First Sunday of Advent (A)


Isaiah 2:1-5 / Romans 13:11-14 / Matthew 24:37-44

Waiting, but Quick!

This is the first Sunday of Advent, and the excitement is palpable. Writing 800 years before Christ, the prophet Isaiah sounds like breaking news: “They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks.” The psalmist announces we are already there: “And now we have set foot within your gates, O Jerusalem.” Saint Paul tickles our fancy with another whole round of “revelation” yet to come “on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ.” Only Jesus himself seems a little cautious: “Be watchful! Be alert!” The Lord “is coming,” but he’s not here yet. Leave it to Jesus to force the paradox for which Advent seems to have been created: Jesus is present, but we dare not “sleep,” lest we miss him!

How do we wait for Christmas? After Halloween, the Christmas lights go up, the carols start, the “Merry Christmas!” / “Happy Holidays!” debate begins. Lent is a time for repentance, alms, and fasting. But there’s no fasting in Advent: we fill bags with gifts and stockings with goodies. The Church tries to slow us down and encourage a little reflecting to prepare the way, led by John the Baptist. So let’s keep waiting; let’s hold on to our peace. Christmas Eve will be here soon enough. But let’s not be too austere. A full menu of holiday parties and concerts and family feasts can legitimately “anticipate” Christmas. Let’s cheer each other: Merry Advent! ●

PREPARING FOR SACRAMENTS/SACRAMENTAL EMERGENCY

Parishioners seeking sacraments should visit the Sacraments tab on our website to begin enrollment and required preparation. To access this information, enter "sacraments" in the search feature at sbcatholic.church or smcatholic.church.

Baptism Preparation: Families seeking baptism should contact Jessica Fischer, Evangelization and Discipleship Coordinator, to schedule preparation and formation sessions at least two months before the child's birth.

Marriage Preparation: Couples wishing to marry at St. Boniface or St. Meinrad churches must contact Jessica Fischer, Evangelization and Discipleship Coordinator, at least six months before their wedding date to arrange marriage preparation and formation sessions. At least one person in the couple must have been a parishioner for one year.

Anointing of the Sick: Contact the Parish Office to request a priest for this sacrament of healing. **If you require a priest due to severe illness or danger of death, please call 812-357-6600.** Be prepared to provide your name, location and contact information. The priest on call will respond as soon as possible.

Families should use this number immediately when a loved one is admitted to an area hospital, long-term care center or hospice. Hospital, long-term care and hospice chaplains do not always contact the Parish Office promptly, which can leave parishioners and families without needed parish-based pastoral care or the [Last Sacraments](#).

Chapter Summary

In the Old Testament, God promised to send a Savior, and He prepared His people for the Savior to come. The New Testament shows us that God kept His promise. Each year during Advent, we wait and do many things to prepare our hearts to celebrate the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ, at Christmas.

More for Parents

The best gift you can give your children this Christmas season is the gift of their faith. During Advent, spend time praying as well as reading the Bible and reading about the lives of the saints. Most of all, be a witness to the faith in everything you do. Teach by example, especially in small acts of kindness and forgiveness.

Our Family Prays Together

Dear God, thank You for Your love. Help us prepare our hearts for Jesus this Advent season. Amen.

Let's Talk about It as a Family

- *Did God's people have to wait a long time for the coming of the Savior? (Yes.)*
- *What do we call the four weeks of preparation for Christmas? (Advent.)*
- *What color do we use during Advent to remind us to be sorry? (Purple.)*
- *What do we use to count the weeks of Advent? (Advent wreath.)*

Let's Live Our Faith

Choose one or more of the following:

- Prepare for Christmas by having each family member tell that he is sorry for the wrongs he has done and asking for forgiveness. Talk about how God forgives us and how we should forgive those who have hurt us.
- Discuss some other things that your family can do during Advent to prepare your hearts for the coming of Jesus.

Family Faith Activities

Choose one or more of the following to do as a family:

- As parents, nurture the virtue of love in your family this Advent season. Have everyone in the family take turns doing random acts of kindness for one another. Each time someone makes an act of kindness, add a piece of straw to the empty manger (made out of a small paper lunch sack) to prepare for the coming of Jesus on Christmas.
- Make an Advent wreath for your kitchen table. (Instructions can be found on the parent portal.) Light the candles each night at dinnertime. Say a prayer asking Jesus to help your family prepare for His coming at Christmas.
- Help others who are less fortunate by adopting a family for Christmas through your parish. Let your children help pick out the gifts or food so that they can appreciate the gift of giving of themselves.

