Singing together during the distribution of holy Communion is one way of expressing the reality that we are one in the Eucharist, the Body of Christ. I once was taught to pray quietly during this time. If I'm honest, however, what I find myself doing after I return to my pew is watching others process past as they return from receiving Communion. They are a parade of holiness on the way. They are the longtime parishioners who have been making their way back to their pews in this way for decades—some now using walkers or canes, others with a bit of a slow hobble. There are teenagers, too. Some, from the expressions on their faces, look like their parents made them come, while others look

impressively prayerful. Young parents, too, caring for a new baby in their arms, and another couple holding a two-year-old's hand as he tugs to escape and be free. And middle-aged single people, now halfway through this life's journey. Young couples, as well, those just married or engaged and so obviously in love, but also widows and widowers longing for the love they once knew. All of these are the body of Christ, the very temple of God built upon the foundation that is Christ Jesus, as Paul notes so well. This is why I watch them processing back to their pews. This, too, is prayer. ●

PREPARING FOR SACRAMENTS/SACRAMENTAL EMERGENCY

Parishioners seeking sacraments should visit the Sacraments tab on our website to begin enrollment and required preparation. To access this information, enter "sacraments" in the search feature at sbcatholic.church or smcatholic.church.

Baptism Preparation: Families seeking baptism should contact Jessica Fischer, Evangelization and Discipleship Coordinator, to schedule preparation and formation sessions at least two months before the child's birth.

Marriage Preparation: Couples wishing to marry at St. Boniface or St. Meinrad churches must contact Jessica Fischer, Evangelization and Discipleship Coordinator, at least six months before their wedding date to arrange marriage preparation and formation sessions. At least one person in the couple must have been a parishioner for one year.

Anointing of the Sick: Contact the Parish Office to request a priest for this sacrament of healing. **If you require a priest due to severe illness or danger of death, please call 812-357-6600.** Be prepared to provide your name, location and contact information. The priest on call will respond as soon as possible.

Families should use this number immediately when a loved one is admitted to an area hospital, long-term care center or hospice. Hospital, long-term care and hospice chaplains do not always contact the Parish Office promptly, which can leave parishioners and families without needed parish-based pastoral care or the [Last Sacraments](#).

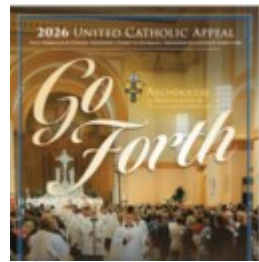

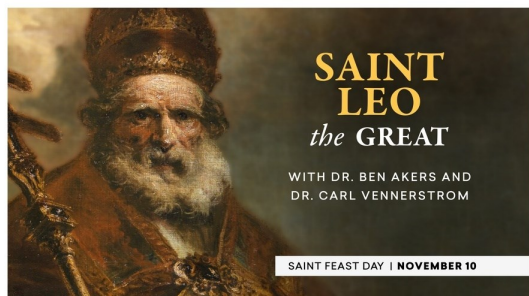

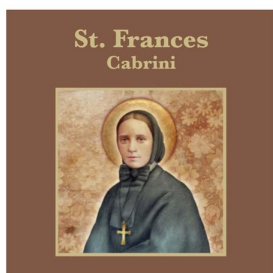

Chapter 10: The Coming of the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit pours grace and virtues into our hearts.

Chapter Summary

The Holy Spirit was sent by the Father and the Son on Pentecost. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, the Apostles grew in holiness. They received courage and the power to proclaim the Good News. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, we are sanctified, or made holy. Through the sacraments, the Holy Spirit infuses grace and virtues into our souls. In order for the Holy Spirit to work in our lives, we need to have open hearts. Besides the theological virtues, the cardinal virtues of fortitude, justice, temperance, and prudence are given to us in Baptism in a special way. Fortitude strengthens us to overcome fear and difficulties in order to do what is good. Justice enables us to give to God and others what is their due. Temperance helps us control and direct our desires so that we desire that which is truly good. Prudence enlightens our intellect to know how to be virtuous in a situation.

More for Parents

When we read about the Apostles and the incredible feats they performed after receiving the Holy Spirit, it can be hard to believe we have received the *same* Holy Spirit at our Baptism. It might seem like the Holy Spirit isn't active in our lives (we're likely not miraculously speaking in different languages). However, the graces and virtues we have received from the Holy Spirit are meant to help us in our current state in life as parents and spouses. Being patient with a car full of children after a long day or courageously searching for a new job to provide for the family or making time for God in prayer are all moments of the Holy Spirit acting in our lives. They are made possible when we open ourselves up to the Holy Spirit through fasting, spiritual reading, or simply saying, "Come, Holy Spirit." The Holy Spirit is willing to help, but we must cooperate.

