

From Your Pastor

In this weekend's Gospel Jesus astonishes the people with his teaching. He teaches with authority

which means that he acts with his own power. This is different from the teaching not only of the scribes but of the prophets as well. The prophets spoke words of God, not their own. If a prophet did not do this, he risked a punishment of death for speaking blasphemy which was imposed by God himself according to the first reading. With Jesus' teaching with authority, everything changes. When Jesus speaks, God acts. When Jesus teaches, his words have power to act. The command of Jesus to the unclean spirit to come out of the person is itself a command that the unclean spirit obeys completely. All of Jesus' words are like that; they are not empty promises but words of authority. We are then invited to put our trust in the God who so loves us that he sent his only Son to speak and act on our behalf and on behalf of our salvation.



(Perhaps the favorite topic of Fr. Martin's writings is the personal quest for holiness in life and the communion of saints who are ever present to help us in that quest, whether through intercession or example.)

"The saints show us that being holy means being ourselves. That's a powerful message to carry to the ends of the earth. And a powerful message to carry to a parish or a school or a retreat house. So, by way of conclusion, how might you increase an understanding and appreciation of the saints in your own spiritual life and in the lives of the people with whom you minister?...First, for your own personal life. Let me give you three easy ways. 1. Read. There are few things more enjoyable than reading a good biography of a saint or soon-to -be-saint. And when faced with a choice between a scholarly treatment over the more fictionalized versions. I'd start with the scholarly one...In scholarly biographies you always find the kinds of things that are left out of some of the pious stories – specifically, places where the saint struggled and felt discouraged...2. Pray. After reading a saint's life it's natural to meditate on his or her life and ask for some intercession. And I have a theory that is unprovable: I think that we start praying to a saint because that saint is already praying for us...meditating on the lives of the saints is one way to enjoy their company. 3. Evangelize. It's fun to introduce other people to the saints.....By introducing them to a saint you are offering them encouragement and help. And it may also help you feel closer to your friends, with whom you can now share your affection for that saint."

Miracles at St. George, "My Mary Stories" - Susan Ovian, Part 4 Page 7 and 8: "My Holy Rocks", Booklet can be found in the Mary Chapel

Occasionally I open my holy drawer to check out my Medjugorje souvenirs gathered from my trip there in October of 1992. Consisting mostly of dried twigs, leaves and little rocks, they don't look very special, but I found out that they are.

I knew they were holy because I took them from Apparition Hill, the spot where the Blessed Mother first appeared to the children back in 1981 with messages for the world. This time when I opened the plastic bag I kept them in, I noticed something unusual. They smelled like flowers, fields of them! I took them out and smelled each one separately. Even the tiniest one had an overpowering fragrance. I had heard of things like this happening to other people, but would the Blessed Mother actually be doing this for me? Still clutching the rocks in my hand, I went next door. Casually I asked my neighbor to look at the rocks. Without hesitation he asked, "Why do they smell like roses?".

The next week I flew to Florida to visit my Dad. I was sure Mary's plan was to deepen my father's faith with my holy rocks.

After two hours stuck in the middle seat on a full flight, I reached in my travel bag for my rocks. I wanted to make sure they still smelled like flowers. When I opened the bag the scent was stronger than ever. People started turning around to see what it was. I had to explain to the little old ladies beside me. I didn't want to get into the whole Medjugorje story. I had already pegged one as a well-to-do southern belle and the other probably a non-believer. Besides, I was tired and I didn't feel like talking, but I owed them an explanation.

I mentioned Medjugorje, and the lady to my right said she'd heard a little about it and wanted to know more. "I'm having some family problems, and I've often prayed to Mary for help." "By the way, my name is Mary Elizabeth." We talked a little more and I gave her one of my tiniest rocks. (I was saving the biggest one for my father.)

The lady on my left told of her recent battle with sickness and her wish to renew her faith. I gave her a rock and she thanked me and introduced herself. "Isn't that funny, my name is Mary Elizabeth too!"

Upon arriving, I quickly unpacked my bags and with great anticipation I got my holy rocks. I briefly told my father my story and opened the bag. I pulled out the rocks and held them to my nose. They smelled like ROCKS...not flowers...just rocks.

Oh sure, he believed my story, but I couldn't understand why the smell was gone. Didn't Mary know they were for Dad?

Through the messages of Medjugorje, Mary is calling us back to God. I've come to understand that my plan and God's plan are one and the same and He does have a plan for us all. My holy rocks still smell like rocks...but I know God's plan is in motion.




picture of purses and baby booties that were crocheted by one of the older girls using yarn donated by a parishioner from St. George. Thank you for all that you do for these families!

What is the Mustard Seed Catholic Worker?

The Mustard Seed of Worcester began in 1972 when two Holy Cross College students wanted to make a difference in the lives of the poor. Since then it has continued its main mission of providing a safe place to eat, with kindness and respect, for all who come to the door. The work is inspired by the example of Dorothy Day who began the first "Catholic Worker House of Hospitality" decades ago. The Mustard Seed is not funded by any one religion or group. There is no paid staff.

Since 2014 St. George parish has joined the Mustard Seed Community to serve meals and to provide basic necessities to our neighbors in need. Together as a community of faith we strive to practice the "Works of Mercy", to care for creation and our neighborhood.

Currently, with the help of our community, the Mustard Seed offers a free Medical Clinic, a weekly Food Pantry, basic clothing and hygiene supplies as well as a Christmas Giving Tree gift for guests and families with young children.



We hear the term "Reign of God" in the Gospels read during the year. A few months ago our book club here at St. George Church read and discussed Fr. Richard Rohr's book, 'Jesus' Alternative Plan'. The words appear there many times along with Richard Rohr's enlightening explanations.

Rohr recalls the parable of the small mustard seed which becomes a tree - the "Reign of God" is like that. Jesus is telling us He has planted the seed of eternal truth which like the mustard seed will grow and take over-in time. He tells the poor, mostly enslaved people to whom He speaks that they can live the new reality right now.

We read the "Reign of God" is not the same as heaven or where we go after we die: eternal life. The prayer Jesus taught and we say at each Mass and beyond has these words, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven". "Thy kingdom come" is a reality that breaks into our world now and then, when people are like God-ordinary people as well as saints.

"Reign of God" people are anchored by their awareness of God's deep love within them. "Reign of God" people recognize that all is passing away. They are free for God and truth they are the salt of the earth.

Our writer tells us that the world as it operates is power. The world as it should be is love. How do we live in both worlds? According to Richard Rohr the new world order ("Reign of God") of which Jesus spoke is "good, joy-filled, trustworthy, relational, communal, shared and somehow, at the same time, local and small-scale".

Belief that the "Reign of God" is meant to be present in our complicated world of today stresses the importance of being the bearers of God's love within us to those in our world-family, friends, neighbors and our broader community.
