

From Your Pastor

Jesus' arrival in the Gospel of Mark is about the coming of God's reign. The time has come for all

other kingdom or empires to end. We need to trust this Good News by orienting ourselves to a different direction and renounce all other forms of what can dominate us. There is a need to repent which means to change or transform one's mind. Because Jesus' way is not the way of those in power, there will inevitable be conflict. What we then prepare for and follow is the way of the cross.


Jesus' early disciples responded to his call immediately, not only leaving their business but their families as well. Work and family are structures that support or conventions that govern our lives over time. Mark, in his gospel, tells us that the coming of God's reign requires us to renounce our dependence and ties to ways that sustain us over time because Jesus' way is not a way to ensure continuation of one's life through property and family. It is through the cross.

Here are some questions to reflect upon with this Gospel:

- 1. Today's gospel conveys a sense of urgency of the reign of God. What can you do right now, in this life, today, to bring forth this reign of God? Are you willing to risk leaving something comfortable or predictable in life to follow a way less traveled for the sake of God's reign?
- 2. The example of disciples leaving their friends and family to follow Jesus can be confusing for those committed to living a faithful life with a spouse or children. What might you think that those in this family or community setting might be willing to leave behind so that gift of their lives also share in the mission of ushering in a world toward the beautiful reign of God?

(Perhaps the favorite topic of Fr. Martin's writings is the personal quest for holiness in life and the communion of saints who are ever present to help us in that quest, whether through intercession or example.)

"A young mother...is not meant to be Mother Teresa...She is meant to be a woman who loves her children, loves her husband, loves her friends and neighbors and...her coworkers. She is meant to experience God in her life and in the lives of the people with whom she lives and works. Sometimes this means doing big things with love...Part of this process may mean that this young woman has to let go of the desire to be someone else. Because, in reality, she might be lousy at the type of work that Mother Teresa used to do. To underline the point, Mother Teresa might have been lousy at the work that this working mother is doing!...Most of the problems arise when we begin to believe that we have to be someone *else* to be holy. We use someone else's map to heaven when God has already planted in our soul all the directions we need. When admirers used to visit Calcutta to see Mother Teresa, she would tell many of them, 'Find your own Calcutta.' In other words, bloom where you are planted. Discover sanctity in your own life."

Many dioceses in the United States face significant challenges due to priest shortages, lack of funds, remote geography, or impoverished parishes. The **Catholic Home Missions Appeal**, which began in 1924, supports these dioceses in order to serve the many needs of their parishioners. Home missions are those Latin and Eastern Rite dioceses in the United States, its territories, and former territories that cannot provide basic pastoral services to Catholics without outside help. Currently, over 40% of dioceses are considered home missions.

Home mission dioceses often have Catholic populations distributed across a large geographical area and have few priests to serve them. The Diocese of Amarillo in Texas is a good example. In the Diocese of Armarillo, the diocesan criminal justice ministry answers Christ's call to visit and serve prisoners and patients confined to hospitals. Since 2004, this ministry has expanded to bring the Eucharist, Sacred Scripture, and prayer to inmates of the seven prisons and two large hospitals in the diocese. This ministry of mercy includes retreats during which inmates can encounter the love of Jesus, heal from past failures and wounds, and develop new hope for the future. Many inmates have experienced spiritual conversions that have inspired them to join formation programs and enter the Catholic Church.

The criminal justice ministry is one of many innovative outreach efforts made by dioceses supported by Catholic Home Missions

Tense, but calm, were words used to describe conditions in Medjugorje in early October of 1992. In this tranquil little village it was hard to believe that the fighting was all around us, and we were at such peace.

The little roads and cafes that had been so full of people for the past ten years were now only scattered with a few groups of pilgrims. We sat in the dark on plastic chairs at one of the few cafes still open. Above the hills we could see shells explode and hear gunfire in the distance. To our left sat a group of young Croatian soldiers - teenagers. The one that spoke English explained that the gunfire was nothing to fear. It was, for the most part, the new soldiers practicing in the hills. When we asked why they all had rosary beads around their necks one boy held them up and said, some of us have no weapons, so we take Our Lady with us for protection. He kissed the cross, smiled, and left. It was time for their ten days of duty.

