That Our Wounds Might Be Quickly Healed

Some years ago, I took a crash course in chaplaincy. Chaplains are often called on to accompany people through life's gloomier seasons—be it in a hospital, in a nursing home, in prison, or following a disaster. As you might imagine, our training involved sessions on how to best alleviate the isolation and despair many people experience in these places and situations. Pray with people? Invite them outside into nature? Make sure physical discomfort is mitigated? All of these are good practices, my chaplain supervisor emphasized, but research indicates that the quickest way to lift the heaviness many feel is to get them involved in alleviating the suffering of others.

I suspect neither Isaiah nor Jesus would have been surprised by this research. In today's first reading, Isaiah says that if we feed the hungry and give shelter to the homeless, if we clothe the naked and care for our family members in need, we will know what it means to have light in the midst of darkness, and our gloom will melt away as if under the noonday sun. Similarly, Jesus describes our good deeds as being like light, meant to be shared generously with others.

In recent years, we have seen an uptick in depression and anxiety, even among the young. We can be tempted to focus more inwardly on our own lives, our own griefs and shortcomings. Self-awareness is certainly a good trait to have! But, perhaps counterintuitively, today's readings remind us that our "wounds shall quickly be healed" more readily when we focus on the needs of others. ●

PREPARING FOR SACRAMENTS/SACRAMENTAL EMERGENCY

Parishioners seeking sacraments should visit the Sacraments tab on our website to begin enrollment and required preparation. To access this information, enter "sacraments" in the search feature at sbcatholic.church or smcatholic.church.

Baptism Preparation: Families seeking baptism should contact Jessica Fischer, Evangelization and Discipleship Coordinator, to schedule preparation and formation sessions at least two months before the child's birth.

Marriage Preparation: Couples wishing to marry at St. Boniface or St. Meinrad churches must contact Jessica Fischer, Evangelization and Discipleship Coordinator, at least six months before their wedding date to arrange marriage preparation and formation sessions. At least one person in the couple must have been a parishioner for one year.

Anointing of the Sick: Contact the Parish Office to request a priest for this sacrament of healing. **If you require a priest due to severe illness or danger of death, please call 812-357-6600.** Be prepared to provide your name, location and contact information. The priest on call will respond as soon as possible.

Families should use this number immediately when a loved one is admitted to an area hospital, long-term care center or hospice. Hospital, long-term care and hospice chaplains do not always contact the Parish Office promptly, which can leave parishioners and families without needed parish-based pastoral care or the [Last Sacraments](#).

This statement does not include nondeductible gifts, according to IRS guidelines for churches and religious organizations.

Beginning February 1, here's how to get your statement:

1. Sign in to your Realm site, using the RealmConnect smartphone app or visit [OnRealm.org](#). [<https://onrealm.org/>]
2. Click **Giving** in the main menu.
3. Click **Contribution Statement** for the current year.
4. Click **Print**. A preview of your statement will display.
5. Click the printer icon for a physical copy or download for a PDF.
6. If you need assistance, type "leave a message" in the search box of the parish website and fill out the form so you can receive another invitation to your account.

Parishioners who do not have an email account on record on January 31, 2026, will receive a giving statement via the U.S. Postal Service, as well as parishioners whose primary address is at a long-term care center.

All other requests to receive a mailed giving statement are to be received in writing by February 6, 2026.




Lent 2026:

Rice Bowls will be on courtesy tables after that weekend. Parishioners in long-term care centers have already received them.





It is our custom to take those blessed palms, burn them, and use them for the ashes that, next year, are sprinkled or traced on our heads as a reminder that we "are dust and to dust we shall return."

St. Boniface Parish Schedules Fish Fries on Two Fridays During Lent









First Reading: Isaiah 58:7-10

Response: Psalm 112:4-9

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 2:1-5

Gospel: Matthew 5:13-16

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, Many thanks to everyone who helped with the Christmas decorations at both St. Boniface and St. Meinrad parish churches. I appreciate your effort in both assembling the Christmas decorations and also in putting them away. They made our beautiful churches even more beautiful. The decorations honored well the Incarnation of Jesus Christ, who has chosen to share our human nature to redeem us.

The season of Lent is approaching fast, with Ash Wednesday on February 18. This bulletin's calendar (page 15) shows the schedule for Ash Wednesday. We will offer four services, including both in the morning and in the evening to accommodate the daytime work schedule. May Lent be a time of renewal for each of us in our lived faith. Please note that "little black" Lenten Prayer booklets will be provided by the parish starting this weekend (February 7-8).

