Creating a St. Joseph Altar is a popular way for people in Italy and other countries to celebrate the Feast Day of St. Joseph, Protector of the Family and Patron of the Universal Church

Come downstairs and experience it yourself at St. Thomas After the 9:00am and 11:00am Masses in Fr. Mac Hall. Pastries, donuts, fruit and coffee will be served. After the 11:00am Mass there will also be Italian food.

During medieval times, there was a famine in Sicily. St. Joseph answered their prayers, and the famine ended. In gratitude, they prepared a table with foods they had harvested. After paying homage to St. Joseph, they distributed the food to the less fortunate.

Breads, cakes and cookies, baked in symbolic Christian shapes, are prepared for the Altar. Pastries in the shapes of monstrances, chalices, crosses, doves, lambs, fish, bibles, hearts, wreaths and palms adorn the tiers of the Altar. Symbols of St. Joseph – such as lilies, staffs, sandals, ladders, saws, hammers and nails – are also used.



Liturgical Environment



Liturgy of the Hours

As we begin to learn about the Liturgy of the Hours this Lent, I would like us to focus on the name of this prayer: Liturgy of the Hours (also called the Divine Office).

This week, let's take a closer look at that first word: Liturgy.

The word liturgy comes from the Greek leitourgia, which means "a public duty or service." Now, a church "service" is different than other forms of "public duty" because, not only is it the work of the people, but the work of God through the people. This is emphasized in the older name for the Liturgy of the Hours: Divine Office, or "Divine Work." In fact, liturgy is "the common work of the Holy Spirit and the Church" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1091). So, while liturgy necessarily involves the work of the people, it is also our cooperation with God's work.

Gathering in church for public prayer (whether for Mass, other sacraments, or the Liturgy of the Hours) serves two purposes: the glory of God and our sanctification. When we gather to give glory to God, it is not because God is somehow in need of our praises; He is perfect within Himself. Rather, we are in need of praising Him. I think this truth comes out beautifully in a prayer often prayed in the preface of the Eucharistic prayer at Mass, "For, although you have no need of our praise, yet our thanksgiving is itself your gift, since our praises add nothing to your greatness but profit us for salvation."

This Lent, may we cooperate with God through our participation in the liturgy – showing Him honor and glory while becoming more holy ourselves.

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

GOSPEL MEDITATION - By Fr. John Muir

One of the most fascinating moments in American history is when George Washington could have become the king of the newly liberated United States and didn't. At the height of his power and fame, on Dec. 23, 1783, he resigned his commission as Commander-in-Chief, and went home. The astonished King of England remarked that in doing so, Washington was "the greatest man in the world." Greatness is often defined by what we could do but don't. Greatness is measured by the temptations we overcome.

Jesus' greatness is revealed in his victory over temptations, too. The three offered him by the devil contain, we might say, all potential possible temptations: food, power and fame. They correspond to the triple human needs of body, soul and spirit. In overcoming these three, he says "no" in essence to every and even the greatest temptation. We see that every desire of his humanity — body, soul and spirit — is perfectly united to God, to love. This is a power available to each member of his body. It is the path to true greatness. How can we, who so easily fall into even small temptations, find the power to overcome large ones? By entering into the great dynamics of Jesus' temptations.

Lenten challenge: This first week of Lent, list some concrete ways you can overcome temptations that correspond with your desires. For example, you may give up snacks between meals, choose not to participate in an activity of which you are an expert, and decide to reduce social media posting by 50%. It may not seem like much, but by saying "no" to the tyranny of food, power, and fame (in this example), you'll discover true greatness.

LIVE THE LITURGY – INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Christians have been making the sign of the cross since ancient times. It is not only an important component of formal liturgies and sacramental rites, but also a daily devotional practice whereby the faithful invoke the blessing and protection of God.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Question: Why do we start Lent by wearing ashes?

Ashes remind us of our mortality. After all, that's what we turn into when we die. And when we come face to face with our mortality, we tend to become more willing to get our lives in order and focus on what's really important. It's kind of like Ebenezer Scrooge facing up to his own death and deciding to mend his ways before it's too late. Well in the same way, we wear ashes in the shape of a cross on our foreheads to symbolize our willingness to change, to die to sin, and to be born to new life in Baptism.

Question: Why do we practice prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during Lent?

We call these three practices: prayer, fasting, and giving alms the Lenten disciplines. You'll notice that the word disciple and discipline share the same root from the Latin word "discere" which means to learn. It takes discipline to learn to be a disciple of Christ. And these three Lenten disciplines help us to learn how to follow Christ more closely. Prayer opens us up to God. Fasting purifies us. If we can control basic desires like hunger then we can learn to control stronger desires that pull us away from God. And finally, giving alms allows God's mercy to flow freely through us. We don't give alms to earn grace but in response to God's abundance and merciful grace that we ourselves have received.
