Parish Registration

Our Parish family gladly welcomes new members. Please register at your earliest convenience by filling out a blue Registration Form located on the rack near the Altar Servers Sacristy in the vestibule of the Church or contacting Michele O'Toole, the Parish Secretary, by phone or email to have a Form sent to you.

The Sacrament of Baptism

The Sacrament of Baptism is usually celebrated on Sunday at 1PM but other times and days are possible. We encourage parents who wish to have their child baptized to contact Michele by phone or <a href="mailto:email

Once the Baptism Preparation session is attended, the Baptism Request Form completed and the Godparent Eligibility Certificates sent to the Parish House, a date for your child's Baptism can be set.

Baptismal Preparation

Catholic Godparents are required to complete an Eligibility Certificate and have the Certificate signed and sealed by the Pastor of the parish where they are currently registered and practicing their faith.

Sacred Heart offers a Baptismal Preparation Session required for all parents preparing for their child's Baptism. The date and time for this Session is arranged at the convenience of the parents and the Priest or Deacon who will minister the Sacrament.

Sacramental Sponsorship Letter

This is a form required to be a Godparent or Sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation. To receive this form from the Pastor of their parish, the Church requires the following:

- Must be at least 16 years of age.
- Received the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation.
- If married, be in a valid sacramental marriage according to the laws of the Catholic Church.
- Be a registered and practicing member of a Catholic Parish.

The Sacrament of Marriage

Sacrament of Matrimony at our Parish are asked to contact Michele O'Toole, the Parish Secretary by phone or email. Arrangements are to be made at a meeting with the Pastor at least a year in advance of the requested date. At least one person should be a registered member of the parish. All couples are required to attend Pre-Cana Sessions and a number of meetings with the priest or Deacon who will preside at the Wedding Mass/Ceremony Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick Any Catholic who is seriously ill, advanced in age or wishes to receive the comfort and grace provided by this Sacrament may contact Michele O'Toole by phone or email. Living the Good News Today

"The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few."

Many of us have had the memory of experiencing something that becomes unforgettable: the birth of a child; a trip to an extraordinary/unusual place; an encounter with someone whom we admire greatly; attendance at some championship activity in which the underdog was the winner; sitting with others in anticipation, waiting for the spectacular (e.g., eruption of the geyser "Old Faithful," sunrise over the Atlantic Ocean, the breaching of a whale in the ocean, etc.); and so many other similar encounters. One of my personal unforgettable experiences occurred when my husband Jeff and I visited the Holy Land in 2006. The Franciscan priest who led our pilgrimage compared the size of Israel to the state of New Jersey. How very relatable for us!

As we toured the many places that had scriptural and historical significance, I became very conscious of our travels on a comfortable, air-conditioned touring bus. What must it have been like for the people of the Old Testament and Jesus to walk across this rugged land? There was a great difference in the geography of the Holy Land from the Mediterranean in the west to the Sea of Galilee in the east; from the beautiful coastal resorts and lush forests of the north to the barren deserts of the south. Walking from town to town most certainly involved rugged terrain, remoteness, inaccessibility to comforts, and dangers from predators (human and animal) along the way.

When Jesus was preaching about God's love and teaching the people about God's Kingdom, He used



simple images through parables which resonated with them in their daily living: planting seeds and harvesting the yield, caring for sheep attentively, and finding treasure that was so

valued that it resulted in the reordering of a person's life! As Jesus became more known throughout Galilee and Judea, He exhorted His followers to join Him in bringing the Good News to others, saying "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few." Sending the seventy-two out in pairs with only simple provisions, He warned them that they would be like lambs among wolves. How did that warning resonate with them?

The Church's mission mandate to proclaim Christ to the world is even more compelling today than it was when Jesus was still with His followers. Marking the 25th anniversary of the Second Vatican Council's *Decree on the Mission Activity of the Church (Ad Gentes)*, Pope St. John Paul II issued his encyclical *Redemptoris Misio* on 7

December 1990 in which he observed that people put more trust in <u>witnesses</u> rather than teachers and in <u>life</u> and action than theories:

"The first form of witness is the very life of the missionary, of the Christian family, and of the ecclesial community, which reveal a new way of living. The missionary who, despite all his or her human limitations and defects, lives a simple life, taking Christ as the model, is a sign of God and of transcendent realities. But everyone in the Church, striving to imitate the Divine Master, can and must bear this kind of witness; in many cases it is the only possible way of being a missionary. The evangelical witness which the world finds most appealing is that of concern for people, and of charity toward the poor, the weak and those who suffer. The complete generosity underlying this attitude and these actions stands in marked contrast to human selfishness. It raises precise questions which lead to God and to the Gospel. A commitment to peace, justice, human rights and human promotion is also a witness to the Gospel when it is a sign of concern for persons and is directed toward integral human development (42)."

