As Independence Day draws near, we think of the men and women of the military who serve with courage and competence, some far from home. How does the Church accompany them? In 1939, Pope Pius XII created an independent jurisdiction of the Catholic Church called the "Military Vicariate." In 1985 Pope John Paul II created the "Archdiocese for Military Services, USA." Spanning the globe and serving nearly one and a half million Roman Catholics, more than one thousand priests minister in hospitals, on military bases of all the armed forces, on ships at sea, and on the battlefield. The AMS does not ordain priests, but accepts priests on loan from religious orders and dioceses.


In 1824 a Jesuit priest named Adam Marshall enlisted in the Navy and died at sea in 1825. He was assigned as a "schoolmaster," but he sought out and ministered to Catholic sailors. Twenty years later, President Polk was worried that the war with Mexico was seen as anti-Catholic, so he recruited two Jesuit priests to serve in the army as chaplains. At the time of the Civil War, only about ten percent of Americans were Catholic. Military policies forced Catholic soldiers to attend Protestant services. The Church protested this rule, and many priests volunteered to become chaplains. Their witness and the courage of the "Nuns of the Battlefield" (several orders of sisters who assisted Civil War victims) helped temper prejudice against Catholics and pave the way for the life and ministry of this vigorous and unique archdiocese.

We have some schedule changes for our VBS:


