

# Saint George Church - Worcester & Holden April 11, 2021 Second Sunday of Easter



### From Yoor Pastor

First of all, I want to thank those who by way of liturgical ministering, preparing the environment and live-streaming made our

Holy Week and Easter Liturgies possible for all to view. The assistance on the part of all of you helped to make these liturgies spiritually and prayerfully uplifting ceremonies for those who attended these liturgies and those who watched through live-streaming. I also want to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support of our parish through your offertory envelopes whether by submitting them in person at Mass, by either mail or by dropping them off at the rectory. Thank you as well for your cards, gifts and treats during this Easter season. Your generosity this year has been gratefully appreciated.

In the opening pages of a book entitled Finding Christ in the Crisis, What the Pandemic Can Teach Us by Fr. Harrison Ayre and Mr. Michael Heinlein, we are reminded that we are God's people whose spiritual ancestry goes back to ancient Israel. Our spiritual ancestors had their trials, tribulations and sufferings in the hardship, sadness, abandonment and desolation they experienced from the time they left Egypt until the time of Jesus. Over the centuries they directly experienced God's favor in giving them a land of their own as well as the times when they experienced God's displeasure with them and that land was taken from them. They found that when their identity as God's people was shaken and everything they had from God - the Law, the Temple and the Land - was gone, they still had their memory of what they once had. This memory gave them hope in the midst of despair. While there is so much more to the story, we need to see that the Church, as the new Israel, can learn from the lessons of its spiritual ancestor.

Covid-19 has imposed limitations on our worship, but we can find how God is acting in the Church today and look for meaning in our present moment. First, we suddenly saw the things that identify us as Christians taken away. We have seen limited access to the sacraments, reduced attendance at Mass and limitations placed on ministry. Second, this sadness and dejection can bring about another interpretive key from ancient Israel's message for the Church: purification. When the people of Israel were exiled from their homeland, God used this occasion to draw them back to the covenant he made with them, to once again make them see that God called them to be a light to the nations. This same religious experience of deep purification can occur for us.

Fr. Niccolls column continued:

While we lament the loss of the sacramental life, perhaps we can see that God is taking this opportunity to renew our lives and identity in a call for conversion. This purification of the Church today can call us to repentance and a return to the heart of the Christian life, namely a purification and recommitment to the covenant and mission which God established in his Church.

While much seems to have been taken from us, God is still with us, just as he was with the people of ancient Israel. As with them, so too can we can this time as an opportunity to grow in our relationship with God, "for whom all things are possible" (Mt. 19:26). Let us ask ourselves –

What can the temporary loss of the sacraments do to reinvigorate our relationship with God and the Church?

What must we do to reevaluate our relationship with Christ, his Church and his sacraments? Are we truly living the mission for which God has commissioned us?

Over the next few weeks some thoughts from this work will continue to be presented and shared for your thought and reflection about just what the book's title says – "What can the pandemic teach us?"

# An Easter Message from our seminarian, Julio Bonilla

In Exodus 13:3 Moses said to the people, "Remember this day on which you came out of Egypt, out of a house of slavery. For it was with a strong hand the Lord brought you out from there."

Every year Christians commemorate God's saving action in history, beginning with the Hebrew people and ending in our personal and community history through Jesus Christ.

This annual commemoration is not a simple repetition. Rather, it is like a spiral because each year we meditate more and more deeply on God's action in our lives and the transformation that he is making in our way of communicating with others: the personal step from the egocentric "I" to the communal "We".

We must remember that ethics and morals are essential to all areas of the human life, and we cannot exclude them from the saving event that we celebrate in Holy Week, in Sunday Mass, in each daily Eucharist.

The Gospel of Saint John tells us that when Jesus rose again, he stood in the midst of them [the disciples] (Jn 2:19, 26). These biblical passages show us the actions of God. Note that after the fall of our first parents the Ego became the center of our existence. With the resurrection of Jesus, God once again claims his place in human history and in interpersonal relationships, thus making Jesus the center of our life.

All this leads me to think of the resurrection not only as a historical event but also as the transformative act of humanity. It is the claim of God for his place in the center of human life, and at the same time the creative act of God.

With all this in mind, I want to wish you a happy Easter and I invite you to open your hearts to the grace of the Lord and allow yourself to be guided by him from the land of the egocentric "I" to the promised land of community.

Please remember to pray for me.

#### Second Sunday of Easter

At a recent community meeting, many residents were expressing their fears—fears of crime, terrorism, the economy, health care, etc. It seems as though we are controlled by fear. People base their decisions and actions on the negative things that might happen, rather than the positive things that could happen. Such negative thinking only engenders more fear and apprehension, drowning out the possibility of a better, more creative society.

The Apostles lived in fear. They hid in the upper room, wondering what was happening and if they would be the next victims of Roman wrath. They did not yet understand that Jesus had risen from the dead, or that they were about to embark on a mission of teaching the Good News. They could only wonder about what was next. Into this room comes Jesus. He offers them proof of His identity, showing His hands and His side. More so, He reassures them and confers on them the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Whatever we need to overcome our fear, Jesus will provide. The strength we draw from our faith will enable us to accomplish our mission and all that God intends for us to do. We do not have to live in fear. We can become, as St. Francis prayed, instruments of peace, bringing love, joy, light and peace to a world that lives in fear. Be confident and courageous. Act on the truth of the Lord's Resurrection and His promise to be with us always. The peace of the Lord will comfort and guide you.


#### **Divine Mercy Sunday** April 11, 2021




