The Sacrament of Baptism

We welcome new life into the Church through the sacramental sign of Baptism which is celebrated every Sunday of the month at 1:00pm with the exception of Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. Once the Baptismal Preparation class is attended, the form completed and the Godparent Eligibility Certificates are turned in then a date for your child's Baptism will be set.

Baptismal Preparation

Catholic Godparents are required to complete an Eligibility Certificate and have the certificates signed by the pastor of the parish where they are currently registered and practicing their faith.

We offer a Baptismal Prep Class for parents as a way of preparing them for their child's journey of faith. Classes are scheduled for the first Wednesday of every month at 7:30pm. Please contact the Parish Secretary to register.

Sacramental Sponsorship Letter

This is a form required to be a Godparent or Sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation. To receive this form the following requirements must be met:

- -If married, be in a valid marriage according to the laws of the Catholic Church.
- -Be at least 16 years of age.
- -Completed the Sacraments of Initiation; Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation
- -Be a registered, active participant of a Parish.

The Sacrament of Marriage

Couples wishing to celebrate and consecrate their love in the Sacrament of Marriage are asked to call the Parish Secretary, Michele O'Toole at 609-702-1848 ext. 301.

Arrangements are to be made with the Pastor a year in advance of the requested date. At least one person should be a registered member of the parish. All couples are required to attend preparation sessions.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick Any Catholic who is seriously ill, advanced in age, or who feels the need for the comforting presence of the Church's sacramental prayer life may be anointed. Please contact the Parish Office at 609-702-1848 ext. 301 during office hours. In the case of an emergency, please call and follow the instructions listed on our telephone message.

FEDERAL DONOR RECORDKEEPING RULE ON CHARITABLE DEDUCTION

The Pension Protection Act of 2006 included a section relative to charitable deductions. The rules require that people claiming charitable deduction back up those deduction claims with cancelled checks; records from banks or credit card companies; or written notices from the charity or not-for-profit institution. The burden is on the donor to maintain or obtain the required records.

The parish will provide a record of contributions, upon request, which will satisfy the IRS requirements. Contributions of cash can only be used as a deduction if church envelopes are used enabling the parish to identify the donor. EVENING BIBLE STUDY

Our spring Bible study will use Harry O. Maier's New Testament Christianity in the Roman World, part of a fine series by Oxford University Press entitled Essentials of Biblical Studies. Prof. Maier, who teaches New Testament and Early Christian Studies at Vancouver School of Theology, points out that Christianity was not a series of abstract ideas and texts but a lived reality from whose complex identity the NT writings emerged. He offers a detailed and informative portrayal of the Greco-Roman world, considering such vital elements of that world as family, religion, modes of worship, the structure of cities and households, and so on. Our understanding of scripture is enhanced by our exploring and understanding the culture, environment, customs and people that influenced the sacred writers and this Bible study will contribute significantly to that end.

Our text is *New Testament Christianity in the Roman World* by Harry O. Maier (New York: Oxford University Press [www.oup.com], 2019). It is available directly from the publisher or through Barnes & Noble and Amazon at \$24.95 plus S&H. Prices might vary, depending on source.

The winter is here and so is our annual winter 'read the book - see the movie project?' This winter, we will enjoy a superb mystery, "A Thief of Time" by Tony Hillerman.

You may wonder why we are doing a mystery novel for a Catholic parish project, after all, what may be the spiritual, moral or religious application about a story that involves murder, grave robbing, looting and missing people. Fair enough. Let's go in the direction of social justice, which is a critical issue of faith for all Christians.

In the current American southwest, on the established Native-American lands, there is a major problem with charlatans stealing artifacts from them and selling them to the highest bidder of private collectors and museums. Due to major cutbacks in Federal funding to protect these locations, thieves have been having a field day pillaging the region and to, sacrilegiously, invade ancient Native-American burial grounds for the skeletal remains of the deceased. This is, indeed, a ghoulish business that is very, very profitable.

What reading of Hillerman's "Thief of Time," will do for us is to bring us a greater awareness of the modern travesty of exploiting the culture of Native-Americans (in this situation, the Navajo) as well as provide for an exciting and thoughtful suspense story that is a sure pageturner. "A Thief of Time" is an excellent winter read, so get your favorite hot beverage and get started with your reading.

Save the date of Friday, March 27th at 7:30pm to gather at the Sacred Heart School Library to see the film version of the novel and then engage in a spirited open discussion of the story.

What a winning scenario all around!

Living the Good News Today

"The LORD is my light and my salvation."

Last weekend, I attended a quarterly Board of Directors meeting for Franciscan Mission Service (FMS), a non-profit agency that sponsors lay missionaries working in Bolivia, Jamaica, and Guatemala. Coincidentally, our meeting occurred on the first day of the International Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (January 18-25). We found a true and affirming resonance with our mission work in the 2020 theme: "They Showed Us Unusual Kindness."

In St. Paul's epistle to the Christian community in Corinth, he urged them to have no divisions among them. Even in the first century of the Church, there were already factions that had formed! He had to remind them of their singular call to preach the gospel—the Good News of God's love and our salvation. What does it mean to show "unusual kindness"?

