The Sacrament of Baptism

We welcome new life into the Church through the sacramental sign of Baptism which is celebrated every Sunday of the month at 1:00pm with the exception of Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. Once the Baptismal Preparation class is attended, the form completed and the Godparent Eligibility Certificates are turned in then a date for your child's Baptism will be set.

Baptismal Preparation

Catholic Godparents are required to complete an Eligibility Certificate and have the certificates signed by the pastor of the parish where they are currently registered and practicing their faith.

We offer a Baptismal Prep Class for parents as a way of preparing them for their child's journey of faith. Classes are scheduled for the first Wednesday of every month at 7:30pm. Please contact the Parish Secretary to register.

Sacramental Sponsorship Letter

This is a form required to be a Godparent or Sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation. To receive this form the following requirements must be met:

- -If married, be in a valid marriage according to the laws of the Catholic Church.
- -Be at least 16 years of age.
- -Completed the Sacraments of Initiation; Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation
- -Be a registered, active participant of a Parish.

The Sacrament of Marriage

Couples wishing to celebrate and consecrate their love in the Sacrament of Marriage are asked to call the Parish Secretary, Michele O'Toole at 609-702-1848 ext. 301.

Arrangements are to be made with the Pastor a year in advance of the requested date. At least one person should be a registered member of the parish. All couples are required to attend preparation sessions.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick Any Catholic who is seriously ill, advanced in age, or who feels the need for the comforting presence of the Church's sacramental prayer life may be anointed. Please contact the Parish Office at 609-702-1848 ext. 301 during office hours. In the case of an emergency, please call and follow the instructions listed on our telephone message.



Good News Reflection

First Sunday of Lent March 10, 2019

Pray: Strength I ask from You today, Lord, to face all those temptations that are too difficult for me to resist. Only You can defeat them in me, I only say 'yes' to Your will. Amen.

Deuteronomy 26:4-10 Ps 91:1-2, 10-15 Romans 10:8-13 Luke 4:1-13

Union with Christ

Jesus' life is our life if we're sincere about our faith. We unite ourselves to him by receiving his body and blood in the Eucharist. We meet him in the scriptures and walk with him on the path to heaven.

During Lent, the readings that the Church provides for Sunday and daily Mass will help us with this journey if we listen with an ear that recognizes our personal connections to Christ.

In this Sunday's Gospel passage, we journey with Jesus into the desert. Consider your own struggles with temptation; reflect on how sin makes your life feel barren and dry like a desert.

When we walk with Jesus, we unite ourselves to his struggle with the devil and to his victory over the devil. Our temptations become his temptations, and in our efforts to remain united to him, we reject Satan and choose the life of holiness. The Church helps us do this by giving us ways during Lent to improve our self-discipline and conquer the self-centeredness that makes us vulnerable to sin: fasting and abstinence, alms-giving, reconciliation services, faith formation events, reading materials, and more.

Every meal and meat that we give up for Lent, every sin that we confess in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, every sacrifice of time that we make to add more prayer and spiritual reading to our daily life, and every other Lenten activity is a practice of self-denial that unites us to Jesus in the desert.

Jesus fasted from food and other physical comforts during his battle with the devil, and this strategy strengthened him and prepared him for the ministry that came afterward. This is what Lent should be for us, too.

Satan is not someone to fear. Jesus already defeated all demons on our behalf, first in the desert and then on the cross. Our battle is really only against temptation and our personal weaknesses that make us vulnerable to succumbing to sin.

We don't always want to follow Jesus. This is what we must surrender to God during Lent. Then Easter will be far more meaningful, because we will emerge from Lent much stronger in our faith.

Ouestions for Personal Reflection:

What are the temptations that are most pressing in your life? Be honest with yourself! How are you succumbing to the devil, even though he really has no power over you? Don't be ashamed. Guilt is not what Jesus wants from you. What he does want is your desire to receive his help in overcoming temptation. He's waiting for you in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Questions for Family & Community Faith Sharing:

How do you know that the Sacrament of Reconciliation really works? How is it more than just a confession of your sins? How has it helped you grow stronger in following Jesus?

Living the Good News Today

"One does not live on bread alone."

