

LIVE THE LITURGY

As we celebrate today's feast, we are reminded that God creates and fashions each one of us with intent and purpose. We are not random accidents. We are special creations and wonderfully made. Each of us brings a unique twist to the one shot at life that we are given. As people of faith and children of God, we are asked to use our specialness to announce God's kingdom. Each of us reveals a unique part of God's face. Each day presents opportunities to communicate our faith to others and to reveal God's mercy. We have the means to point the way to Christ. How can we show Jesus to others today?

WHY ARE WE CELEBRATING THE BIRTH OF JOHN THE BAPTIST THIS WEEKEND?

Two weeks ago we began Ordinary Time, but this Sunday we celebrate the Birth of John the Baptist instead of the 12th Sunday. Did you ever wonder why some feasts replace the Sunday liturgy — but not for all Sundays? How does a priest know what to celebrate on what day?

The easiest way to determine the readings is to check the Ordo — a small yearly church calendar. The Ordo is based on the principles in the General Norms for the Liturgical Year. These norms include a ranking of days called "precedence." Some occasions "out rank" or "take precedence" over others.

Sunday is the first day of the week, also known as the "Lord's Day." This weekly celebration of the paschal mystery has been our tradition since the time of the Apostles. Because it is the day of Christ's resurrection, the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (SC) and the Norms for the Liturgical Year (GNLY) describe Sunday as "the first holy day of all" (SC 106, GNLY 4). Therefore, the Sunday celebration gives way only to solemnities or feasts of the Lord. (But not always — keep reading to find the exceptions.)

The liturgical year is divided into various blocks of time which we formerly call *seasons*: Advent, Christmas, Ordinary Time, Lent, Easter and another period of Ordinary Time.

Advent marks the beginning of the liturgical year. Lent is a major preparation period for Easter. During these major times, NOTHING takes precedence over or replaces the liturgy of the Sunday.

So when Dec. 8, our patronal feast and holy day of obligation, falls on Sunday in Advent, the Immaculate Conception is celebrated on Dec. 9 because the Advent Sunday outranks the solemnity. Or, when the Annunciation or Solemnity of St. Joseph falls on a Sunday in Lent, solemnities are transferred because Sundays in Lent outrank them.

Certain solemnities are transferred to Sunday when they are not celebrated as days "of obligation." In our country this happens with Epiphany, the Ascension, and Corpus Christi. Others feasts are also permanently assigned to Sunday: the Holy Family and the Baptism of the Lord, and the solemnities of the Holy Trinity and Christ the King.

But things are different during Ordinary Time. Solemnities of the Lord, the Blessed Virgin, and saints listed in the General Calendar take precedence over these Sundays. This year, the Nativity of John the Baptist is celebrated, because it "outranks" the 12th Sunday of ordinary time. In some years this also happens with Aug. 15 (the Assumption), Christmas, Nov. 1 (All Saints), and Jan. 1. That seems to make sense because they are holy days "of obligation."

But other solemnities not among the days of obligation also "out rank" Sundays in ordinary time. Occasionally Nov. 9 (the Dedication of the Church of St. John Lateran), or Sept. 14, the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, falls on a Sunday and is celebrated because it outranks the Sunday.

Most of us don't even think about this. When we come to church, we know that the priest is using the proper texts. But those who pray the Liturgy of the Hours or read the Scriptures to prepare for Mass want to know what will be celebrated. That's why weekly bulletins often print the readings or citations for Mass throughout the week.


