“Do Not Sin Any More.”

At first reading of today’s Gospel, one might think that those who brought the adulterous woman to Jesus were concerned about observance of the law. Halfway through the story, this error is corrected: “They said this to test him” (John 8:6). They thought that any answer he would provide would anger his audience. If he directed them to stone her, his teaching about mercy and forgiveness would sound hollow, and people would turn away from him. If he spoke against stoning, he would appear to be setting himself above the law, which required that particular punishment for adultery. They must have thought they had Jesus cornered.

Not to be undone by them, Jesus traced his finger on the ground. Was he listing the sins of the woman’s accusers? Was he using silence to make them feel uncomfortable? Was he choosing his words carefully? Was he simply doodling? We don’t know. But his words

cut to the core: “Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her” (John 8:7). Who would dare step forward to execute the sentence? They left, beginning with the elders because the custom was to throw the stones according to age—eldest first.


Had Jesus undermined his teaching about mercy and forgiveness? No. Had he denigrated the law? No. Did he leave the woman with the impression that her sin was not serious? No. He left her with this admonition: I will not condemn you to death, but you have to change your life.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 8:1-11

In this Sunday's Gospel, teachers of the Law try to trap Jesus into defending a woman caught in adultery thereby breaking the Law. The crowd was prepared to stone the woman. Jesus foils the attempt by suggesting that anyone without sin can cast the first stone. He then refuses to condemn the woman and encourages her to change and grow by not sinning.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child can understand the blame the woman in the Gospel takes. No child likes to be blamed. This week's lesson showed your child that Jesus is not interested in who is to blame, but in who is growing. Talk about ways your family can stop the blame game and give problem situations a positive spin. Remember that young children respond to encouragement more quickly than to blame.

Promise (Grades K-1): This week your child learned the need to take responsibility for their actions. Ask your child to share the story of the "Glue Mess" with the family. He or she can share the pictures, too. Then talk together about the story "Jesus Doesn't Blame". Talk about ways your family can show forgiveness to one another.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Your child learned a variety of ways people need to forgive and to ask forgiveness, and they discovered Jesus' merciful love. Talk about ways the members of your family show mercy to one another. Talk, too, about why it is better to show mercy and forgiveness than it is to try to blame people. Discuss which virtues each member of your family possesses.

Venture (Grades 4-6): In this week's class, your youngster learned that Jesus forgives rather than condemns. Talk together about ways your family can show mercy and forgiveness to one another. Talk about what it feels like to need forgiveness and to offer forgiveness to others. The class also examined the ABCs of Lent. Choose a letter and have your youngster share the corresponding paragraph. Make sure everyone in your family recognizes that during Mass there are times when we admit our sinfulness and seek forgiveness. If there is time, play a round or two of the Blame Game from this week's lesson.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Your young person discussed the destruction that blame can bring. They also read the play, "Can You Hear ME Now?" It features Jesus. Ask what your youngster learned from the cast of characters. Jesus refuses to condemn the woman from the Gospel story. Talk about how he forgives us today and always supports us. Discuss how God shows his mercy to your family. What kind of music did your youngster list among the three favorite songs? Be sure to ask who are The Priests from the lesson. Call up a video from online to hear what The Priests sound like.

Pray Together

Prayer gives us the kind of divine intervention that can achieve great things, including the power of forgiveness and mercy. During prayer this week, be sure to look inward and become aware of ways we can forgive ourselves and others as God has done for us. Is there a person who needs forgiveness? Pray for that person and follow the prompting of the Holy Spirit to dispense necessary mercy.

PADRE'S POST

5TH SUNDAY OF LENT

This Sunday's Gospel from John, Chapter 8, focuses on Christ's forgiveness. The scribes and Pharisees – teachers of the Law - brought before Jesus a woman who had been caught in adultery. The scripture passage says that the scribes and Pharisees made her stand in the middle as they brought the charge against her which was punishable by stoning her to death. Jesus' response to them and the woman helped all present realize that they were all sinners. He encourages the woman to stop sinning. Jesus encourages us all to stop sinning and to grow in virtue. By his example and works of mercy, Jesus clearly teaches us that God extends his mercy to sinners so that we can be freed from the shackles of sin. Jesus, fully human and fully divine, can authentically communicate this message by word and example.

The [Catechism of the Catholic Church](#) teaches, "During his public life, Jesus not only forgave sin, but also made plain the effect of this forgiveness: he reintegrated forgiven sinners into the community of the People of God from which sin had alienated or even excluded them." (CCC 1443)

Today's scripture readings for the 5th Sunday of Lent remind us that we interact with people daily. We have the freedom to interact with virtue or vice. As you begin this final full week of Lent, be attentive to the ways in which you interact with one another. Is your interaction loving or unloving? There are times, like in today's gospel, where our interactions lead us to the need to ask for forgiveness. This week's F3 student sessions for *Discover the Gospel* and *What the Church Believes and Teaches* identify that Jesus' love is forgiving and how to recognize virtue through the Church's [Spiritual](#) and [Corporal](#) Works of Mercy. Parents/caregivers see page 4 and 5 of the weekly [bulletin](#), near the family corner section, to find Life and Gospel Questions for adults, teens and children.

Like in one of the opening scenes in the children's movie *Cars*, Lightning McQueen arrogantly refuses to take the pitstop as he is being waved in. He believes he can do it alone. He does not need anyone or anything. Guess what happens? He blows a tire; he loses the race. As Catholics, we are given this incredible blessing of a pitstop during the 40 Days of Lent, a refueling before Palm Sunday, Holy Week, the Sacred Triduum and Easter Sunday.

The Catholic Church with her treasures, especially the [Source and Summit](#) of our life, the Holy Eucharist, believes Mass ought to be a weekly pitstop. If not, remember your spiritual roots. As Catholics, we believe and hold fast to the spiritual values of the farming vocation. We are to resist the materialism of this age from blinding us of these values. Let us pray that we may have the wisdom and strength to grow constantly in the virtues necessary for holy rural living through God's grace. We give thanks for these virtues as we live out together the mission of our parish family.

I pray that you continue to open your heart to the season of Lent. My prayer is that each of you takes the time to + Reflect + Repent + Restore your "spiritual tires," so you may finish the race set that you began on Ash Wednesday – your Lenten Observance.

Be safe in the days ahead—good health to all.

The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum—from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery.

The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season, and leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil.

Dear Padre,

If God is so forgiving, why can't I just ask for his forgiveness directly? Why do I need to go to confession and ask a man, a priest, to have my sins forgiven?

It's ironic that some claim a man cannot forgive sins. That same accusation was leveled against Jesus himself when he forgave the paralyzed man (see Mark 2:5-7). But Jesus clearly told his apostles they were to be instruments of his forgiveness. When he appeared to them in the upper room after his resurrection he said: "Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained" (John 20:23).

James the Apostle also endorses the concept of humans administering God's forgiveness: "Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed" (James 5:16).

Baptism, another sacrament administered by a person, starts our discipleship with Jesus. It cleanses us of all sin—including original sin. But even as Jesus' disciples, we are sometimes unfaithful and need to ask forgiveness. It's not surprising, then, that Jesus has given us another sacrament—again administered by a person—for the forgiveness of sins after baptism: the sacrament of reconciliation.

God is forgiving—so forgiving that when people killed Jesus, his Son, he did not punish and destroy the world. Rather, he used the death of Jesus to demonstrate just how patient and forgiving he is. Our gravest sins—murder, adultery, a life lived apart from God—require the intervention of the sacrament of penance. But even confessing smaller sins is useful. If nothing else, it keeps us humble enough to remember that all of us need forgiveness because all of us sin.
