

live at a parish in downtown Milwaukee. From my window I watch the world pass by, everyone below in search of one thing or another. Students from the local university seek an education, business folk look for a sale, street people often look for a place to spend the night, teenagers hope to find love. Yet beneath all of those longings, in each one there is a deeper hunger that wonders what life is all about and the hope that they might find it. Hidden amidst it all, the real hunger is for God, a longing sewn into our being, sometimes recognized but too often not.

The story of the *Magi* is a story of seekers making their way from afar in hopes of finding the promised one, a newborn king. Perhaps they knew of this child's divine nature, more likely not, yet it was ultimately that same hunger that exists in all of us that drove them, a deep desire to know God.

Every serious religion seeks to experience God in life and tells the stories of those who have done so. There are Christian mystics like St. John of the Cross and St. Teresa of Ávila, Jewish mystics of the Kabbalah tradition, the Sufis of Islam, Native Americans who go on vision quests, the Hindus who practice yoga, as well as the Buddhists and Taoists and Confucians. Like the Magi, we all seek to find God. •

The Epiphany of the Lord: Leading the way from a pagan life and a Godless world

Mt 2:1-12

This page features questions from this week's student session, where your student learned more about their Catholic faith.

I encourage each of you to continue to learn about your faith as a family and together pray the Family Prayer and take the weekly challenge.

Imagine yourself at Jesus' baptism. What do you see and feel?

A blessed New Year to you and your loved ones. As we continue celebrating Christmastide – the Twelve Days of Christmas – today we arrive at the Lord's Epiphany; the Magi honor Jesus with three gifts. The gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh reveal that he is king for all people. Jesus is the Messiah for Israel, Son of God and Savior of the World.

While much of the world celebrates Christmas the entire month of December, if not earlier, the liturgical Christmas season begins on Christmas Day, December 25, and concludes this year in January – providing a few more days to celebrate. Thanks for being open to keeping the joy and glory of these Christmas Days alive in your heart and by living out your faith by keeping your home nativity set up, your Christmas tree up, and decorations in your homes and on your porches. I have been listening to Christmas music and am still sending a few Christmas cards to friends who left a message by email or who called between Christmas Eve and New Year's Day.

The Catholic Christmas season begins with the Christmas Eve Vigil Masses, celebrating the Nativity of the Lord, and ends on Sunday, January 7, the Sunday Mass celebration of the Epiphany of the Lord. In visiting with families, these extra days may help families "still needing to celebrate" Christmas to do so. From my social calendar, invitations to stop by family celebrations began a few weeks earlier than before, with the explanation often shared with a whisper to me of letting any disease or infection run its course with the hope of gathering again between Christmas and New Year. For this reason, the dates set for the Communal Advent and Lenten Penance Services were moved up on the parish calendar. I hope and pray that families can gather – grandparents and godparents wanting to see a child's face when opening their eift.

Historically, the Epiphany is celebrated on January 6, the twelfth night in the United States and other industrialized nations with strong and developed governments and economies that struggle with keeping God at the center of the day; nations in North America, Europe, and Oceania complete the 31 countries considered part of the first world.

In the U.S. and these other industrialized nations, the Epiphany is conveniently celebrated annually on the Sunday between January 2 and January 8, while Second World (developing or emerging countries) and Third World (underdeveloped or the poorest of the poor – three-quarters of the world population) countries celebrate the Epiphany on its actual day, not reprioritizing the biblical timeline of salvation history to the meet the needs of a post-modern or secular society, where the gifts and mystery of God are traded

like farm futures, stocks, and bonds. Remember the Ten Commandments? What makes your life and my life as a Christian, which means someone who is "Christlike" – a light bearer – different from a pagan life and a Godless world? Since my junior year in college, when enrolled in one of my international business classes, I have been tracking these countries' behavior patterns of: drinking, eating, and smoking, and the countries' ranking of the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project (ACLED Conflict). This index assesses every country and territory in the world according to four indicators – deadliness, danger to civilians, geographic diffusion, and armed group fragmentation – based on analysis of political violence event data collected for the past year. (An obscure hobby, a nerd in so many ways, another way to use Microsoft Excel.)

It is incredible how accurate the patterns are in predicting local behaviors, including parish communities. With the evidence of family stress, the threat of a dip in the economy and flux in the interest rate, the price to barely fill a family's pantry and freezer, along with the denial of the personal sting of death or engaging the stages of grief, it has been a unique time for pastors and community leaders alike. People have changed; we all have changed.