Virtue in the Family

At our Baptism, we have been infused with the four cardinal virtues of fortitude, justice, temperance, and prudence. They can weaken if we sin or if we don't use them. We can strengthen them if we put them into action in our daily lives.

Living with Cardinal Virtues

- Family prayer activity
 - Pray the following in the morning together: "Holy Spirit, I give You permission to work in my life today."
 - Take a moment in silence for everyone to think of which virtue he needs most that day. Guide everyone through the following questions:
 - What challenges will I face today?
 - Whom am I called to love and respect today?
 - Take turns praying the following: "Strengthen the virtue of _____ within me today. Amen."
- To grow in prudence, read Proverbs 10–15 and choose a few wise proverbs that your family could benefit from. Each day, as a family, read and discuss the meaning of one proverb and how to apply it to your lives.
- On the doorframes, label the hinges on one or all the doors of your house with the four cardinal virtues. Challenge the family to say the four cardinal virtues before they open the labeled door in order to memorize the virtues.

PASTOR'S LETTER

Sunday Scripture Commentary by Father Paul Nord, OSB

Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome

First Reading: Ezekiel 47:1-2, 8-9, 12; Response: Psalm 46:2-3, 5-6, 8-9; Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 3:9c-11, 16-17; Gospel: John 2:13-22

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,
Tuesday, November 11, is Veterans Day, a time set aside to honor all veterans, living and deceased. During this weekend's Masses (8-9 November), we will honor Veterans and ask God to bless them. Wednesday at 10 a.m. will be the Funeral Mass for Jim Mehling, who served in the United States Marines from 1968 to 1970. May Jim and all our deceased veterans rest in Christ's peace.

Prayer while looking upon Jesus in the Eucharistic host is a centuries-old form of Catholic prayer. It is sometimes called "Eucharistic Adoration" or "Holy Hour" or "Prayer before the Blessed Sacrament." Typically, the consecrated host is placed in a "monstrance," which is made of beautiful gold-colored metal. The monstrance holds the Holy Eucharist so that we might pray before Jesus – his Body and Blood given to us.

Prayer before the Eucharist might be the most popular form of prayer today among young adults who are faithful Catholics. I work with many youth and young adults in our One Bread, One Cup program at Saint Meinrad. This beautiful form of prayer has played an essential role in renewing the faith of many young people who previously fell away from practicing their Catholic faith.

Starting November 19 (Wednesday), "Prayer before Jesus in the Holy Eucharist" will be offered at Historic St. Boniface Catholic Church from 6 p.m. to 7:15 p.m. every Wednesday on which faith formation for youth is held. I, Fr. Paul, will be present for that entire time. All are invited. I especially wish to invite the parents of youth in faith formation. As

parents, your lives are very busy with work and family. I invite you to take 15 minutes out of your busy day to pray quietly before Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. Our minds today are often distracted and occupied with the next thing we must do. For people like us, quiet prayer before the Eucharist is exactly what we need to find peace with Christ. Spend 15 minutes before Jesus in the Eucharist, and ask Him to speak to your heart. And then listen. Pray with silent words if you wish. But also ask Jesus to speak to you, and then listen. Discover why young Catholics love this prayer. Encounter the peace of Christ in a hectic world.

"Prayer before Jesus in the Holy Eucharist" at St. Boniface Church from 6 p.m. to 7:15 p.m. every "Faith Formation" Wednesday – starting November 19.

Come and go as you wish. Find peace in a few minutes of prayer. Encounter Jesus in prayer before the Holy Eucharist. In addition, we continue to offer Eucharistic Adoration at St. Meinrad Church every Wednesday from 3 to 4 p.m., before the 4:15 p.m. Mass.

Today the Church celebrates the dedication of the Lateran Basilica – the cathedral church of the Diocese of Rome. It was founded in A.D. 324, which makes it the oldest "public" church in Rome. Its founding followed the legalization of Christianity by Constantine in A.D. 313.

