From Our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Happy Gaudate Sunday! Gaudete Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent, so called from the first word of the Antiphon at Mass (Gaudete, i.e. Rejoice). The season of Advent originated as a fast of forty days in preparation for Christmas, commencing on the day after the feast of St. Martin (November 12), when it was often called "St. Martin's Lent "—a name by which it was known as early as the fifth century. The introduction of the Advent fast cannot be placed much earlier, because there is no evidence of Christmas being kept on December 25 before the end of the fourth century. In the ninth century,



the duration of Advent was reduced to four weeks and by the twelfth century the fast had been replaced by simple abstinence. Advent still preserved most of the characteristics of a penitential season, which made it a kind of counterpart to Lent, the middle (or third) Sunday corresponding with Laetare or Mid-Lent Sunday. On it, as on La tare Sunday, the organ and flowers, forbidden during the rest of the season, were permitted to be used; rosecolored vestments were allowed instead of purple. Gaudete Sunday, therefore, makes a break, like Laetare Sunday, about midway through a season which is otherwise of a penitential character, and signifies the nearness of the Lord's coming. In Mass throughout Advent, continual reference is made to our Lord's second coming, and this is emphasized on the third Sunday by the additional signs of gladness permitted on that day. Gaudete Sunday is further marked by a new Invitatory, the Church no longer inviting the faithful to adore merely "The Lord who is to come", but calling upon them to worship and hail with joy "The Lord who is now nigh and close at hand". The spirit of the Liturgy all through Advent is one of expectation and preparation for the Christmas feast as well as for the second coming of Christ, and the penitential exercises suitable to that spirit are thus on Gaudete Sunday suspended, as it were, for a while in order to symbolize that joy and gladness in the promised Redemption which should never be absent from the hearts of the faithful.

As you know I was installed last Sunday as the pastor of St. John of the Cross. I am really excited about this challenge. Something I have heard people say lately, that makes me a little sad, is that some people expressed in various ways that they are not comfortable approaching me because they fear I am too busy or it seems I am always on the run. While it is true that I am very active, this should never stop anyone from approaching me or setting up an appointment to talk with me. Each of you is loved by me and I am are here to serve each of you. I love to work and keep busy and at times that may "put people off" or cause them to second guess reaching out to me, but please never feel this way! I am here for you! Sometimes I might ask you to make an appointment or send me a note because I am in the middle of something at that very moment but please know I am managing both parishes well. I am blessed to have Frs. Thom and Tim here and they help us distribute the work well.

In the second reading this weekend, St. Paul tells us to have no anxiety at all. Wouldn't that be nice? Keep in mind that at the time St. Paul was writing this, he truly believed he would see the second coming within his lifetime. If you are convinced the second coming is going to happen within the next

five years, maybe it's easier not to worry about a mortgage, that job promotion you desire, or your children's education.

The truth is, we don't know when Christ will return or when death will come. We have no way of predicting the future. The uncertainty of the future and our place in it has always been a cause of anxiety for some, if not all, of us. If St. Paul were alive today and could see that it's been over 2000 years and Christ still hasn't returned, would he still say to have NO anxiety?

I think he would. Easier said than done, but did you know that people who practice meditation and prayer report fewer instances of anxiety? A consistent prayer life shows us that God has always taken care of us and that He always will. We may not always see the why or the how in the moment or even in this lifetime, and He may not always provide the outcome that we desire, but the stronger our faith in Him, the less anxious we will be.

(Note: This is not to say anxiety is necessarily caused by a *lack of faith,* which could lead to very scrupulous thinking.)

Gospel Meditation

In Christianity, we hear often about the "Good News." We might often associate it with Jesus' compassion to the poor, his healings and miracles, and the salvation he won for us. In today's Gospel, we read of John the Baptist. "Exhorting them in many other ways, he preached good news to the people." Yet as we examine the rest of the reading, we see examples of John's preaching. If you have two cloaks, give one away. Don't cheat others out of their money, extort, or lie. And, of course, the warning that the Messiah is on the move and "his winnowing fan is in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire." Merry Christmas? Not only do John's listeners enjoy his message, but they seem to think he might be the awaited Messiah! To understand today's Gospel, it's important to understand the Jewish people. For most of their history, God's chosen people had been under someone else's heel. They were slaves in Egypt. Their kingdoms were ravaged first by the Assyrians, then the Babylonians. Now they were under the yoke of the Roman Empire. Familiar with being strangers in a strange land, welcoming the stranger, caring for the vulnerable, and enacting justice was incredibly important to them as a people. While John's words may seem odd or strong to our modern ears, this call to justice was welcome, even if it was directed at the hearer. The truth is, no one is exempt from John's call to repentance. We all have further to go in the Christian life. We can all grow in virtue and love our neighbors more generously. The Church gives us the Advent season to examine our own hearts. Did any of John's warnings resonate with you? That could be a great thing to bring to Jesus this week!


Ss. Robert and William Catholic School:
