# Like the Rings of a Tree



or some, going to confession can bring a sense of relief—as if the slate has now been wiped clean; as if we have gotten a do-over with life or the past has been left behind as though it never happened. Our past, however, is always with us—the good and the bad, the joys and the sadness, the grace and the sin. There are no do-overs. We carry with us the marks of our lives simply because every experience, every kindness and cruelty, every moment of generosity and selfishness, all have made us into who are. We are much like a tree that adds a ring to its trunk each year. The ring always bears the marks of that year, whether it has been a year of rain or drought, whether insects have attacked, or whether Mother Nature has been kind. The tree always remembers and carries with it forever the rings of what life has been.

Our lives are the same. The story of the Pharisee and the tax collector tells this tale. Like the Pharisee, we have much good in our lives. We too have prayed and have been generous. We have been kind and honest and cared for the poor. We have tried to be faithful. The Pharisee's downfall was that he forgot about his sinfulness; he forgot he needed God's mercy. The tax collector, on the other hand, remembered his failings. Both were in need of God's love. Only the tax collector seemed to realize it.

# PREPARING FOR SACRAMENTS/SACRAMENTAL EMERGENCY

Parishioners seeking sacraments should visit the Sacraments tab on our website to begin enrollment and required preparation. To access this information, enter "sacraments" in the search feature at <u>sbcatholic.church</u> or <u>smcatholic.church</u>.

Baptism Preparation: Families seeking baptism should contact Jessica Fischer, Evangelization and Discipleship Coordinator, to schedule preparation and formation sessions at least two months before the child's birth.

Marriage Preparation: Couples wishing to marry at St. Boniface or St. Meinrad churches must contact Jessica Fischer, Evangelization and Discipleship Coordinator, at least six months before their wedding date to arrange marriage preparation and formation sessions. At least one person in the couple must have been a parishioner for one year.

**Anointing of the Sick:** Contact the Parish Office to request a priest for this sacrament of healing. If you require a priest due to severe illness or danger of death, please call 812-357-6600. Be prepared to provide your name, location and contact information. The priest on call will respond as soon as possible.

Families should use this number immediately when a loved one is admitted to an area hospital, long-term care center or hospice. Hospital, long-term care and hospice chaplains do not always contact the Parish Office promptly, which can leave parishioners and families without needed parish-based pastoral care or the Last Sacraments.



# Chapter 8: Our Father in Faith

Abraham had faith in God and became the father of God's people.

# Chapter Summary

God's plan of love continued to unfold through Abraham. His plan was to prepare the world for the coming of the Savior. He began by calling Abraham, a very faithful man, to be the father of the Chosen People. God made three promises to Abraham: he would have a great land, a great name, and many descendants. God called Abraham to move away from his home with his family to the land that God had promised. Abraham is called our "father in faith" because he is a great example of always believing and obeying God.

# More for Parents

Family life requires faith. We enter into marriage but cannot see the future of our health, our spouse's health, or where careers will take us. Nor can we guarantee that our spouse will always make the right decisions. We raise children, but we cannot foresee our children's future. We live well amid uncertainty by being rooted in belief in God and what He teaches us. Faith helps us know that God is true. Unlike those who lived before Christ's coming, we have been given intimate knowledge of God and His plan for our salvation. We no longer need to live in fear. With faith, we step into this plan of God with belief and certainty that God is faithful to us.

# Virtue in the Family

The virtue of faith helps us believe in God and in what He teaches us. It helps us give our lives to God in accordance with His will. Faith also unites God's family. We are united as baptized children of God and as a community of believers in God, our loving Father.

# Growing in the Virtue of Faith

- Prayer activity
  - Spend five to ten minutes reflecting on the virtue of faith and how to nurture it as a family.
    - Ask God to teach you about Himself (what/ how He loves, why He created you, what His plan is for you).
    - Express to God your belief in Him and the teachings of His Church.
    - Ask God to increase and strengthen in you the virtue of faith.
  - Conclude by reciting together as a family, "Lord,
     I believe in You, and I give my whole life to
     follow You."
- God promised Abraham that his descendants would be as many as the stars in the sky. In today's world, city lights hide many of the stars, so the full impact of this promise is lost on us. Take your family out of the city, go to a planetarium, or find pictures online of the night sky with no light pollution. Let the magnitude of God's promise sink in as you look at the myriad of stars in the heavens.
- Share with your children about your faith in God, including when you were in a difficult moment.

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# **PASTOR'S LETTER**

# Sunday Scripture Commentary by Father Paul Nord, OSB

## 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time, C

First Reading: Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18; Response: Psalm 34:2-3, 17-19, 23; Second Reading: 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18; Gospel: Luke 18:9-14

oday's reading from Sirach begins:
"The LORD is a God of justice, who knows no favorites." The following verses develop this idea. God
"hears the cry of the oppressed." But God is not "unduly partial" toward "the weak" – synonymous here with "the oppressed."
God does justice for all. Next the text proclaims that God hears "the wail of the orphan" and the "complaint" of the widow. These are the marginalized of the society whom God hears.

God also hears "the one who serves God." The petition of such a person "reaches the heavens." Similar imagery follows: "The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds." Prayer is depicted here as ascending from the earth and breaching the boundary between earth and heaven.