Page 5 of the bulletin gives information on how to acquire your 2025 Financial Statement. Thank you for your generosity in supporting the ministry of St. Boniface and St. Meinrad parishes. As I adjust to the responsibilities of being pastor, I am learning much about how to ensure the financial well-being of our parishes – now and in the future. I am grateful for all parishioners' contributions to make our parishes' ministries possible.

In this passage of Isaiah, the Lord commands the Israelites to "share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the homeless; clothe the naked when you see them, and do not turn your back on your own."

The preceding verses speak of fasting and other forms of self-sacrifice. The message is if we deny ourselves earthly comforts, then we can provide for others in their urgent need. This exhortation specifically applies to fellow Israelites – "do not turn your back on your own" – literally "your own flesh," your own relation.

If the Israelites keep the Lord's command, then they will receive the Lord's blessing. This blessing is described by a series of metaphors: (1) your light breaking like dawn, (2) your wound being quickly healed, and (3) "the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard."

The first two metaphors compare God's blessing to these natural phenomena: the dawn's light and the body's healing. The last metaphor compares God's blessing to a military force that protects the Israelites where they are most vulnerable.

Verse 9 begins with two lines of synonymous parallelism: "you shall call...you shall cry for help" and "the Lord will answer...he will say 'Here I am.'" The pattern is: call, answer, call, and answer. The message is clear: if the Israelites want the Lord God to respond to their cries for help, then they must care for the hungry, oppressed, and poor. They are also exhorted to "remove from your midst oppression, false accusation and malicious speech." These are sins that cause internal division within the people of Israel.

Verse 10 exhorts the Israelites: "if you bestow your bread on the hungry... then light shall rise for you in the darkness." Essentially the same exhortation was given in verse 7. The "light" metaphor is further developed: "and the gloom shall become for you like midday."

This is the brightest time of day – midday. The psalmist contrasts the midday sun

Chapter 19: Our Life in Christ

We are truly happy and fulfilled when we choose to live in God's love and goodness.

Chapter Summary

The Beatitudes show us how to imitate Jesus and live like Him (see Matthew 5:3–12). They show us the rewards promised to those who live virtuously and according to the Beatitudes. By living the Beatitudes, we can live truly happy and fulfilled lives in union with God on earth. Additionally, through grace, we can receive perfect happiness and complete beatitude with God in Heaven. God created us with free will. The choice is ours to love God or to turn away from Him. When we make choices for the good, we grow in holiness by imitating Christ and we become truly free.

More for Parents

The Beatitudes Jesus gave us are countercultural yet lead us to true happiness. Today, our children are constantly told that wealth, pleasure, and comfort will lead to true happiness. Additionally, the constant stimulation of screens lulls us and our children into a dull comfort that distracts us from God and the needs of those suffering around us. But in the Beatitudes, Christ boldly claims that the things of this world will not offer true happiness. If we look at Christ, we see a Person who did not pacify Himself with passing comforts and security. His Heavenly Father was His comfort and strength. We are called to live like Christ and according to the grace and virtues we have received in order to live for God and His beatitude.

Virtue in the Family

If we want to know what makes for true happiness and right living, we need to look to Jesus Himself. We can be more like Him by focusing on Him and the Beatitudes.

Living the Beatitudes like Christ

- Family prayer activity
 - Read and reflect on the following Scripture passage: “Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ” (1 Corinthians 11:1).
 - Saint Paul was asking us to see him as a role model because he was living like Christ.
 - Do you show others how to be like Jesus through your example?
 - Quietly reflect on ways you fail to be like Jesus or succeed in being like Jesus.
 - Conclude by praying, “Jesus, form us to be more like You in all we do. Amen.”
- Choose one of the eight Beatitudes to focus on during the week. Make the Beatitude a theme of prayer together.
- Discuss the different things that are trending or popular right now, like styles or games. Compare them to what was popular when you were your children’s age. What makes people temporarily happy changes all the time, whereas God will always make us happy.

with the thick darkness of night. Thus shall be God's blessing for the Israelites – it shall transform complete darkness into brightest day.

Psalm 112 begins: "Hallelujah! Blessed the man who fears the LORD, who greatly delights in his commands" (112:1). The whole psalm is dedicated to describing the actions of "the just man," who keeps God's just commands. The just person is compared to light shining in darkness (112:4).