I told this story to my C.C.D. class at St. George's Church, and some of the kids brought their rosary beads the following week. We talked about the importance of praying our rosary, and I told them of our Blessed Mother's request for them to pray it often. Since Fatima, and now in Mejugorje, Mary continues to call us to pray the rosary daily. She tells us that anything is possible with prayer and fasting!

With only twenty minutes left, we hurried into the next room to watch a little video on Medjugorje. Some of the kids slipped their rosary beads around their neck. We talked about some of the signs and wonders our Blessed Mother gives us to let us know she's truly with us - one being changing our rosary beads from silver to gold. At that point they all checked their beads to see what color they were. All were silver.

The kids were able to see only a little of the video when the bell rang for the end of class. We turned the lights on and they started to leave when I heard my name being called. "Look, look, her beads are gold!"

I replied, "Quiet now and get in line." trying to regain control of my class. "But Mrs. Ovian, they really are gold!" they kept shouting. The girl took them from her neck and held them up in front of my face. They looked gold to me, but to be sure, I looked at them in the daylight. I know Mary works fast, but when she graces us with such favors so quickly it still takes me by surprise. Her beads did change and many others have changed since then; some during the video and others when Mary chooses. This phenomenon is a gift for all and is to be shared in faith. Our Blessed Mother continues to call us all back to her son, Jesus.







What is the Mustard Seed Catholic Worker?

The Mustard Seed of Worcester began in 1972 when two Holy Cross College students wanted to make a difference in the lives of the poor. Since then it has continued its main mission of providing a safe place to eat, with kindness and respect, for all who come to the door. The work is inspired by the example of Dorothy Day who began the first "Catholic Worker House of Hospitality" decades ago. The Mustard Seed is not funded by any one religion or group. There is no paid staff.

Since 2014 St. George parish has joined the Mustard Seed Community to serve meals and to provide basic necessities to our neighbors in need. Together as a community of faith we strive to practice the "Works of Mercy", to care for creation and our neighborhood.

Currently, with the help of our community, the Mustard Seed offers a free Medical Clinic, a weekly Food Pantry, basic clothing and hygiene supplies as well as a Christmas Giving Tree gift for guests and families with young children.



Tomorrow January 22 is a day of prayer for "the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion" as per the General Instruction of the Roman Missal #373.

The date is significant as it was January 22, 1973 when the Supreme Court decision made Roe v. Wade legalized the right to abortion in the US for almost fifty years. The reversal of that decision in 2022 by a Supreme Court in Dobbs v. Jackson overturned the earlier decision and places the legislation of abortion law on individual states.

As Catholic catechumen we are taught (paragraph 2270) "Human life must be respected and protected absolutely from the moment of conception. From the first moment of his existence, a human being must be recognized as having the rights of a person - among which is the inviolable right of every innocent being to life."

And to this end the National Day of Prayer is twofold. To extend the faithful together, in large number, in a specific time expressly all praying (1) for the protection of the unborn and (2) to do penance to atone for the violations committed against human dignity.

The website, "My Catholic Life" offers this beautiful prayer to include both;

"Most precious Lord, You dwelt within the womb of your dear mother, sanctifying the womb, and elevating the dignity of all human life. I pray today for the full legal protection of every unborn child. I also pray that every heart that supports abortion will be changed so as to experience the freedom that comes from living in the Truth. I offer to You, this day, all my sufferings and sacrifices to help atone for every violation against human dignity committed through acts of abortion. Please bring healing, hope, and freedom to all. Mother Mary, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You."

A five-year pew research study of those seeking abortions, shows the five most "common factors" given for making the decision as: 40% are not financially prepared; 36% not a suitable time; 31% issues with partner; 29% need to focus on other children and; 20% interfere with future plans.

We are walking in a time of "Synodality". A hopeful time for real change in our Catholic Church. A time of "deepening" and "broadening" our listening to the needs, understanding the connection of scripture and following the Holy Spirit in mission to emerge at impactful change.

On the surface abortion appears to be about choice. The argument being who will make the choice.

With a heart and mind guided by the Holy Spirit, on a mission to do God's will, to move from an earthly world to once focused on Heaven, what can each one of us do to influence the choice?
