

#### FROM MSGR. SCHUMACHER, Pastor

Catholics today live in a society that can seem far from that which Jesus lived in, over 2,000 years ago. While societal norms and practices may have changed, what is not different is the Catholic's belief in the Eucharist. From the very beginning, the Church has believed and celebrated according to the teaching of Jesus himself: Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him (Jn 6:54-56). As St. Justin Martyr said in the second century, "It is not "ordinary bread and ordinary drink" that we receive in the Eucharist, but the flesh and blood of Christ, who came to nourish and transform us, to restore our relationship to God and to one another." (First Apology, LXVI)

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) in 2022 launched

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) in 2022 launched a 3-year initiative called the National Eucharistic Revival, stating "The Church has withstood scandal, division, disease and doubt throughout human history. But today we confront all of them, all at once. In the midst of these roaring waves, Jesus is present, reminding us that he is more powerful than the storm. By uniting us once again around the source and summit of our faith in the celebration of the Eucharist, the entire Catholic Church in the U.S. responds to Jesus' divine invitation to heal, renew, and unify the Church."

We kicked off the Year of Parish Revival on our Feast Day, Corpus Christi Sunday, with a Eucharistic Procession at all the Masses. This newsletter will highlight the upcoming events at Corpus Christi that invite you to "Experience Eucharistic Revival — Encounter Christ's True Presence." As Catholic Christians, we know we need Christ's presence in our lives and I would add, our souls are drawn to Him. Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you (Jn 6:53). Jesus accompanies us in various ways, but nothing compares to our encounter with him in the Eucharist. Christ nourishes and feeds our souls with his very self, binding us together as the Body of Christ. Perhaps a good place to start our journey towards Eucharistic Revival is understanding the Eucharist as a sacrifice. All that Jesus did for the salvation of the world is made present every time we celebrate Mass. "The Eucharistic Feast is not simply another sacrifice, but the re-presentation of Christ's Sacrifice." (Council of Trent, Session 22, Doctrine of the Sacrifice of the Mass) Your "Amen" after receiving the Body and Blood of Christ is a profession of faith in the Real Presence in the Eucharist — the source and summit of our faith!

#### Is the Eucharist a symbol?

The transformed bread and wine are truly the Body and Blood of Christ and are not merely symbols. They are transubstantiated when Christ says:

### "This is my body" "This is my blood"

Though the bread and wine appear the same to our human faculties, they are actually the real body and blood of Jesus.

#### Eucharist = Thanksgiving

#### The four pillars of Eucharistic Revival

- 1. Reinvigorate worship
- 2. Create moments of encounter
- 3. Engage in robust formation/teaching
- 4. Send forth as missionaries to teach family and friends about the True Presence

To commemorate the building of the Corpus Christi Rectory during the USCCB's National Eucharistic Revival, a Eucharistic mural of the Last Supper is currently being painted for the dining room in the new rectory. Partially portrayed here, the canvas will be 9 feet by 13 feet and is anticipated to be completed by November 19, when Msgr. Schumacher hosts Bishop David Kagan's birthday dinner.

#### Why does Jesus give himself as the Eucharist?

Jesus gives himself to us in the Eucharist as spiritual nourishment because he loves us. By eating the Body and drinking the Blood of Christ in the Eucharist, we become united to the person of Christ through his humanity.

### "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him" (Jn 6:56).

In being united to the humanity of Christ, we are at the same time united to his divinity. Our mortal and corruptible natures are transformed by being joined to the source of life.

By his Real Presence in the Eucharist Christ fulfills his promise to be with us "always, until the end of the age" (Mt 28:20). As St. Thomas Aquinas wrote, "It is the law of friendship that friends should live together. . . . Christ has not left us without his bodily presence in this our pilgrimage, but he joins us to himself in this sacrament in the reality of his body and blood" (Summa Theologiae, III q. 75, a. 1). With this gift of Christ's presence in our midst, the Church is truly blessed. As Jesus told his disciples, referring to his presence among them, "Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it" (Mt 13:17). In the Eucharist the Church both receives the gift of Jesus Christ and gives grateful thanks to God for such a blessing. This thanksgiving is the only proper response, for through this gift of himself in the celebration of the Eucharist under the appearances of bread and wine Christ gives us the gift of eternal life.

Dr. Feingold will be presenting at the Diocese of Bismarck Spring Clergy Conference and will offer an evening focused on the Eucharist for the laity of the Diocese at Corpus Christi.

Dr. Lawrence Feingold is a Professor of Theology and Philosophy at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary, St. Louis. He and his wife Marsha, both Hebrew Catholics, entered the Church in 1989. Dr. Feingold studied Philosophy and Theology at the Pontifical University of the Holy Cross in Rome, and Biblical Hebrew and Greek at the Studium Biblicum Franciscanum in Jerusalem. Previously he taught at House of Formation of Miles Christi, Argentina; Ave Maria University; and since 2011, at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary. He is also the Director of Theology for the Association of Hebrew Catholics.

What is a Eucharistic Pilgrimage? The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage is a truly unique initiative. This is something NEW—a beautiful fusion of the

journey TO Jesus and the journey WITH Jesus. This will be one of the largest Eucharistic pilgrimages in history. Just as crowds followed Christ throughout his earthly ministry, our nation will process with our Eucharistic Lord through cities, along highways, and past rural towns on his way to the 10th National Eucharistic Congress. In keeping with this vision, the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage will accompany Jesus from city to city, lighting hearts on fire along the way. The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage features 4 routes, 48 perpetual pilgrims, 60 days on the road and 6,500 miles traveled. All culminating at the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis.



#### **EUCHARISTIC PROCESSIONS**

This year for the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, and to commence the Parish Year of the Eucharistic Revival, we celebrated our feast day with Eucharistic Processions at all the weekend Masses. We received overwhelmingly positive reactions from our parishioners and others who were in attendance. We do plan on making this an annual devotion on Corpus Christi Sunday in years to come. Everything came



together beautifully to prepare for the procession. A new monstrance, with a 6½ inch luna (casing for the consecrated host) was donated by a parish family and was one of the sources of inspiration for the procession. (The new monstrance is also featured in this newsletter.) The processional canopy was donated by another parish family in memory of their father, a Corpus Christi founding member, who had recently passed away. The family also donated four candle torches that will be used in processions and various liturgies for years to come.

#### RECTORY CHAPEL UPDATE

The work in the rectory chapel is now complete. The six stained glass windows were installed by Gaytee-Palmer Stained Glass (Minneapolis, MN) in July. The smaller windows on the south wall, above the Tabernacle, are images of the Eucharist—wheat, chalice, grapes. The larger windows on the west wall, whose shape reflect the windows of the church chapel, feature Christ on the cross, flanked by two adoring angels.

The last piece that completed the chapel was a unique lighting fixture that highlights the ceiling stenciling.

The chapel was designed by Alan Warmka with Fr. Obrigewitch and Msgr. Schumacher. The ceiling reflects the heavens and the medallion in the floor reflects the ocean (ground). In the middle, reflected through the altar and the stained glass windows, are Christ and His Sacrifice. It is a beautiful and meditative space for our priests and their guests.




