The Jesus Question

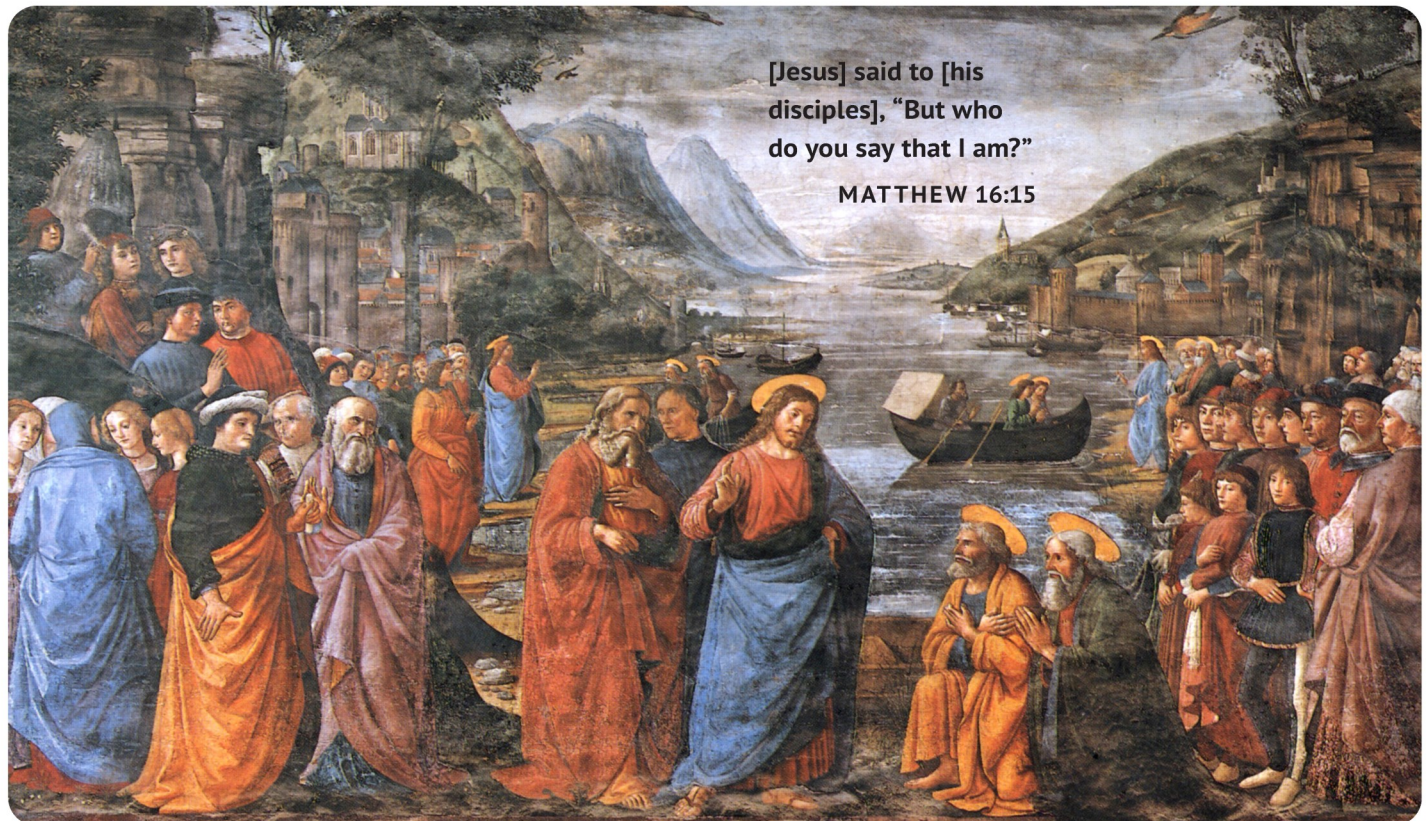
Over the years I've asked many people what they believe about Jesus and who he is for them. I've always nudged them away from the expected answer simply because I was interested in who he was for them down deep in their spirits. It's been a whole wheelbarrow full of answers, yes it has, a full and varied garden.

Some said they thought he was a very good human being, though they hedged when I asked if they thought he was also of God. Others thought he was a prophet, though they also backed away from anything that hinted of the divine. For some, Jesus was God dressed in human skin, as if he were simply playing at being human. Some labeled him a reformer and others a teacher. None of them dismissed Jesus as irrelevant or a remnant of the past. And for many, Jesus is the truth professed by Peter, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." He is the Word made flesh, the wisdom of God among us, the one who lives.

In one way or another all of us must answer the question Jesus asks of his disciples in today's Gospel: "Who do you say that I am?" The question is just as relevant today as it was when Jesus asked it. For some, their yes is without doubt. For others, it is a questioning journey of coming to faith. All of us are faced with that question: Who is Jesus for us today in the way we live our life? ●

This page features questions from this week's student session where your student, their catechists and classmates have learned more about their Catholic faith.