Rooted: Rediscover the Jesse Tree This Advent | Trailer

Hosted by Dr. Scott Hefelfinger, Rooted guides Catholics through a daily Advent reflection using the Jesse Tree model traditionally practiced by families. Each seven-minute episode introduces the ancestors of Jesus Christ, shares a Scripture passage, and offers an engaging, practical reflection.

PASTOR'S LETTER

Sunday Scripture Commentary by Father Paul Nord, OSB

First Sunday of Advent, Year A

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

Response: Psalm 122:1-9

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

Gospel: Matthew 24:37-44

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Today begins the season of Advent, in which we prepare our lives for the coming of Jesus Christ, our savior. Advent is a time to recommit ourselves to a life of prayer and Christian discipleship. During Advent, the daily and Sunday Mass readings emphasize our anticipation of Christ's coming. Celebrating Christmas without Advent is like having a wedding without an engagement. We need focused time to prepare our hearts for receiving God's greatest gift to us, Jesus Christ.

December 8 (Monday) is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. It is a Holy Day of Obligation. This means that we are expected to go to Mass, just like on Sunday. On that day, we will have a 4:15 p.m. Mass at St. Boniface, followed by a 6:15 p.m. Mass at St. Meinrad.

In honoring Mary's Immaculate Conception, we celebrate how God prepared Mary to be the mother of his only Son – by causing Mary to be conceived without original sin, before her own birth. If you have ever worn or seen a "Miraculous Medal," you might know the prayer on that medal: "O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee."

Today we begin a new liturgical year with the first Sunday of Advent. The liturgical season of Advent prepares for Christmas, in which we celebrate the Incarnation – the Son of God, Jesus Christ, who became man. "Advent" means "come to." That is, during Advent we prepare for Christ "coming to" us.

As we begin Advent (Year A), the Responsorial is Psalm 122. It describes pilgrims journeying to Jerusalem for a major feast: "now we have set foot within your gates, O Jerusalem." They would gather around the Temple – "the house of the Lord."

Psalm 122 anticipates entering into God's presence, praising his work of salvation: "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord!" In Christ's incarnation, Jesus came to us as a little child, and then as a man, he died for our sins. But instead of us going to "the house of the Lord," God has come to us – Emmanuel. This is God's action, not our own. We respond with rejoicing.

Psalm 122 was used for the Responsorial also last Sunday, the last week of Ordinary Time (Year C). At the end of the liturgical year, we looked forward to Christ's return at the end of this age, when he will destroy sin and death forever. In his second coming, Christ will come to us in glory, re-creating heaven and earth anew.

Advent is a season of hope and preparation. We recall how the people of Israel prayed and waited centuries for God's redemption. The prophets foretold that God would send a "Messiah" (Christ) – one whom God anoints to save his people from oppression. Through the prophets, God prepared his people Israel – and all humanity – for salvation from sin and death.

Isaiah is most prominent among the prophets whose readings are chosen by the Church for the Advent liturgies. Many passages of Isaiah anticipate the coming of Jesus the Messiah, which heralds a new age. This "Messianic age" or "the Kingdom of God" is when all opposed to God will be defeated.

CATHOLIC CAMPAIGN FOR HUMAN DEVELOPMENT WORKING ON THE MARGINS

The Catholic Church has always taught us, through the words of Sacred Scripture and the witness of saints like Francis of Assisi, that the natural world is created by God, that it is good, and that humans have a special duty to care for creation so that it benefits not only themselves but also future generations. Today we live in a time where pollution, climate change, and poor agricultural practices harm creation and place us all in danger.

In 2015, Pope Francis responded to this environmental crisis by issuing the encyclical *Laudato Si'* (On Care for Our Common Home), in which he emphasizes the connection between humanity and nature and calls for "the whole human family together to seek a sustainable and integral development" (no. 13).


This spirit of cooperation, sustainability, and human dignity animates the work of organizations like La Cosecha Community Supported Agriculture, a cooperative farm network in Albuquerque, New Mexico, which makes

locally grown, sustainable, and nutritious foods available to low-income people. With support from the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), La Cosecha has expanded its outreach beyond Albuquerque to 11 rural New Mexico counties, increased year-round accessibility to healthy produce and other food products, and obtained a US Department of Agriculture Good Agricultural Practices food-safety certification for its cooperative farm partners.

CCHD-funded organizations show how we can care for the environment, address the needs of the poor, and support responsible and sustainable local businesses at the same time. When you participate in the CCHD collection, you help not only other communities but also your own, because 25% of your contribution remains in your diocese to create local solutions to poverty.



Isaiah's prophecy begins (Isaiah 1) with a formal introduction of Isaiah as the "son of Amoz," who had a vision. Today's reading (Isaiah 2) has a similar formal introduction, which indicates that the text is a prophetic vision about "days to come." Both introductions describe Isaiah's visions as "concerning Judah and Jerusalem."