Many people mistakenly think that "mission" involves departure for some faraway place in a strange culture to spread the faith. That activity still does go on within the Church, but what Jesus was empowering His disciples to do in this weekend's Gospel occurs in our daily living amid the people and places that we visit every day after we leave Mass on Sundays: in our neighborhoods, in our workplaces, on our vacations, in our volunteering activities, when we go shopping, in our recreation, and, most importantly, in the faith-inspired values that we cultivate within our family life. How seriously do we take our roles as witnesses of the Good News of Christ? Do we make time regularly to reflect on the good and bad experiences that we have had? Jesus made it clear that we will not always be welcome witnesses as disciples for the Kingdom.

So, the message is quite clear for us: we need to get to work and walk the talk: what we hear proclaimed in the Gospel must be lived in our world through personal witness. That is our mission, as urgent today as it was in 1965 when the Second Vatican Council made its decree to the people to live their faith. For adults, the challenge is to make our work count for something more than just earning a living. In our workplace, we bring the values of service, redemption, and creation that God inspires and that transform our world into God's Kingdom. For children, there must be inspiration to imitate the example of Christ in their relationships with others and in their choices about their desires in life.

Our faith community sustains our missionary activities by the ever-present awareness that:

"The Kingdom of God is at hand for you."

Good News Reflection

14th Sunday in Ordinary Time July 3, 2022

Pray: Father, I am Your servant, I am a worker in Your harvest. Send me, Lord, wherever Your word may bear the fruit You desire. Thank You for choosing me! Amen.

Isaiah 66:10-14c Ps 66:1-7, 16, 20 Galatians 6:14-18 Luke 10:1-12, 17-20

The Christian call of collaboration

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, Jesus tells his disciples to ask the "Master" (God the Father) of the "harvest" (conversion to Christ) to send out more "laborers" (evangelizers). And in the next breath, he tells them that *they* are the laborers and that they must get busy: "Go on your way," he says.

When you think of evangelizers in the Catholic Church, who comes to mind first? Most of us think of priests, and we all know that we need more priests. New vocations in Western societies are still way too few to compensate for the elderly ones who are retiring and dying.

Do you pray for an increase of vocations? Good, but that's only part of what Jesus is asking us to do. "Go on your way," he says to *all* of us, "and use *your* gifts, *your* talents, and *your* skills to assist in the harvest.

Jesus has always been collaborative. The number of laborers for the mission of the Church will only be sufficient when we all join the effort -- clergy, religious, and laity -- working together with our separate and unique talents and skills, humbly assisting each other as members of the same team.

To reach this sufficiency, many of us have to overcome the "someone else will take care of it" attitude. And some have to overcome the desire for perfection, the "I can take care of it better myself" attitude, which robs others of the opportunity to serve.

Many of us need to overcome the fear of losing control, the "I must tell others how to do their job" attitude, which chases away some very talented laborers. Jesus said we should carry no supplies into ministry; in other words: We should accept whatever is offered to us.

Our prayers for an increase of consecrated vocations are answered from within collaborative ministry. Clergy and religious are called to be good role models, which will attract new vocations, but the laity are called to serve God with the same zeal and holiness that we expect from priests, because out of families who serve come the holy priests and religious who serve.

Questions for Personal Reflection:

Which ministries in your parish and diocese are lacking sufficient laborers? If you're not already busy in the work of God's kingdom, how can you use your talents to help there? If you're already serving enthusiastically, how can you encourage others to get involved?

Questions for Family & Community Faith Sharing:

Name some of the attitudes and obstacles that block the spirit of collaboration. How can these be overcome? What will you do to improve the conditions of the mission field so that more people will get involved?






