St. Dominic Savio Character Awards

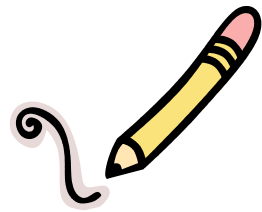

In the Classroom

What's coming in the next weeks...



Preschool

- **Religion** – Students are learning about God's creation: specifically little and big things!
- **Language Arts** – Students are learning about blending three-sound words, as well as drawing inferences about stories based on the illustrations.
- **Math** – Students are learning basic measurement skills: how heavy or light something is, how long or short something is.
- **Science and Social Studies** will be integrated through our language arts program, CKLA, throughout the year. Students are wrapping up a unit on habitats.
- **Art** – Students are learning about lines.
- **Music** – Students are learning about high and low sounds in music.
- **Gym** – Students are learning how to use a hula hoop.

Kindergarten

- **Religion** – Students will finish their Stations of the Cross booklet. They will learn how Jesus Loves and Heals the Sick. They will also learn about The Joyful Mysteries.
- **Language Arts** – Students will continue to decode four and five letter words. They will continue to be introduced to new tricky words.
- **Math** – Students will finish up their chapter on numbers up to 100. They will begin their next chapter which focuses on comparing two sets of objects one-to-one to find the difference.
- **Science & Social Studies** will be integrated through our language arts program, CKLA, throughout the year. Students will begin their unit of focus on kings and queens. They will learn about kingdoms and royal families.
- **Art** – Students are learning about color, and how to mix primary to create secondary colors.
- **Music** - Students are learning about steady beat and sounds that are fast and slow.
- **Gym** – Students will continue their soccer unit.

Grade 1

- **Religion** – Students will finish their Stations of the Cross booklet. They will continue to learn how Jesus shows us how to live. They will also learn about the Corporal Works of Mercy.
- **Language Arts** - Students will continue to read two-syllable words, and will identify the root word and suffix of a given word. They will review the p, b, k, and g sounds, and will focus on identifying and reading words with double-letter spellings. They will continue to read old tricky words, and be introduced to new tricky words.
- **Knowledge** - Students will begin a new unit on the history of the earth. Students will focus on the vocabulary terms used to explain the layers of the earth, volcanoes, and geysers.
- **Writing** - Students will continue using idea webs and graphic organizers in their knowledge unit. Students will also begin learning how to format, write, and draft letters.
- **Math** – Students will be wrapping up their chapter on weight. They have been learning how to weigh objects using non-standard units. Students will then begin learning how to use picture graphs and bar graphs to collect and organize data.
- **Science & Social Studies** will be integrated through our language arts program, CKLA, throughout the year. Students will begin a new unit about the history of the earth.
- **Art** – Students are completing projects that are related to the color wheel.
- **Music** - Students are practicing for their performance.
- **Gym** – Students will continue their soccer unit.

Grade 2

- **Religion** – Students will review the Sacrament of Reconciliation to prepare for Confessions on Thursday. They will continue to learn the parts of the Mass and move into the Sacraments.
- **Knowledge** - Students will begin studying the U.S. Civil War where students will learn about the controversy over slavery between the north and the south, and how this led to the war. Students will learn about significant historical figures like Abraham Lincoln, Harriet Tubman, Clara Barton, Robert E. Lee and Ulysses S. Grant.
- **Skills** – Students are reading and spelling -ir, -ur, and suffix -er patterns, followed by hard and soft -c and -g. We are focusing on comprehension strategies using story maps (cause and effect, problem and solution, characters, etc.) and possessive nouns.
- **Writing** - Students will choose a significant historical figure from our Knowledge unit and write biographies.
- **Math** - Students will finish Chapter 13: Customary Measurement of Length where we have been measuring in feet and inches, comparing lengths and solving word problems. In Chapter 14, we will begin learning about time. Students will read and write time to the nearest 5 minutes using A.M. and P.M. and will tell how much time has elapsed.
- **Science & Social Studies** will be integrated through our language arts program, CKLA, throughout the year. In chemistry, students are continuing to modify and improve their glue recipes, comparing their recipes to their classmates to determine strengths and weaknesses. In Knowledge, we are studying the U.S. Civil War.
- **Art** – Students are learning about depth in color and how to differentiate compatible /complimentary/opposite colors.
- **Music** - Students are practicing songs for their performance.
- **Gym & Health** - Students will continue their soccer unit.