To me, Christmas is a time to recalibrate ourselves, to seek who is above, and to share the gifts we have received with others – making the journey like the Magi to see and believe that God himself – Emmanuel (Hebrew: "Napayromanized: 'Immānū'ēl, meaning, "God with us" or "God is with us") has been revealed by a star for all to see . Remember, you can celebrate the gift and mystery in the spirit of festive fun until February 2.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church: The Epiphany is the manifestation of Jesus as Messiah of Israel, Son of God and Savior of the world. The great feast of Epiphany celebrates the adoration of Jesus by the wise men (magi) from the East, together with his baptism in the Jordan and the wedding feast at Cana in Galilee. In the magi, representatives of the neighboring pagan religions, the Gospel sees the first-fruits of the nations, who welcome the good news of salvation through the Incarnation. The magi's coming to Jerusalem in order to pay homage to the king of the Jews shows that they seek in Israel, in the messianic light of the star of David, the one who will be king of the nations. Their coming means that pagans can discover Jesus and worship him as Son of God and Savior of the world only by turning towards the Jews and receiving from them the messianic promise as contained in the Old Testament. The Epiphany shows that "the full number of the nations" now takes its "place in the family of the patriarchs" and acquires *Israelitica dignitas* (is made "worthy of the heritage of Israel"). (CCC 528) As is our local custom, parish décor for Christmas remains in place through February 2 as the Church celebrates the day that Mary entered the temple with the Child Jesus when her days of purification after giving birth were fulfilled, according to the Mosaic law, and when Simeon made his well-known prophecy about Mary and the Child. It is historically called "Candle-mas" because of Simeon's prophecy of Jesus being a light for the Gentiles.

Today it is better known as the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord. The candles blessed during Candle-mas are then used for a special blessing of throats during Mass on February 3, the memorial of St. Blaise. St. Blaise saved the life of a boy who was choking on a fish bone. He is now the patron saint of all who have diseases and injuries of the throat. On this day, the candles are sprinkled with holy water. Then, a priest or deacon takes two candles fitted into the form of a cross and applies them to the throat of each person to be blessed.

Thank you for your Advent, Christmas and New Year's greetings! Your outpouring of cards, kind words and festive food delivered to the parish office is much appreciated. With the staggering of arrivals, I could share the cookies and candies with the parish staff, a few members of our parish family who are homebound and infirm, some who would be alone for Christmas, and some local families in need. I appreciate your generosity and care. Most of all, I enjoy the Christmas greetings with updated family photos, some photos of the

Circle of Grace Lesson for K-Grade 9 students set for January 10

Dear Parents/Caregivers

Praying that you found peace in the silent and holy night and joined the song of the angels at Christmas, a perfect moment in time to be glad and rejoice, no matter your situation. Wishing you a blessed time as we celebrate the Twelve Days of Christmas.

Out of concern for all God's people and in response to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' *Charter for the Protection of* Children and Young People, we have a program for the safe environment education of children and young people mandated by the Archdiocese of Indianapolis since 2012.

This program is called *Circle of Grace*. It is meant to supplement and be integrated into the excellent programs and curricula for the formation of children and young people in our religious education programs. Circle of Grace aims to equip our children and young people by arming them with essential knowledge and skills grounded in the richness of our faith. This program helps children and young people understand their own (and others') dignity in mind, body, and spirit.

What is Circle of Grace?

The Catholic Church teaches that God has created each of us as unique and special. Genesis 1:27 tells us that we are created "male and female in God's image" and that God saw this as "very good." In that goodness, we are meant to respect ourselves and everyone else as persons created and loved by God.

Adults assist children and young people to recognize God's love by helping them to understand that each of us lives and moves in a circle of grace. You can imagine your own circle of grace by putting your arms above your head, then circle down in front of your body, including side to side. This circle, front to back, holds who you are in your body and through your senses. It holds your very essence in mind, heart, soul, and sexuality.

Why is it important to help children understand the Circle of Grace?

God intends our relationships in life to be experiences of divine love. Respectful, nurturing, loving relationships increase our understanding of our own value and help us to love others. It is never too early to help children and young people understand how very special they are and how relationships in life are called to be

sacred. Understanding this can help them protect the special person they are and be respectful of others.

Adults, especially parents, as they strive to provide a safe and protective environment, hold the responsibility to help children and young people understand and respect their own dignity and that of others. A truly safe and protective environment is one where children and young people recognize when they are safe or unsafe and know how to bring their concerns, fears, and uncertainties to the trusted adults in their lives.

How is the Circle of Grace Program different from other protection programs?

National statistics are alarming. Before the age of 18, one in four girls and one in six boys will be sexually abused. Many protection programs focus on "stranger danger." However, up to 90% of the time, the perpetrator is known to the child or young person, such as a relative or family friend. Circle of Grace goes beyond just protection by helping children and young people understand the sacredness of who they are and how to seek help through their relationships with trusted adults.