The guardians of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity are the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement through their Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute. The Christian churches of Malta and Gozo (an island in the Malta archipelago) prepared the materials for 2020 based on an important feast day in their culture (Feb. 10): the shipwreck of St. Paul. During the eight days of prayer for Christian Unity, the centerpiece daily Scripture readings were from Acts 27:18 - 28:10 (the Maltese feast day text).

In the welcoming invitation to the week of prayer, Graymoor focused on the unusual kindness we must give and receive in that same unity that St. Paul urged for the Corinthians:

"As we gather throughout our nation to pray for the unity of Christians we are reminded of the importance of need for 'unusual kindness' in the dialogue the leads to growth in unity. We do this in a world where separation and division hinder the quest for Christian Unity. In 2020, we are being called to show unusual kindness towards one another. As Paul recorded in the Acts of the Apostles, it was through their unusual kindness that a divided people were drawn closer together."

As part of the FMS Board meeting, members had the chance to hear from two missioners who had just returned from two years of service in Cochabamba, Kingston, Bolivia. and Jamaica. They commissioned by FMS to serve in fraternal relationship with others. Both of the missioners spoke of the challenges that they faced in adapting to the cultures and needs of their two countries: language barriers, poverty, violence, political instability, physical disabilities, HIV, and sexual abuse, and other compelling insights in what it requires of us to live in genuine solidarity—a relationship of unity with others that comes from Christ alone. In the responsorial psalm this weekend, we align with that energy that opens our hearts to show that unusual kindness by simply remembering that "The LORD is my light and my salvation."

When Jesus left Nazareth and came to the Galilee region, He began to satisfy the people's spiritual hunger by telling them that God's kingdom was at hand. Like the missioners in Bolivia and Jamaica, Jesus encountered many people who had endured illness, oppression, poverty, and social isolation, but He brought them hope and healing through an unusual kindness they had not previously known. When St. Paul was shipwrecked, he never lost hope that God would deliver them through the most difficult circumstances. Strangers showed St. Paul and his companion's unusual kindness.

All returning FMS missioners deliberately transition into lifelong mission. Last Sunday, my husband Jeff and I attended the re-commissioning Mass for the four returning missioners to mark that change in their lives. Many other lifelong missioners were present at the Mass to share this grace-filled time with them. As the four joined their voices with those who had previously served, they pledged to remember the people who had become their mission family in Christ and to carry that relationship with Christ into all future labors. When the assembly gave them all a blessing based on the *Prayer of St. Francis*, this verse echoed this weekend's responsorial psalm:

"Where there is darkness, light... Grant that the witness of our missioners illumine the way for all they encounter."

When Christ is our light and our salvation, then we can bring that light into all of our relationships with joy, hope, and loving service.

At the end of every Mass, we are sent to proclaim the Good News of the Gospel to the world—especially by our acts of unusual kindness. In the background behind the theme of 2020 Christian Unity (https://geii.org/week_of_prayer_for_christian_unity/b ackground/intro_to_the_theme.html), we learn:

"The people who showed unusual kindness to Paul and his companions did not yet know Christ, and yet it is through their unusual kindness that a divided people were drawn closer together. Our own Christian unity will be discovered not only through showing hospitality to one another, important though this is, but also through loving encounters with those who do not share our language, culture or faith. In such tempestuous journeys and chance encounters, God's will for the Church and all people comes to fulfillment."

So, let us carry forward this theme of unusual kindness into the weeks ahead and:

"...be united in the same mind and the same purpose."

Helping those who live in darkness

Who's troubling you? In this Sunday's Gospel passage, we hear of the fulfillment of the prophecy given by Isaiah in the first reading: Because of Jesus Christ, the people you know who are living in darkness have seen the light that will heal them. Who is making no effort to get out of their sin-induced misery? Who is overshadowed by the demons of spiritual death and destruction? Whose stubbornness is causing you great anguish?

Through your prayers and faithful love, Jesus has been revealed to them. Even as they fight against this truth and hide from him, the great light of Christ cannot be turned off. Soon or eventually this will cause great rejoicing, not only for you, but for those who are being rescued.

Elsewhere (Luke 12:49-50), Jesus expressed his feelings about people who live in darkness: "How great is my anguish until it is accomplished!" Thus, he knows your anguish and *shares* it, but more deeply and fervently. He is doing more than you know, more than you can imagine, to accomplish the victory for which you've been praying. He is doing everything possible -- as well as the impossible -- to bring it to fulfillment.

Pray that Divine Providence will use the bad consequences of each person's stubborn rebellion to draw them to himself. Pray that God will use others to bring them into his light. Pray that God will work in his own way (which might not be the way you would choose) to dissolve their spiritual rebellion. Pray that after their conversion they will spread the light of Christ powerfully. And pray that their conversion will be deep, definite and permanent.

We don't pray to change God's mind; he's already working to bring the light of Christ to people who live in darkness. We pray to place these people into his arms, since they're not doing it for themselves.

Questions for Personal Reflection:

Write a list of people who are living in darkness. Will you trust in the power of Christ's great light and the victory he obtained through his death and resurrection? Make a commitment to feel Christ's anguish more keenly and use this pain to energize you into daily prayer on behalf of darkened souls.

Questions for Community Faith Sharing:

Think of those who are living in darkness. Get a large candle and etch their names into it. Light the candle and offer your prayers for these loved ones. If possible, do this with a prayer community in a mutual agreement of prayer support, and light this candle at all of your community meetings.