Prayer is then personified – prayer "does not rest... nor will [prayer] withdraw." This expresses certainty that God hears the prayer of the lowly person, and the prayer of those who serve God. These prayers reach God the Most High, and He responds. God judges justly without delay. In conclusion, this Sirach reading expresses confidence in the power of prayer and certainty that God is just. God will surely respond to those who suffer injustice and call out to Him.

In the Second Timothy reading, St. Paul anticipates that his life and apostolic ministry will soon end. Paul says: "the time of my departure is at hand." Recall that Paul is writing this letter from prison, as he says in 2 Timothy 1:8: "So do not be ashamed of your testimony to our Lord, nor of me, a prisoner for his sake."

Anticipating death, Paul compares his life to a "libation" which is "poured out."

Libations are the practice of pouring out a

liquid as a sacrificial offering to a god. Libations were a common practice of many ancient religions. In this verse, Paul is likely suggesting that *his blood* is being "poured out" as a liquid sacrifice to God. Both then and now, the shedding of blood is a common image for the giving of one's life, especially as a victim of violence. As Paul anticipates, he will be martyred for his faith in Christ lesus.

Libations were also a part of ancient Jewish religious practice. In the Temple of Jerusalem, the daily burnt offering (animal sacrifice) was offered twice per day. It was always accompanied by a vegetable offering and a libation of wine. This practice was based on Exodus 29:38-42 and Numbers 28:3-8. Also, during the Feast of Tabernacles, water was drawn from the Pool of Siloam and poured onto the Temple altar – a water libation.

Paul continues: "I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith." Paul anticipates his life coming to an end. But Paul is confident that he has completed the mission given to him – to proclaim Jesus, the redeemer of the world. Paul believes "the crown of righteousness awaits me." Paul trusts that the Lord will judge him favorably because the Lord is a "just judge." Paul anticipates "that day." This is the day of judgment – Christ's "appearance." Christ "will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead" – as we profess in the Nicene Creed.

Paul laments: "At my first defense no one appeared on my behalf, but everyone deserted me." But Paul says that the Lord "gave me strength." Paul's subsequent mention of "proclamation" suggests that Paul was able to speak boldly at his trial witnessing to Christ Jesus. Paul considers the Gentiles (not his fellow Jews) as his primary audience for proclaiming Christ's Gospel. Paul is thankful that God gave him strength to accomplish this witness. In 4:11, Paul writes "Luke is the only one with me." Paul's imprisonment limits his contact with fellow believers in Christ. Paul continues: "I was rescued from the lion's mouth." The ancient Christian historian Eusebius suggests that this

Pauline text refers to Paul escaping execution under the Roman Emperor Nero – "the lion." Perhaps Paul was released or received a lighter sentence – although Paul later would be martyred. Paul trusts that God "will bring me safe to his heavenly kingdom." Paul is nearing the conclusion of his letter. He says: "To him [God] be glory forever and ever. Amen." This letter's remaining verses (4:19-22) consist primarily of the exchange of greetings between Paul (sender) and the recipients of his letter. In the Gospel, the narrator introduces Jesus' parable by explaining that it concerns "those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else." This parable is typical of Luke's Gospel, which often emphasizes that Jesus' teachings cause a "reversal of expectations" among those who hear Him.

In this case, Jesus' audience would have expected Pharisees to be righteous, and tax collectors to be sinners. But Jesus' parable reverses this expectation. The Pharisee is proud – he boasts before God in prayer. He says: "I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income." Jesus insists that the Pharisee did not come home justified before God – because "whoever exalts himself will be humbled."

In contrast, the tax collector approaches God with humility – he "would not even raise his eyes to heaven." He humbly prays: "O God, be merciful to me a sinner." The tax collector also beats his breast – a penitential gesture. Jesus teaches that this tax collector "went home justified" because "the one who humbles himself will be exalted." Jesus' parable would have greatly surprised – and probably upset – his audience.

The Pharisee views the tax collector (and the rest of humanity)

as "greedy, dishonest, adulterous." But Jesus teaches that the Pharisee is not justified before God because of his pride. God's judgment is different from human judgment. God knows our hearts, and he forgives those who are truly penitent in their prayer.

Immediately before this parable, Jesus told the parable of the widow who was persistent in demanding justice from an unjust judge. Both the "persistent widow" parable (18:1-8) and today's "penitent tax collector" parable emphasize the importance of sincere, fervent prayer.



# Dear Padre,

# Is it wrong for children to dress up as zombies and devils and other evil creatures for Halloween?

No. It is perfectly acceptable to choose these kinds of costumes and to participate in the festivities of Halloween. Halloween is primarily a secular celebration. Although it is true that the original celebration is deeply rooted in the Christian tradition, that tradition is more properly celebrated during the great feast days of the Church that follow Halloween: All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.

Mythological representations, and the costumes that



remind us of these kind of characters, are to be understood with a sense of fun and mischief. There is no difference between a ghost, a goblin, a zombie, Captain America, Superman, or one of the Mario Brothers. They are all fictional characters in the very human stories we share with each other. The meaning we assign to them must be proportional to what they represent. On Halloween, they represent nothing more than a person in costume. It could be an entirely different story under different circumstances in which there might be the possibility of a misunderstanding about the meaning of such a costume. Halloween pretty much blurs that distinction and takes away the misunderstanding. It is meant to be entertaining and fun. That is all. •