The prophecy is this: "the mountain of the LORD's house shall be established as the highest mountain... All nations shall stream toward it." This anticipates all earth's peoples seeking salvation from "the God of Jacob." For this reason, "many peoples" shall say "let us climb the LORD's mountain...that he may instruct us in his ways."

The reading takes a new turn: "For from Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem." The imagery is symmetrical - many peoples *stream towards Jerusalem*, and the word of the Lord *"shall go forth" - from Jerusalem* to all the world. God "shall judge between the nations" - imposing peace and justice.

Consequently, these many peoples "shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks." These instruments of war shall be converted into tools of food production. The Lord will command that "one nation shall not raise the sword against another" anymore. The present age of violence shall end - replaced by God's justice.

The reading closes with this exhortation: "O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!" Reading this prophecy motivates us to repent, that we may live lives that reflect God's holiness. During this Advent season, we anticipate Christ's coming. Together we pray as Christ taught us: "Our Father... thy kingdom come!"

Next, St. Paul writes to the Romans: "You know the time; it is the hour now for you to awake from sleep." "Our salvation" has now drawn near - "the night is advanced, the day is at hand." This compares the present age of sin and death to the darkness of

night. But dawn will come soon - the coming of Christ is soon. With this urgency, Paul gives the Christians of Rome this exhortation: "Let us then throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us conduct ourselves properly as in the day." Again, "light" is associated with living holy lives. "Darkness" is an image of sin. Paul lists sins to avoid: "not in orgies and drunkenness, not in promiscuity and lust, not in rivalry and jealousy."

Paul then says: "But *put on* the Lord Jesus Christ" (v. 14). This is *"clothing"* language. It likely reflects the Christian practice of "putting on" a white garment when we are baptized in the name of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. This echoes Paul's earlier exhortation *"put on the armor of light"* (v. 12).

Again, Paul exhorts us to turn away from sin: "make no provision for the desires of the flesh." In baptism, we *"put on"* Christ like a garment. Paul repeatedly uses this language in his letters. Christ covers and transforms us in his image and likeness.

In the Gospel, Jesus teaches his disciples about how "it will be at the coming of the Son of Man." This is about Christ's second coming. As we profess in the Nicene Creed: Jesus Christ "will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead."

Jesus - "the Son of Man" - compares his second coming to "the day that Noah entered the ark." Noah and his family were rescued from the flood, but many others perished. We now await "the coming of the Son of Man."

We are like those people *before the flood*, in "the days of Noah." Like them, we are "eating and drinking," and rejoicing with those newly married. But the joys of our present moment will end. We must be ready for Christ's approaching judgment. Jesus tells his disciples: "stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come." This Advent season, may we be ready - indeed eager - for Christ's return.

Qualified Charitable Distribution

A qualified charitable distribution remains a tax-free way to give to your parish or other qualified 501(c)(3) organizations, including funds managed by the Catholic Community Foundation and the Community Foundation Alliance of Perry and Spencer Counties.

You must be at least age 70½ to use a qualified charitable distribution. Beginning in 2023, Required Minimum Distribution begins at age 73. Check with your financial advisor for guidance.

In recent years, some parishioners have adopted this practice to meet their annual stewardship obligations with a yearly tax-free gift to support parish ministries, programs and activities. Others have designated their qualified charitable distribution as a perpetual gift to one or more parish endowments to support ongoing and future pastoral ministries or the long-term care of church buildings or cemeteries.

Dear Padre,

Is Advent a penitential season?

Strictly speaking, the penitential times in the Church are “every Friday of the whole year and the season of Lent” (*Code of Canon Law*, 1250). Advent is a time to prepare for Christmas when Christ’s First Coming is remembered, and this remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ’s Second Coming at the end of time. (See *Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year and the General Roman Calendar*, 39.) While Advent is more anticipatory than penitential, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops states, “Advent also includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas.” Although, historically, Advent was similar to Lent as a forty-day period of prayer and fasting, it was less severe than the season preceding Easter, and it lacked uniformity in the Western Church. The Eastern Church still begins the Nativity Fast on November 15, while in the Western Church, Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas.

Regardless, the significant focus of Advent is our Lord’s coming (*adventus* in Latin). The Church reflects this anticipation of Advent through such practices as limiting floral arrangements in the sanctuary, simpler liturgical music, and omitting the Gloria at Mass until Christmas. We can also reflect the anticipation of Advent through such spiritual practices as participation in works of charity, moderation in shopping, celebration of the sacrament of penance, fasting on Fridays, and prayerful contemplation on our Savior’s Incarnation. ●