Also, the Family Corner briefly describes the gospel and helps us understand how Scripture and Tradition define us as a Church. I encourage each of you to continue to learn more about your faith as a family and together to pray the Family Prayer and take the weekly challenge inspired by the Question of the Week.

Why do you think the Sacrament of Penance is a gift Jesus gave us?

As we gather for this feast of heaven and earth, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, remember what we do here is holy and pleasing to God. No matter who we are or where we come from, we are united by our faith in Jesus Christ who is the Church and all her gifts received in the sacraments. May we take to heart this teaching and humble ourselves to prepare to receive the gifts of God for the people of God, especially as we receive Jesus Christ – Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity in the Eucharist. May your “Amen” resound in this gift and mystery.

Today we once again learn an important lesson from St. Paul, as he reminds us in his teaching in Romans, Chapter 11, that God's glory is eternal and that no one can encounter the unsearchable mind of God. Paul reminds his students that in God all things have their creation, and his love is eternal.

As we celebrate the 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time, we are reminded that we are united for a single purpose. Even in the uncertainties of the world, we pray that our hearts are open to God's call and perfected in his love and mercy.

In recent weeks at weekday Mass, we have been reading from the Book of Deuteronomy about the death of Moses. He was in his 120th year of life, yet his spirit was ever visible, and his eyes were undimmed. The people of Israel wept for 30 days after his death. It was Joshua, son of Nun, who, like Moses, was filled with the spirit of wisdom. Moses laid his hands upon him and, from that time forward, Israel gave him their obedience, carrying out the teachings of Moses

whom the Lord knew face to face.

In today's gospel, Matthew, Chapter 16, we witness again the line of succession between Moses and Joshua, as Peter acknowledges Jesus as the Messiah. In this moment of revelation, Jesus asked his disciples “Who do people say that the Son of Man is?” Peter responds, “You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God.” In hearing Peter's reply, Jesus turns toward Peter declaring him the Rock upon which his Church is to be built. It is here in scripture that Peter is identified as the first pope of the Catholic Church founded on Pentecost Sunday.

Jesus also gives Peter the power of the keys, declaring that “upon this rock, I will build my Church and the gates of the netherworld will not prevail against it.” We believe as Catholics that the teaching office of the pope is infallible as related to the teaching of faith and morals. Infallibility is the protection given by the Holy Spirit to the pope so that he will never teach error in matters of faith and morals. It is here where the Church's teaching of apostolic succession is grounded and continues to this very day in the office of bishop, priest, and deacon.

The [Catechism of the Catholic Church](#) teaches: “The Lord made Simon alone, whom he named Peter, the ‘rock’ of his Church. He gave him the keys to his Church and instituted him shepherd of the whole flock. The office of binding and loosing which was given to Peter was also assigned to the college of apostles united to its head. This pastoral office of Peter and the other apostles belongs to the Church's very foundation and is continued by the bishops under the primacy of the Pope.” (CCC 881)

In today's first reading from Isaiah 22, Eliakim is identified as the leader of the Israelites. He is to become the father of the Jewish people, holding in his possession the key to the house of David. It is Eliakim who holds the place of honor within his family and, through the words of Isaiah, the gift of his authority is revealed. Eliakim will be clothed with a robe and girded with a sash, placing the “house of David” upon his shoulders. The prophet goes on to reveal that what he opens, no one shall shut, and what he shuts, no one shall open. This Old Testament reading parallels to Jesus declaring Peter as the one who will receive the keys of the kingdom, underscoring God's promise revealed in the everlasting covenant through the Lamb of God.

I am looking forward to celebrating the Communal Anointing of the Sick before all Masses this weekend. Remember, “the Sacrament may be repeated if the sick person

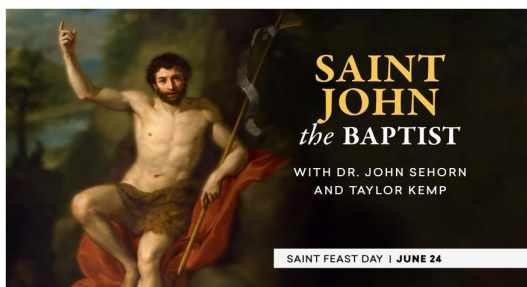
Restless Heart: The Confessions of Augustine

recovers after the anointing but becomes ill once again, or if, during the same illness, the person's condition becomes more serious. A person should be anointed before surgery when a dangerous illness is the reason for the intervention (cf. Rite of Anointing, Introduction, nos. 8-10)."

Jesus came to heal the whole person, body and soul. In Matthew, Chapter 8, we come to believe that in the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, through the ministry of the priest, it is Jesus who touches the sick to heal them from sin – and sometimes even from physical ailment. His cures were signs of the arrival of the Kingdom of God. In "olden days," people waited until the person was near death before they called the priest. Today it is preferred that the priest be called at the beginning of a serious illness and not at the end.