Grade 3

- **Religion** - Students will review the Sacrament of Reconciliation to prepare for Confessions on Thursday. They will continue to learn how the Church continues Jesus' Mission of Salvation and Forgiveness of Sin.
- **CKLA** – Students are continuing their unit on sound and light.
- **Writing** - Students will continue to learn how to write cursive letters
- **Math** – Students will continue learning about like and unlike fractions.
- **Science & Social Studies** will be integrated through our language arts program, CKLA, throughout the year. Students have been learning about reflection, refraction and transparent/translucent objects.
- **Art** – Students are working on a project that uses compatible colors and secondary colors.
- **Music** – Students are learning to accompany music in $\frac{3}{4}$ time signature with rhythm sticks.
- **Gym & Health** - Students are beginning their unit on broomball.

Grade 4

- **Religion** – Students will review the Sacrament of Reconciliation to prepare for Confessions on Thursday. They will continue to work on their published book. They will review St. Marianne Cope and test on Tuesday.
- **Language Arts** – Students are continuing their unit on Geology and learning new terms to describe the landscape of Earth.
- **Math** – Students will conclude a unit on fractions by examining their place in the real world.
- **Science** – Students will learn about sedimentary rock formation.
- **Social Studies** – Students are continuing their unit on the American Revolution and the 13 colonies.
- **Art** – Students are creating their own scratch art paper/project.
- **Music** - Students are learning movements in $\frac{4}{4}$ time signatures.

- **Gym & Health** – Students will begin a new unit of broomball.

Grade 5

- **Religion** – Students will review the Sacrament of Reconciliation to prepare for Confessions on Thursday. They will review St. Marianne Cope and test on Tuesday. They will begin practicing for Stations of the Cross. They will be presenting Stations on Friday, March 22. They will begin working on their Sacrament Project.
- **Language Arts** – Students are studying the Renaissance as well as learning about prepositions and Greek prefixes.
- **Math** – Students will take benchmark tests to assess current understanding of all material covered over the course of the first two trimesters.
- **Science** – Students will continue learning about the nature of matter by examining why food coloring separates into different dyes in a chromatography lab.
- **Social Studies** – Students will continue learning about England's Golden Age.
- **Art** – Students are creating their own scratch art paper for an upcoming project.
- **Music** - Students are finishing up a unit on movement.
- **Gym & Health** – Students will begin a new unit of broomball.

Grade 6

- **Religion** – Students will continue learning about stories in the Old Testament, including Joseph and his brothers.
- **Language Arts** – Students will finish their novel study of *A Long Walk to Water* by writing an essay on survival traits. They are also studying prepositions.
- **Math (Smith)** – Students will conclude a unit on algebraic expressions.
- **Math (Poux)** – Students will complete Chapter 7 where they will use a compass and a protractor to construct geometric figures.
- **Science** – Students will continue a unit on climate, ocean and the atmosphere.
- **Social Studies** – Students will continue learning about the Industrial Revolution.
- **Art** – Students are creating their own scratch art paper for an upcoming project. It is a 3 part project.
- **Music** - Students will begin working on learning to play the ukulele.
- **Gym & Health** – Students will begin a new unit on Broomball.

Grade 7

- **Religion** – Students will finish their unit on their patron saint and continue learning about the Service for the Sacrament of Confirmation. They will also learn about St. Catherine of Bologna.
- **Language Arts** – Students will write an argumentative essay and continue a grammar unit on modifiers.
- **Math (May)** – Students will be solving problems that involve the area and circumference of circles, semicircles, and quadrants.
- **Math (Lewis)** - Students recently concluded Chapter 8 Volume and Surface Area of Solids. Students will begin Chapter 9 Statistics and will become familiar with finding the mean and median averages of a data set. Students will also learn to utilize frequency tables and box plots to analyze data.
- **Science** – Students will continue a unit on chemical reactions.
- **Social Studies** – Students will begin a new chapter about the War of 1812.
- **Art** – Students are working on a self-portrait using their image.
- **Music** - Students are learning to play a percussion ensemble piece.
- **Gym & Health** – Students will begin a Broom Ball unit.

Grade 8

- **Religion** – Students will learn about the Great Schism and about the factors that led to the Crusades. They will also learn about St. Catherine of Bologna.
- **English** – Students will complete vocabulary unit 11 and have a test over phrases.
- **Reading** – Students will complete a theme essay and read several short stories.
- **Math** – Students will be constructing and interpreting scatter plots, determining lines of best fit, and using two-way tables to determine relative frequencies for data.
- **Science** – Students will continue a unit on force and motion.
- **Social Studies** – Students will continue their study of WW II and begin a map study of Asia.
- **Art** – Students are painting their sculpture and adding the finishing details.
- **Music** - Students are learning to play a percussion ensemble piece.
- **Gym & Health** – Students will begin a broom ball unit

