

In our first reading for Easter Sunday, St. Peter speaks to the crowds and explains the significance of Easter: The tomb is empty, Jesus has risen, and we have new hope for conquering our sinfulness and even death itself! Every Sunday is meant to be a little Easter. We gather around the altar to receive the Eucharist, which is the memorial of Jesus' saving death as well as his true and abiding presence among us. As we come to Mass each week, let us be intentional about celebrating each Sunday as a little Easter. If you have gotten out of the habit of doing so, I encourage you to come back and join us each week as we pray for the salvation of the world. Not only has Jesus overcome sin and death, but he also has entrusted us with the mission of living and sharing this saving faith. The world needs our witness!

The Octave of Easter concludes with Divine Mercy Sunday on April 27, a celebration of the mercy that comes to us through Jesus' saving death and resurrection. I hope you are all praying the Divine Mercy Novena already. If not, please give it a try so as to make the most of this coming Sunday. These red novena brochures are available in church. This Feast of Divine Mercy offers many graces. Please make a thorough confession within 2-3 weeks of Divine Mercy Sunday to receive these benefits:

The soul that will go to **Confession** and receive **Holy Communion** shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day are opened all the

divine floodgates through which graces flow. - Jesus to St. Faustina (Diary, #699)

Jesus, l'trust in you

The Feast of Mercy A Day of Extraordinary Grace

Sunday, April 27 at St. John Holy Hour: Adoration and Confession 1:00-3:15pm. Chaplet at 3:00pm.

In a series of revelations to St. Maria Faustina in the 1930s, our Lord repeatedly called for the celebration of the **Feast of Mercy on the first Sunday after Easter**. He promised an ocean of graces to be poured out on the world.

To receive these graces, you are asked to be merciful to others through deed, word and prayer. Make a good and sincere confession during Lent. Worthily receive Holy Communion on the Feast Day (or the Vigil). Venerate the image of The Divine Mercy. Trust in His Divine Mercy.

Jesus wants to give us so much we can't even fathom it. He promises, "Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death (687). When they say this Chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person, not as the just Judge but as the Merciful Savior (1541).

Jesus looked at me (St. Faustina) and said, Souls perish in spite of My bitter Passion. I am giving them the last hope of salvation; that is, the Feast of My Mercy. If they will not adore My mercy, they will perish for all eternity. Secretary of My mercy, write, tell souls about this great mercy of Mine, because the awful day, the day of My justice, is near (Diary, 965).



Christ is Risen!

Last week, we considered a distinguishing mark of true Christian prayer – that when we pray as members of the Body of Christ, we pray through Him, with Him, and in Him. This Easter, let's further consider our union with the Risen Christ.

In addition to likening the Church to a "Body," Scripture also uses the analogy of the Church as a "Bride." In fact, becoming "one Body" with Christ is a result of the Church's relation to Him as Bride. As Jesus says, quoting Genesis 2:24, "For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh" (Matthew 19:5). Because the Church is the Bride of Christ, we are identified as His very Body – becoming "one flesh" with Him.

While the love between Christ and the Church is symbolized by the union of husband and wife, there are also aspects of married love that are only found in human marriage. Therefore, our union with Jesus as the Bridegroom of the Church is a bit of a mystery – we know it is true but can't comprehend it totally. When Saint Paul quotes the verse from Genesis cited above, even he says, "This is a great mystery, but I speak in reference to Christ and the Church" (Ephesians 5:32).

One way to enter more deeply into this "great mystery" is by addressing the Lord out of the spousal relationship we share with Him. The Second Vatican Council describes the Liturgy of the Hours as "the voice of a bride addressing her bridegroom" (Sacrosanctum concilium, 84). In this prayer, the voice of Christ's Bride is united and calls out to Him as His devoted Spouse.

As the Risen Jesus encounters us anew this Easter, may we joyfully respond to Him with all the love of our hearts.

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC - BENEATH THE SURFACE By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

The Search

Everybody's trying to find God. They may not admit it. They may not even know it. They may talk around it, shy away from saying the name, both to others and to themselves: God. But I know for a fact that every person who was ever born into this world spent their lives searching for Him – somewhere, somehow, even if the only place they thought to look was in money or drugs.

It's a comforting fact, really — a reminder of how alike we all are. Catholic, Jewish, Muslim, atheist, rich, poor, Black, white. When it comes right down to it, the history of humanity is a never-ending Easter morning scene that plays in perpetuity. The sorrow, the shock, the confusion. Again and again, as each newborn baby opens his eyes, the search begins anew. Where did he go? What has happened? Where can I find him?

Catechesis isn't enough. Even those who learn about Jesus Christ, who accept his word, hang hesitantly outside the tomb, afraid to go in. Jesus' best friend — the disciple whom he loved — ran faster than Peter, so desperate he was to find his Lord. But when he got to the tomb and saw it empty, he got spooked. He froze.

Sometimes, we expect God to be right where we left Him — in a certain parish, with a certain priest, in a certain relationship, at a certain job. We show up, and we're heartbroken to see that our expectations have been turned upside down. He's left us, we think dejectedly, but we're wrong.

There is no one who has been abandoned by God. There are only those who stop looking for Him.

Don't let the empty tombs define you. It's the search that defines you.

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

There is an invitation in the empty tomb and the abandoned burial cloths. What great things could we accomplish, if we only believe that Christ has conquered death?

Go forth this Easter season, boldly embracing the hope of the resurrection.

DEVOTIONS- SEVEN Sorrows of Mary

The Seven Sorrows of Mary refer to seven key events in the lives of Jesus and Mary: the prophecy of Simeon, the flight into Egypt, the loss of the Child Jesus in Jerusalem, the meeting of Jesus and Mary as he carried his cross to Calvary, the Crucifixion and death of Jesus, the removal of the Body of Christ from the cross, and the burial of Jesus.

These events illustrate the great suffering endured by Our Lord and his Blessed Mother, and remind Christians to unite our own sufferings with those of Jesus, following Mary's perfect example.

Devotion to the sorrows of Mary dates to the early centuries of Christianity, with such proponents as St. Ephrem, St. Alphonsus Liguori and St. Bridget of Sweden.

The Seven Sorrows devotion can take the form of seven Hail Marys, seven Rosaries or a novena, all recited while meditating upon the individual sorrows.

Acts 5:12: Many signs and wonders were done among the people at the hands of the apostles.

Ps 118: Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, his love is everlasting.

Rv 1:17: When I caught sight of him, I fell down at his feet as though dead. He touched me with his right hand and said, "Do not be afraid."

Jn 20:19: On the evening of that first say of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for the fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you."