"The proper time for receiving this holy anointing has certainly arrived when the believer begins to be in danger of death because of illness or old age." (*Catechism of the Catholic Church, paragraph 1529*)

Thank you! Thanks to all for your generosity throughout the year in our efforts to support the various mission appeals here, in the archdiocese, and globally. Students in Kindergarten-Grade 9 will continue to follow the recently revised 2021 edition of the Archdiocesan Guidelines for parish-based catechetical programs and activities on Wednesday evenings, using the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies Family Catechesis - The Gospel for All Ages* program. During the summer, we will host an on-site five-day summer camp such as *Totus Tuus*. These programs focus our collective efforts and are following the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, which focuses on the four pillars of our faith – Creed, Sacraments, Morality and Prayer – and on the Christian view of the human person as well as an accurate understanding of human love as articulated in St. John Paul II's *Theology of the Body*. Typically, 30+ hours for a parish and 60+ hours for a Catholic school are required for effective catechesis using the resources recommended by the Archdiocesan Office of Catechesis. F3 programs and activities are part of our parish family's Faith Formation Commission.

Key dates for CYO (Youth Group)

High school youth from St. Boniface and St. Meinrad parishes are encouraged to participate in CYO Youth Group. CYO Youth Group holds regularly scheduled gatherings on Sundays during the year, with other programs and activities. Grade 9 students enrolled in parish-based F3 programs and activities are welcome to join the CYO Youth Group. The CYO Youth is part of our parish family's Evangelization Commission.

Recently, I learned of a change to the planning process for implementing a youth ministry that came from the results of the *Connected in the Spirit* process. The youth ministry program began in the fall of 2022. The goal was to bring together the parish youth in grades 9-12 from the three Spencer County parishes as one youth group on Sundays throughout the year. With the guidance of the Archdiocesan Office of Youth Ministry and the Archdiocesan Planning Committee, a CYO (Catholic Youth Organization) model was adopted to focus on deepening relationships with Jesus Christ and one another by focusing on the importance and impact of quality social, educational, and recreational programs and activities.

Plans for this new youth ministry model and its structures have been directed back to each parish's responsibilities. High school youth from St. Francis of Assisi Parish will return to a Wednesday evening catechetical model and generally will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in Grade 11. Our CYO Youth Ministry will continue to meet on Sundays to provide opportunities for teens in their final stage of preparing for Confirmation and for the fully initiated teens to have opportunities for service as engaged and committed disciples in their faith and community.

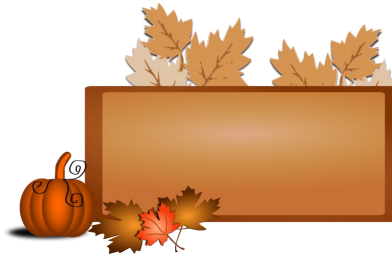

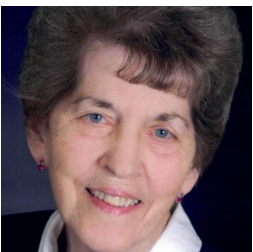

Dear Padre,

Why do Catholics believe they are the only true Church?

Roman Catholics believe our Church has historical continuity with St. Peter and the apostles who were present on the day of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit gave birth to the Church. Catholics believe the work begun by Peter and the other apostles continued under men they appointed and on whom they laid hands—giving them apostolic authority to carry their work into the next generation. Apostolic authority, understood by Catholics to be historical and traceable, is a mark of authenticity and continuity of the Church. For Catholics, this essential mark of the Church is missing if a Christian community rejects apostolic authority and Peter's leadership of the other apostles—carried on by their successors in the persons of bishops and popes—over the last 2,000 years.


Nevertheless, “numerous elements of sanctification and truth” are present in separated Churches and ecclesial communities, and “the Spirit of Christ has not refrained from using them as instruments of salvation” (*Responses to Some Questions Regarding Certain Aspects of the Doctrine on the Church*, by the Vatican Offices of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, 2007).

Dialogue with other Christians continues, and we hope the love and respect we have for one another can grow over time. While our Church leaders have the role of conserving the faith we have received, all Christians should remember that the Law of Love must prevail. If we violate that principle, we fail to comprehend an essential truth of our faith. ●

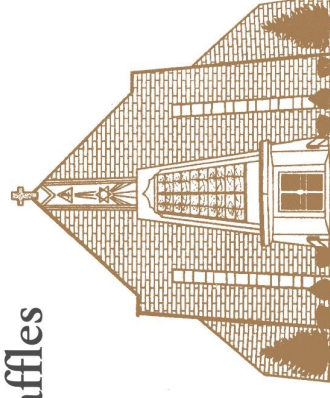
