

From Unur Pastor

Today's Gospel reading presents the baptismal theme of light and features a character who re-

sembles the elect who are preparing to be received into the Church at the Easter Vigil. The blind man, like the elect, grows in faith. However, he does not ask to be healed. Jesus covers the man's eyes with dirt and spit and then sends him to the pool of Siloam, and the man goes even though he has not vet been healed. John tells us that the name Siloam means "sent" - a name which John emphasizes in terms of Jesus as the one sent by God. However, "sent" can also refer to Jesus' sending us. It means listening to what God is telling us to do and then doing it, even when we might still be blind. That is the meaning of being sent. "Sent" is a good word to ponder during Lent, especially when we focus on our desert journey - our growth in faith. Dirt and spit are not what we would want nor expect on such a journey of faith, but elegance is not what is needed when we are embarking on a journey into unfathomable mystery. It is important to remember, though, that we humans are made from the dirt, and spit plus Jesus' touch are a type of baptism. He takes our humanity, mixes it with his own, and smears it right across our eves so that we can take it to healing. We take this to healing because we are sent.

Here are some questions to reflect upon with this Gospel:

- 1) Take a few minutes to see where you need healing or growth in faith. Where is your "Siloam", that place where Jesus is sending you? What might be the dirt and spit in that scenario?
- 2) Lent is a sober season where we sent to suffering and joy. What sufferings do you bring to Siloam What joys do you bring?
- 3) When was the last time that you asked Jesus to help you see in a new way?

LENTEN QUIET EVENING: On Tuesday evening, March 28th, from 6:30-8:00 P.M. we will have a Lenten evening of prayer & reflection in church. This will be an opportunity to go to confession and receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We encourage you to take this opportunity to do so.

James Martin Speaks to us through his "Essential Writings"

James Martin SJ attended the Wharton School of Business and worked for 6 years in corporate finance. Here he uses his experiences in corporate life to inform a sketch of the challenges and possibilities for living a spiritual life in the business world. (Part IX): "But what happens when you work in an environment where the value of, say, compassion is held in low regard or, worse, is ignored? One response might be to strive to change the work environment by your own actions, serving as a sort of leaven at work. Another path might be to maintain a degree of what spiritual writers call 'detachment' from the prevailing ethos of the corporation. If you work for a corporation that stresses aggressive or downright mean behavior, you need not always be mean or aggressive yourself. Sometimes superior job performance can overcome the perceived need to participate in activities that go against your moral grain. That is, talent trumps aggression and meanness."



What is the Mustard Seed Catholic Worker?

The Mustard Seed of Worcester began in 1972 when two Holy Cross College students wanted to make a difference in the lives of the poor. Since then it has continued its main mission of providing a safe place to eat, with kindness and respect, for all who come to the door. The work is inspired by the example of Dorothy Day who began the first "Catholic Worker House of Hospitality" decades ago. The Mustard Seed is not funded by any one religion or group. There is no paid staff.

Since 2014 St. George parish has joined the Mustard Seed Community to serve meals and to provide basic necessities to our neighbors in need. Together as a community of faith we strive to practice the "Works of Mercy", to care for creation and our neighborhood.

Currently, with the help of our community, the Mustard Seed offers a free Medical Clinic, a weekly Food Pantry, basic clothing and hygiene supplies as well as a Christmas Giving Tree gift for guests and families with young children.

Hope for Housing is a non-profit program developed by our parishioner Matt Ryan with the Interfaith Coalition to Prevent Family Homelessness and the Central Massachusetts Housing Alliance. Sadly, Matt is now deceased, but his work goes on, raising awareness about homelessness in our community and utilizing the collective buying power of 30 congregations to raise money for the prevention of family homelessness. The fastest growing homeless population is children who experience deflated self worth, diminished school achievement and related health and emotional issues.

These Gift Cards for local retailers, including Big Y, CVS, Dunkin' Donuts, Hannaford, Panera, Shaws, Stop & Shop, Target, Starbucks, and TJ Max are purchased in bulk, which in turn are sold to members of participating congregations who receive the full value of the card. The retailers donate 2-10% of all sales to the Hope for Housing program to assist families at risk of homelessness. By purchasing gift cards for **your use** at local retailers, you can help to stabilize families by providing counseling and support to keep them in their homes.

Lenten Regulations

- Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years and older on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all *Fridays of Lent. Dispensation on March 17th, 2023.
- Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics over the age of 18 but not yet 59. Those bound by this may only take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed minimal practices.

Those who are ill, pregnant, on medication or special diets for health concerns, or those who work at extremely physical jobs may be exempt from these regulations.

In late February 2022 the Russian invasion of Ukraine began. People from all over the world witnessed the suffering of innocent Ukrainian people. Ukraine's people have long seen persecution and war, including the 9% of it Catholic population. A population who have also long sought protection and healing in the small village of Zarvanytsia (Zar-van-eet-see-uh) outside of Lviv.

Prior to Russia's invasion of Ukraine, this scenic village with low hills and crisp streams was a place of pilgrimage, prayer and healing dating back to the year 1200. That year the Mongols invaded Kieve, including its churches and monasteries. A monk fleeing the invasion, stopped along the river in the hills of Zarvanytsia. Tired and wounded he fervently prayed and asked for intercession from the Mother of God. He fell asleep and in a dream the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to him and blessed him. When the Monk awoke a bright light led him to an icon, the Mother of God holding the Holy Child. A chapel was built and later a monastery. Throughout Zarvanytsia's history thousands of healings and miracles have been confirmed at the site of the Miraculous Mother of God icon.

The Ukrainian people have suffered much through invasions persecutions, wars, and fires. Including oppression and persecution of the Ukrainian Greek-Catholic Church by the Soviet Regime. The Mother of God of Zarvanytsia icon has been moved, and even hidden many times for her safety and protection. The icon has been crowned by Pope Pious IX and more recently by Pope Francis. As the war in Ukraine continues into a second year, may the precious, Miraculous.

Mother of God of Zarvanytsia, comfort and heal the people of Ukraine. In this Season of Lent, consider praying the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Holy Rosary for the people of Ukraine and for the end of this war.


