

WELCOME



And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the Kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in

heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven.

The Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul falls on a Sunday this year, taking the place of the 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time. Our readings speak of the trials and tribulations of these apostles in giving witness to Jesus. Both apostles ultimately suffered martyrdom for their faith. But the authority given to St. Peter and the apostles - noted in today's Gospel - has been handed on carefully from generation to generation of bishops. In fact, the Catholic Church traditionally has three bishops participate in the ordination of every new bishop, just to make sure that the authority of Jesus to bind and loose is validly conferred. We are today's generation of Christian disciples, exercising the ministry and mission of Our Lord. Let us pray for Pope Leo and our bishops to use this authority faithfully and to lead us in this mission of salvation.

In response to the growing conflict in the Middle East and the recent US strike on Iranian nuclear facilities, let us follow the advice of our bishop – who has urged us to offer acts of fasting, prayer and almsgiving on the Fridays of June – as well as the pastoral encouragement of Pope Leo to pray for peace before this conflict spirals out of control.

Please stop by either church to pray for peace any chance you can get in the coming days. In addition to the usual efforts to pray the Holy Rosary before or after the daily liturgies, if you are available in the 3 o'clock Hour of Divine Mercy (the hour of Jesus' death on the cross), please come to St. Thomas (in the chapel) or St. John to pray the Holy Rosary and Divine Mercy Chaplet. Our Lady of Fatima in 1917 requested that the child visionaries <u>pray the Holy Rosary</u> daily for the end of WWI. If the Rosary is Our Lady's chosen instrument of peace, then let us

employ this spiritual weapon to overcome the strongholds of hatred and violence.

These daily Hour of Mercy prayers will continue through Thursday, July 3, ahead of the July 4th celebration of our nation's independence. On July 4th, the parish offices will be closed, but there will be a 9:00am Mass at St. Thomas with a Rosary beforehand at 8:35am.

On First Saturday, July 5, Fr. Gordon will give a presentation on the topic of Stigmatists & What They Reveal to Us. Come to Fr. Mac Hall after the 9:00am Saturday Mass at St. Thomas on July 5. Refreshments will be served.

Our next Concert in the Park(ing Lot) with our House Band is scheduled for Friday, July 11, at 7:00pm in front of the Grand Window at St. Thomas. The Outlaw Snack Society will be there at 6:00pm. Save the date!

Mass Intentions

Mass Intention books will be opened for 2026 starting June 30.

No Mass requests will be taken via email. Requests for Mass intentions must be requested by phone, in person in the Parish Office, or by mail.

A \$10 minimum stipend is requested as determined by diocesan policy is to accompany each Mass request. A Mass offering may be more than the suggested stipend. However, no one will be denied a Mass intention because of inability to pay. Simply let us know.

Guidelines for Mass Intentions

A Mass intention may be requested for: a deceased loved one; a living person who is sick or suffering; a living person who is celebrating a birthday, anniversary or other special moment in their life; in thanksgiving to God (including the Lord Jesus or the Holy Spirit); in thanksgiving for a prayer from a Blessed or a Saint; or for a prayer intention (so long as the intention does not contradict Church teaching), World Peace, Vocations, Respect for Life, Souls in Purgatory, etc. These intentions should be general and not specific to an individual.

Priests are requested, but are not required, to announce the name of the Intention aloud.

Regardless of if read aloud, please be assured the graces of the Holy Mass are still applied to the soul of the person or the special intention that you requested it be offered for.

As a parish, we will make every effort to accommodate a Mass for the passing of a loved one, on/near the anniversary of the first anniversary of a person's death.

Lengthy intention listings cannot be published in the Bulletin and must be edited for the sake of brevity.

Requests will be honored on a first-come, first serve basis in the order in which the request is received at the Parish Office.

The schedule of Mass intentions is subject to change according to the Mass schedule. There is no promise that they will be said on the scheduled day due to priest illness, schedule change, diocesan obligation, etc. Every attempt will be made to contact the concerned parties ahead of time, but that is not always possible. We will make every effort to reschedule the mass at a later date.