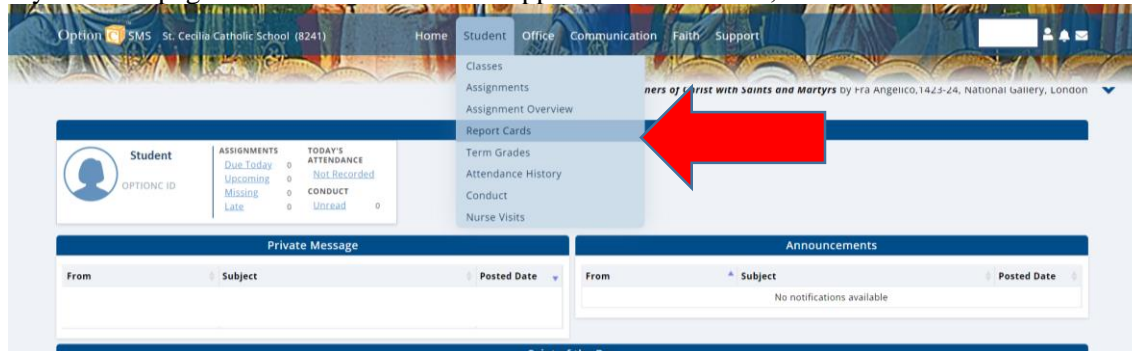
Before starting, make sure you know your login information (use your email as your username) – if you have forgotten your password or misplaced it, please call the school office at 513-533-6060.

Go to optionc.com/email-signin and click “**Login**”

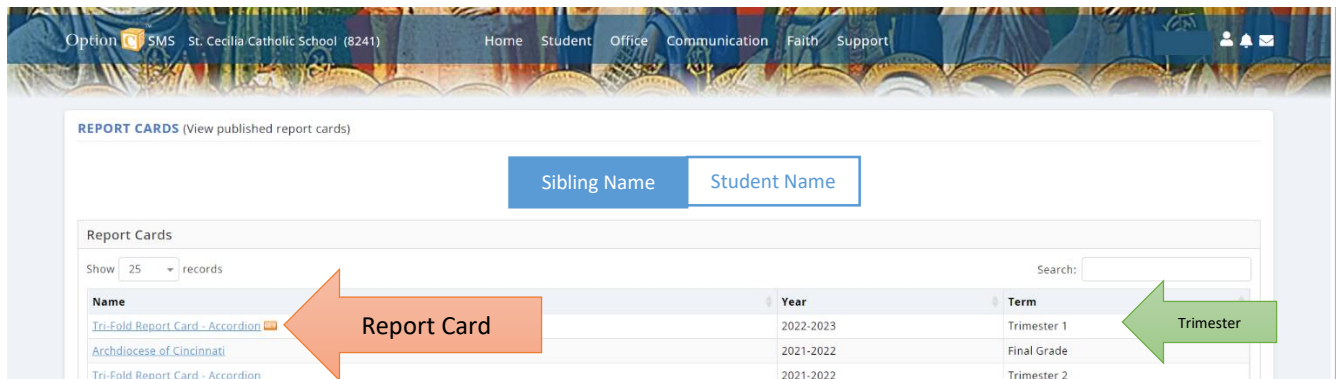
Sign in with using your email as your username and enter your password.

Below is what your homepage should look like. In the upper left-hand corner, click “**Student**” and then “**Report Cards**”

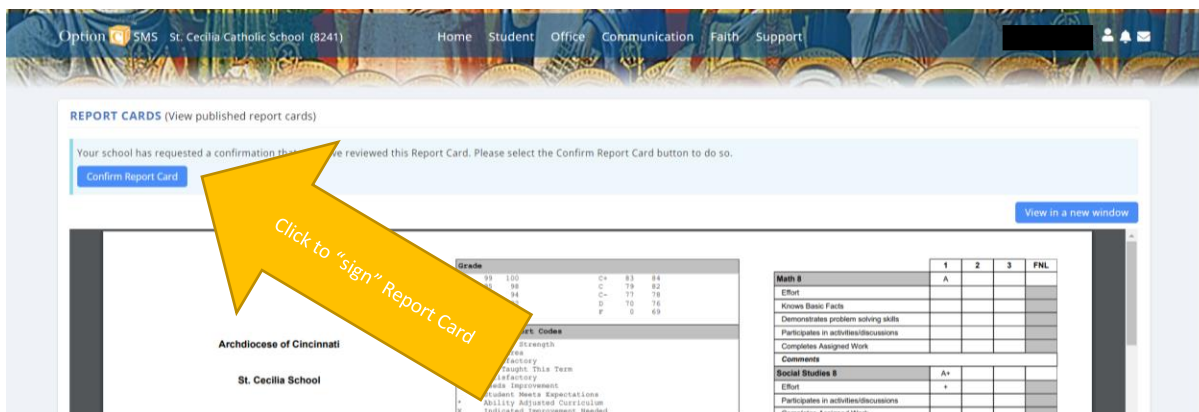