The week before the Lenten season started, some members of my family were sharing Facebook posts about the Polish tradition of Fat Thursday, a day to savor sweet treats before Lent's 40 solemn days of fasting and praying. The centerpiece of Fat Thursday were the deepfat fried donuts called "pączki." As I remembered the delicious smell and taste of the pączki that my grandmother (Babci) made for us, though, I also remembered my mother teaching us that not everybody in the world had such indulgences. In fact, many suffering people in the world long for any bread to eat. As a refugee herself, my Mom knew firsthand what that hunger and longing was like!

Lent is a purposeful season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. The Church provides us with some guidelines for days of fasting and abstinence from meat. As pilgrims on a faith journey, however, we have many options on how to focus our prayer, fasting, and charitable good works. The Scripture readings help us to see those possibilities.

After Jesus fasted and prayed for 40 days in the desert, the devil tempted Him in His hunger, Jesus replied, "One does not live on bread alone." The temptation was a direct attack on Jesus' free will and ego: show your power and turn stones into bread. How easy that would have been for Jesus to do! Although truly the Son of God, He chose to remain hungry and humble. The stones remained unchanged.

Lent is a season of change. We come closer to Christ through our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, giving up our hard-heartedness and finding grace in God's mercy and love. So much for us still to learn!

It is so important to think about others and their needs. The image of bread is such a vital one, as bread is an intrinsic part of most cultures throughout the world. In many nations, rice also holds a central dietary position. Let's take a look at three possible approaches to a very meaningful Lenten season:

1, **Global:** The US Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) established Catholic Relief Services (CRS) 75 years ago to assist the poor and vulnerable overseas. Every year, CRS offers its Rice Bowl as a means for us to set aside an offering that is beneficial to others in need. Almsgiving of this kind may come from fasting (using the money that would have been spent on other things, e.g., soft drinks, snacks, lottery tickets, sports or entertainment activities, etc.). The CRS website shares stories of people who have benefited from the education, nutritional support, and counseling that CRS provides in countries with immense need. We must see the face of Christ in

those served by CRS. It is even more gratifying to participate in CRS Rice Bowl when it is done as a family, with everyone sharing their means to help others in need. 2. **Local:** Our parish is fortunate to have a St. Vincent de Paul Society outreach ministry serving our local community. Every week, the food pantry lists specific items in the parish bulletin that are needed to make up food bags for weekly distribution. There are recurring items that make the list: peanut butter, jelly, canned meals and meat, soup, rice, tuna, vegetables, beans, etc. On some regular basis, everyone shops for food. Consider the possibilities if our fasting and abstinence reduced our shopping list for our own intake and allowed us to give those items to the food pantry. Imagine the impact to the food pantry if every family in our parish made an effort to bring non-perishable food items to the bins in church every week! Once again, all that this requires of us is to recognize Christ's face in those who are seeking help and to respond with love.

3. **Time:** Sometimes, people have limited economic means and struggle with almsgiving. There are other ways to be charitable that do not involve money. The gift of time (presence) is a priceless almsgiving. What does this look like? Here are some simple starter examples: visiting the sick, comforting the bereaved, doing chores for a homebound person, tutoring someone struggling to learn, making meals for a family with someone seriously ill, visiting our meditation chapel and praying for the intentions in the prayer box, committing to a parish ministry, and any other selfless act that requires us to give up some time that we hold for ourselves and give it for the good of someone else.

When Pope Francis was in Panama in January for World Youth Day, he made the *Via Crucis*, prayerfully asking how we were to react as we see Jesus suffering in others:

- Do we console and accompany the Lord, helpless and suffering in the poorest and most abandoned of our brothers and sisters?
- Do we help carry the burden of the cross, like Simon of Cyrene, by being peacemakers, builders of bridges, a leaven of fraternity?
- Do we remain, like Mary, at the foot of the cross?

Only with God's grace will we overcome the temptation to stay comfortable and to avoid those compelling encounters with others who are suffering, neglected, or forgotten. As Lent invites us into deeper prayer, let us listen to the Word of God on a daily basis and trust that Christ is with us in our daily actions:

"Be with me, Lord."