Injustice is a kind of "darkness" that can be dispelled by the "light" of one person acting with justice. The just person "shall never be moved ... his heart is firm ... [and] steadfast" (112:6-8). Such a person is firmly committed to doing justice. "Trusting in the Lord," he perseveres in righteous deeds.

The just man "is gracious and merciful and just." The previous psalm (Ps 111:3-4) describes the Lord God as having the same qualities. By his actions, the just person participates in God's righteousness.

The just man "is gracious and lends ... lavishly he gives to the poor" (112:5,9). Justice always requires special attention to the needy and vulnerable. The just person recognizes the needs of the poor and responds with generosity.

From First Corinthians, this passage (2:1-5) continues Paul's contrast of God's wisdom versus human wisdom in 1:18-31. Paul insists that he did not rely on human wisdom when he came "proclaiming the mystery of God" to the Corinthians.

Instead, Paul proclaimed only "Jesus Christ, and him crucified" (2:2). The cross of Jesus is the wisdom of God. As Paul said in 1:23-24: "we proclaim Christ crucified... to those who are called... Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God."

Although Christ crucified is God's wisdom, the world sees the crucifixion as foolishness.

Paul continues: "I came to you in weakness and fear and much trembling." Paul's weakness is consistent with the cross of Christ, which displayed Christ's weakness. This is the opposite of relying

on "persuasive words of wisdom." Instead, Paul depended upon "a demonstration of Spirit and power" to persuade his hearers. By knowing "the power of God" – manifest in Jesus Christ, Paul's hearers would not place their faith "on human wisdom."

Today's Gospel continues Jesus' "Sermon on the Mount" found in Matthew 5-7. In the preceding "Beatitudes" (5:1-12), Jesus teaches that his disciples should strive for "the kingdom of heaven," instead of seeking earthly prestige or comfort.

If Jesus' disciples live in this way, they can be powerful witnesses to Christ's Gospel. In Matthew 5:13-16, Jesus uses three metaphors – salt, light, and "a city on a mountain" – to illustrate how his disciples must be witnesses whose lives contrast strongly with the world around them.

"Jesus said to his disciples: 'You are the salt of the earth. But if salt loses its taste... It is no longer good for anything.'" Jesus' disciples must hold firmly to their belief in Christ's cross, by which they receive life. In this way, they preserve their "salty" nature, which contrasts strongly with the surrounding world.

Jesus also told his disciples: "You are the light of the world... your light must shine before others." This metaphor again emphasizes that Jesus' disciples must be witnesses to a world living in the darkness of not knowing Christ. Jesus explains that their witness will be seen in "your good deeds." This will lead others to "glorify your heavenly Father." Thus, the witness of Christ's disciples may lead others to belief in Christ.


Jesus also compares his disciples to "a city set on a mountain [which] cannot be hidden." The lives of Jesus' disciples will be seen by all. Their witness will either bring others to belief in Christ, or it will drive them away.

Jesus continues: "Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket; it is set on a lampstand, where it gives light to all in the house." This extends Jesus' words to his disciples: "You are the light of the world." A "lamp" is a powerful instrument for preserving and directing the light of a burning flame.

Dear Padre,

Are the readings at the beginning of Mass equal to the celebration of the Eucharist?

The Mass is celebrated in two major parts: the **Liturgy of the Word** and the **Liturgy of the Eucharist**. These parts complement each other in a balance of word and sacrament. In his 2004 apostolic letter *Mane Nobiscum Domine* (Stay With Us Lord), Pope St. John Paul II described these complementary elements. Using the story of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus on the night of Easter Sunday, the Pope likened the two parts of the revised liturgy to these disciples' journey. First, Christ breaks open the word for them, preparing their hearts with an interpretation of the Scriptures. Then, they recognize Christ as they break bread.

The Liturgy of the Word, proclaimed and preached well, allows time for silence and reflection on the wisdom offered. It becomes the necessary overture for the celebration of thanks and praise and the gift of the sign and sacrament to follow. Parishes are called to take the Liturgy of the Word most seriously and to bring it to a new level of proclamation. Pope St. John Paul II admonished all involved, but especially preachers, to cherish the word and preach it so the depths of the mysteries celebrated may be recognized and received into the burning hearts of Christians. In this context, the Scripture readings are given a prominence they didn't have in the older Roman rite. ●