Since the Lateran Basilica is a place of God's dwelling, today's First Reading and Gospel focus on the Temple in Jerusalem, where God chose to dwell. Then in today's Second Reading (1 Corinthians 3), Paul tells fellow Christians: "You are God's building." Paul continues: "Do you not know that you are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwells in you?" In these two verses, "you" is plural. This means that the Christian faithful are together "the temple of God" and the dwelling place of the Holy Spirit.

The first reading is from Ezekiel, whose prophetic work has two main themes. First, God is allowing Jerusalem's enemies

to conquer it because of the sins of the people. Ezekiel describes God's judgment, and he calls on the people to repent. Second, God promises a future restoration of Jerusalem and its people. Ezekiel describes a future new Israel – a holy people. God will dwell among them in a new Temple in Jerusalem.

Today's reading (Ezekiel 47) describes that promised future. Accompanied by an angel, the prophet is given a vision of the new Temple: "The angel brought me back to the entrance of the temple, and I saw water flowing out from beneath the threshold of the temple toward the east." This water flowing out of the Temple represents God's life-giving power flowing out to transform and renew the land of Israel.

East of Jerusalem is the Judean Desert. Precious little rain falls there. Jericho is about 20 miles east of Jerusalem, with the Jordan River five miles farther east. Pilgrim buses today drive from Jerusalem through Jericho toward the Jordan River. Pilgrims look out at the dry, rocky soil of the Judean Desert.

About eight miles south of Jericho is the "Dead Sea" – one of the world's saltiest bodies of water – almost 10 times as salty as the ocean. The angel tells Ezekiel: "This water flows into the eastern district down upon the Arabah." The name "Arabah" describes the Jordan River Valley, plus the Dead Sea and the desert south of it. The angel explains that the water "empties into the sea, the salt waters, which it makes fresh." This vision has abundant fresh water flowing from the Jerusalem Temple, flowing through the Judean Desert, and then reaching the super-salty Dead Sea.

Ezekiel continues: "Wherever the river flows, every sort of living creature that can multiply shall live, and there shall be abundant fish." Also, abundant fruit trees "shall be watered by the flow

from the sanctuary" – that is, the Temple. God dwells in the Temple. Like water flowing out of the Temple, God will give life to his people – a restoration after Jerusalem's destruction.

Today's Gospel (John 2) is known as "the purification of the Temple." Jesus' actions recall the prophecy of Zechariah 14:21b: "No longer will there be merchants in the house of the LORD of hosts on that day."

These are the final words of Zechariah's prophetic text – well-known at the time of Jesus' earthly ministry. For Zechariah, "on that day" is an oft-repeated reference to the day of the Lord God's salvation of his people. When Jesus drives the merchants out of the Temple, his action announces that "the day of the Lord" has arrived – although many failed to recognize this. Jesus decisively inaugurates God's kingdom.

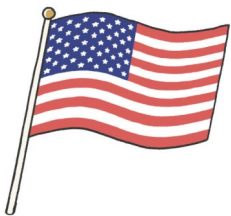
Jesus is asked: "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus' response confuses and alarms the people who do not understand Jesus' prophetic words: "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up" (John 2:19). The gospel narrator hastens to explain that Jesus is talking about "the temple of his body," and that Jesus' disciples realized this meaning later – after his resurrection.

The Temple in Jerusalem was recognized as the place of God's presence among his chosen people. When Jesus describes his own body as a temple, this emphasizes that Jesus is the powerful presence of God among humanity. We call this "the Incarnation" – that the son of God has become fully human, including his human body. God has chosen to dwell among us. Jesus' body is the temple of God's presence. John's Gospel describes this earlier: "And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of the Father's only Son" (John 1:14).

Dear Padre,

Should the pope get involved in American politics?

No, the pope should not get involved in the politics of any country. However, politics often intersects with religious concerns and particularly gospel values. When this occurs, the Holy Father has a responsibility to preach the gospel and defend the values the gospel teaches, even when it might sound political. He pronounces and teaches the values of the gospel, regardless of what nation or politician might feel confronted or challenged by what he teaches.

What often happens is, when politicians find themselves in conflict with the gospel values the pope is teaching, they choose to say, "The pope has no business in our politics," instead of listening. Completely understandable, at least from one perspective, but probably also disingenuous from another perspective. Politicians are fully aware of what is being proclaimed and why it is being proclaimed but choose not to listen. That, too, is completely understandable, if regrettable. One has to think only of the scribes and the Pharisees, and more particularly the high priest, who said, "Consider that it is better for you that one man should die instead of the people, so that the whole nation may not perish" (John 11:50). ●