Do you wish your child NOT to participate in the Circle of Grace training?

If you choose to opt-out of the in-person student lesson provided, the Parent's Opt-Out Form must be requested before February 1, 2024. Parents/caregivers must complete this form for each child along with the home activity lessons provided by the Archdiocese of Indianapolis. The in-person and opt-out home activity lessons, which are required for grade school, middle school, and high school students annually by the Archdiocese of Indianapolis, must be submitted to the Office of Catechesis before March 1. If you wish your child **not** to participate in the *Circle of Grace* training, please contact Jessica Fischer at iessicaf@myparishfamily.church before **February**

When will the Circle of Grace Program start?

missing family member who had died since Christmas 2023, and many candid photos announcing new life. You may recall I keep this stack of "picture cards" at my prayer station in my cell, praying for one family each day; 287 families to go since December 26, 2023. Each of you continues to bring blessings to my life in service to you as your pastor. A priest is not an 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. or 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. job. The sacramental life and the mission and ministry of a parish do not have set hours. A priest is always a priest and always present. A priest is primarily a man of sacrifice, living out his vocation through the sacraments you share and receive through him as the assigned delegate to you in the bishop's name. Priests are agents of mercy and compassion by bringing people to God and God to the people. As your pastor, I have the great honor to accompany you in the amazing and faith-filled encounters or moments of your lives; admittedly, some of the moments are scary and sad, while others are awesome and filled with the emerging gift of hope: the birth of a child, a wedding engagement, or even death. There is a saying, "What a person goes through in a lifetime, a priest goes through in a day."

A priest must maintain a healthy prayer life amid these events. Thank you for allowing me to take the time to recharge each week and throughout the year while making retreats and taking time off and vacation. Thank you for the many blessings you bring through the gift of yourself to my priestly life and ministry! I am grateful to the parish staff – your team and my team – who aid me in strengthening and sustaining the mission of the parish family. Together with the staff, the pastoral council, established and approved parish commission and committees, we jointly bring life to the Body of Christ, the Church, in collabo-Announcements

ration as members of the Church founded by Jesus Christ. We are not a denomination (part of the whole) of the Church, we are the Church - the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church founded by Christ, believing that Jesus Christ on Pentecost founded only "one true Church," and that this one true Church is the Catholic Church with the bishop of Rome – from St. Peter to Pope Francis as its supreme, infallible head and locus of communion.

Together, we believe and profess in the words of the Apostles Creed and the Nicene Creed that the Catholic Church is the universal sacrament of salvation for the human race. Christ won the Church for Himself at the price of his blood and made the Church, with its initiated members living out their respective vocations as his co-worker in the salvation of the world, with its spiritual and apostolic work that faith and what it signifies is nourished and strengthened in the wisdom, love and power of God manifested to us by Christ in His Real Presence and his Sacrifice in, and only in, the Eucharist.

I pray as you celebrate the Epiphany, the day in which the Only Begotten Son was revealed to the nations by the guidance of a star, that He continues to be revealed to you in the gifts you already possess in faith, hope and love. The gift and mystery of God becoming flesh and dwelling among us is proclaimed, sacrificed and received at each Mass in the gift of the Eucharist. May our common union, our communion found and a binding source in the Eucharist, grow grace upon grace throughout the coming year and all the days of your life.



Dear Padre,

On what date was Jesus born? Was it December 25 or some time between December and April, when shepherds watched over their sheep?

Due to the complexity of history's various calendars and ways of calculating time, we cannot be sure of the date. Matthew and Luke, the two Gospels that detail the birth of Jesus, do not give a date.



Early Christians observed an annual feast to remember Jesus' death and resurrection, focusing on the paschal mystery rather than on his birth. As Christianity grew and spread, however, Christians wanted to celebrate more events from Jesus' life. The celebration on December 25 has more to do with an expression of faith in Jesus as Emmanuel, "God with us," than with establishing the exact date of his birth.

December 25 is listed as the date of Jesus' birth in a fourth-century calendar of martyrs, but how this date was chosen is unclear. Some scholars believe Christians in Rome chose December 25 to counteract the celebration of the pagan sun god Emesa. Another theory follows the influences of the seasons: early Christians believed John the Baptist was conceived on the autumnal equinox and born at the summer solstice. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus' conception took place six month after John's. That time line would place Jesus' birth at the winter solstice, December 25 on the Julian calendar. A third theory says Jesus' birth would have occurred on the same date as his death, which we believe to be in the spring at Passover. Regardless of the exact date, we celebrate Jesus as the true Son of God who came to enlighten us and, by his death and resurrection, to give us life. •
