

## *Incoming 7th Grade Summer Reading Assignment*

All work will be turned in by Friday Sep 5, 2025 . Anything completed digitally should be turned into the Google classroom once they get their chromebooks. Printed work can be turned in anytime on or before the due date. \*Note there are many excellent books to choose from; so if you want to read more than one, please do so!

4. Fiction Directions for One Pager (use if you read a fiction book)
5. Non-fiction Directions for One Pager (use if you read a non-fiction book)
6. **Rubric - please read the rubric and the checklist on the last page of the packet**

**Step #1:** Read **one** of the book options listed below.

**Step #2:** On **lined** paper or a Google Slide/Doc - write a summary of the book

- **SUMMARY-**
  - Write sentences explaining the setting (time and place) and the key events that took place in the story. Use details from the story in your summary and include what you think the theme is (main message) and why it's the theme.

**Step #3:** use **one** of the provided character consideration sheets to complete a character sketch for the main character (or one of the main characters)

- **CHARACTERIZATION-** fill out the graphic organizer for one character from the book you chose

**Step #4:** One pager

- **ONE PAGER-**
  - Complete it digitally or on **white paper**. This is meant to be a creative project. Follow the directions but **think outside the box!** I've included an overall directions sheet and a specific directions sheet for both fiction and nonfiction.
- **THE ENTIRE PIECE OF CONSTRUCTION PAPER SIZE PAPER SHOULD BE FILLED.**
  - *I will post an example of a one pager on my school website before the end of June - please check if you need guidance!*

### 3. City of Ember by Jeanne DuPrau

“An underground city built as a refuge, residents live in darkness, relying on artificial light. When the city's power begins to fail and supplies dwindle, two children, Lina and Doon, discover clues hinting at a way out, forcing them to risk everything to save their city and find a new future above ground.”

### 4. Fever 1793 by Laurie Halse Anderson

“A historical fiction novel set in Philadelphia during the devastating yellow fever epidemic of 1793. It follows 14-year-old Mattie Cook as she struggles to survive the outbreak, her family business, the Cook Coffeehouse, is threatened, and her world turned upside down.”

### 5. Soar by Joan Bauer

“Jeremiah is the world's biggest baseball fan. He really loves baseball and he knows just about everything there is to know about his favorite sport. So when he's told he can't play baseball following an operation on his heart, Jeremiah decides he'll do the next best thing and become a coach.”

### 6. In the Footsteps of Crazy Horse by Joseph Marshall

“Jimmy McClean is a Lakota boy—though you wouldn't guess it by his name: his father is part white and part Lakota, and his mother is Lakota. When he embarks on a journey with his grandfather, Nyles High Eagle, he learns more and more about his Lakota heritage—in particular, the story of Crazy Horse, one of the most important figures in Lakota and American history.”

### 7. Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati: Journey to the Summit by Ana Maria Vazquez

“A biography for young readers, highlighting Pier Giorgio's vibrant and adventurous life. It showcases his student antics, athletic prowess, social justice activism, and dedication to helping the poor.”

### 8. The Wednesday Wars by Gary D. Schmidt

“Seventh-grader, Holling Hoodhood, is convinced his teacher hates him. Through their Wednesday afternoon Shakespeare sessions she helps him cope with events both wildly funny and deadly serious.”

### 9. The Crossover by Alexander Kwame

“Josh and JB are basketball legends at their school. They also happen to be identical twins, but it's easy to tell them apart if you know how to look. As the boys build up to one of the most important matches of their lives, tensions grow between them and things at home and at school also add to the pressure.”

### 10. Peter and the Starcatchers by Dave Barry


