From the Desk of Fr. Andrew


A majority of my ministry is serving as the Chaplin to Cleveland Clinic's Hillcrest Hospital in Mayfield Heights. Hillcrest is a Level 2 Trauma Center with a 500 bed hospital. Needless to say I am actively engaged in my ministry. I am in residence at St. Francis of Assisi Parish in Gates Mills which is just a walk across the parking lot and the city border to Hillcrest. This allows me to be on call and I can respond to a midnight emergency within a few minutes. Given the size of the facility my average walking mileage is about 3.5 to 4 miles a day. My typical day consists of visiting 40~60 patients a day with daily rounds through the Intensive Care Units (ICUs) offering prayers, blessings and the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.



There is still a misconception that the Anointing of the Sick is 'last rites' for the dying. If we consider the definition of a sacrament from the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) paragraph 1131, "The sacraments are efficacious signs of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, by which divine life is dispensed to us." All the sacraments are for the living so that we may experience divine life now in our earthly existence. "By the sacred anointing of the sick and the prayer of the priests the whole Church commends those who are ill to the suffering and glorified Lord, that he may raise them up and save them." (CCC 1499). Anointing of the Sick is meant to heal us of our wounds both spiritual and physical and may be received more than once. With the other repeatable sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation why would you not want to receive them often to have that taste of divine life now?

"Oh Father I don't need 'last rites' I'm not dying." There are additional rites in the little green book Pastoral Care of the Sick that are used for those ready to meet the Lord. These additional rites, apostolic pardon — forgiveness of all sins, commendation of the dying — giving over of a dying person to the Lord, viaticum — last reception of Eucharist 'food for the journey,' combined with the Anointing of the Sick, collectively could be called 'last rites.'

From the Pastoral Care of the Sick, "The Letter of James states that the sick are to be anointed in order to raise them up and save them. Great care and concern should be taken to see that those of the faithful whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age receive this sacrament. The sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after being anointed and then again falls ill or if during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious. A sick person may be anointed before surgery whenever a serious illness is the reason for the surgery. Elderly people may be anointed if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present. Sick children are to be anointed if they have sufficient use of reason to be strengthened by this sacrament." These instructions serve as a guide for reception of Anointing of the Sick. It is a sacrament of healing, a taste of divine life now. If you are in need, ask. Invite the Divine Physician to cure you of your ills both spiritual and physical.





Gospel Meditation

Jesus combined predicting the fall of Jerusalem in 70 A.D. with predicting the end of the world. He did this because there will be marked similarities between the two catastrophes. Also, Jesus' accuracy regarding the fall of Jerusalem indicates the credibility of His revelations regarding the end of the world. Jesus revealed many more details regarding the end of the world than He revealed about most other aspects of His plan. He did this to underline the fact that the end of the world is literally true and to help us prepare for it. Jesus gave us the details because we need them. One of the most important details Jesus gave about the end of the world is: "By patient endurance you will save your lives" (Lk 21:19). We can persevere through the most savage persecution of the Church ever (see Lk 21:12), through the worst apostasy ever (2 Thes 2:3-12), and through the worst tribulation ever (Mk 13:19) because we have accepted the grace not to be proud but to fear the name of the Lord (Mal 3:19-20). This humble fear of the Lord is the beginning of love (see Dt 6:2-5). "Love covers a multitude of sins" (1 Pt 4:8) and leads us through the calamities of the end of the world into perfect, everlasting love in heaven. The world will certainly end, as Jesus said. Learn what Jesus has revealed about it. Live and persevere in love so as to live forever with the Lord.

Luke Brown's Reflection

In the coming weeks, we will be discussing the issue of pornography. In this first installment of three, we will be exploring the effect of pornography on an individual's mental health. Pornography can be a struggle for both men and women and it's everywhere now due to widespread access via the internet. While pornography is a controversial topic, we as Catholics believe that it is morally wrong, disordered, and harmful behavior. There are studies linking pornography use to mental health issues such as anger, anxiety, and even depression. If you look at brain scans of people addicted to substances such as drugs or alcohol, you'll see differences between their brains and healthy brains- the same is true of pornography use. When it comes to pornography use, shame is almost always involved. Guilt over use is good, but shame is bad. Guilt means, "I did something wrong." Shame tells us, "You are something wrong." Ongoing pornography use only deepens these feelings of shame. Pornography affects our mental health, relationships, marriages, and spiritual lives. If you want to read more about pornography, addiction, mental health, and recovery, I highly recommend the book "The Porn Myth" by Matt Fradd. If you find yourself struggling with pornography, consider counseling! Counseling can put you in touch with valuable resources or support groups to help individuals overcome pornography use. Next week, we will be exploring the harmful effects that pornography has on marriages and relationships.

BIRTHRIGHT (pink tags): There is a need for diapers in sizes 3, 4 and 5. All sizes of clothing are needed from newborn through 18 months especially snowsuits and winter jackets, along with blankets, baby wash, lotion, shampoo and BPA-free bottles. DO NOT WRAP.

CATHOLIC MINISTRY TO THE INCARCERATED (gold tags): First-class postage stamps are needed.

LEGION OF MARY (yellow tags): Word-search puzzle books, hand soaps, slipper socks, shaving lotion, pocket tissues and small cuddly stuffed animals for home-bound seniors are needed. Place all in one bag indicating male or female.

How gently and lovingly you wake in my heart, where in secret you dwell alone; and in your sweet breathing, filled with good and glory, how tenderly you swell my heart with love.

But we have something more. Starting with the first Sunday of Advent, we will introduce a new mass setting, called *Mass of Wisdom*. If you have a chance to come to mass a little earlier over the next few weekends, we will practice that with you right before mass.