Attention Parents: Child Baptism



If you have a child or children who need to be baptized please do so before they turn 7 years old. While the Sacrament is the same for everyone, the preparation needed for the

Sacraments does differ depending on a person's age and circumstances. Unlike infants, a child 7 years old or older has attained the age of reason and needs to take a basic Catholic Faith formation course before baptism.

For those who are age 7 or older, they are capable of knowing right and wrong and therefore need to have a rudimentary grasp of the Catholic Faith before receiving the Sacrament of Baptism. These classes are often known as OCIC (Order of Christian Initiation for Children) Classes or Becoming Catholic. In the process, the child will likely also be studying for First Holy Communion, First Confession, and possibly Confirmation at the same time.

It is very difficult to have to let parents and children know that because they are seven or older they cannot receive First Reconciliation or First Communion with their classmates. They must take classes like anyone else who comes into the Church and receives all of their sacraments (even Confirmation) at Easter Vigil. If you have a small child who is not baptized, Schedule his/her baptism this summer!


Religious Education Registration NOW OPEN

On Pilgrimage

Before I embarked on my trip to the National Eucharistic Congress last summer with a group from my archdiocese, we had an orientation meeting. At that meeting, the coordinator of the trip shared with us "The Five Rules of Pilgrimage."

If you're not familiar with them (I wasn't), here they are:

Don't complain.

Don't complain. (It's so important, it's listed twice.)

When you see a bathroom, use it.

When someone offers you something, receive it.

When someone asks you for something, give it.

It's great advice for a pilgrimage, but more than that, I think it's great advice in general. So when I read today's Gospel and I hear Jesus say essentially the same thing to his disciples as they set out to evangelize (well, minus the bathroom tip, but those weren't as much of a thing in biblical Judea), I come to an important realization.

The whole Christian life is a pilgrimage.

Too often, life falls short of my expectations. An opportunity didn't work out. A day didn't go the way I planned (like, at all). A person didn't accept me. And I ball up my fists and stomp my feet like a full-grown Veruca Salt, and I yell: I cannot work in these conditions!

And then, I imagine God, on his celestial throne, sighs and opens the Book of the Gospels (surely he keeps it handy, don't you think?) to Luke, Chapter 10. And he whispers in my heart what he said to his disciples 2,000 years ago.

Don't complain. Be open and give of yourself, and in turn, receive what comes your way, whatever it is. If it's good, rejoice. If it's not good, move on. And in the end, remember where you're headed — the place you're trying to go.

Oh, and again: don't complain.

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Reflect on how life itself is a pilgrimage, with ups and downs, challenges, and moments of profound beauty.

DEVOTIONS EXPLAINED Pilgrimage

When the time came for the Transfiguration of Christ, Jesus took three of his disciples to "a high mountain by themselves," indicating that the sacred mysteriousness of this moment was something best experienced apart from the routine of ordinary life. This is the principle behind the act of pilgrimage: a journey to a place of spiritual significance, undertaken by one who is seeking closeness to Heaven while still on Earth.

Christian pilgrimages really began in the fourth century, when churches in the Holy Land were constructed in locations associated with the life of Christ. Throughout the centuries, pilgrims have likewise flocked to sites of Marian apparitions, miracles, and to places connected with the lives of saints.

2025, is a Jubilee Year, a period of special grace and spiritual renewal, will be celebrated by Catholics worldwide. This year is particularly significant as the theme is "Pilgrims of Hope," encouraging people to seek hope in a world facing various challenges. Pilgrimages during this period are especially meaningful, offering opportunities to visit holy sites, receive plenary indulgences, and deepen faith.







How Suffering Can Make Us Full Of Grace By Nate Guyear

God's grace gives our struggles and sufferings meaning and gives us countless opportunities to grow in grace. When we embrace our struggles with courage, humility, and a love for God, we utilize the grace God gives us to grow in even greater grace. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that suffering can make us more like Jesus, increase our blessedness, and be an acceptable sacrifice to God (all emphases mine): By his passion and death on the cross, Christ has given a new meaning to suffering: it can henceforth configure us to him and unite us with his redemptive Passion (par. 1505). Paul writes, "... we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Rom. 5:3-5).


