Winter 2022 Campaign Update

Across the diocese, parishes like ours have worked since 2019 to bring the *Heart of a Shepherd* campaign to the faithful members of parishes across our diocese. This \$30 Million campaign is an extraordinary effort to better meet and serve the needs of St. Mary and Borromeo seminaries, current seminarians, and our newly-ordained and retired clergy. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, this campaign also raised funds to support parish local needs and projects.

We are so pleased to announce that as of January 2022, the campaign has secured \$31.5 Million in commitments for the diocesan campaign and an additional \$19.63 Million for local parish projects. Overall, the campaign raised \$51.2 Million to date from 12,806 households across the diocese. This is outstanding progress and a testament to the generosity of our people.

A typically lapsed American Catholic, Justin embarked on a quest to connect with his extended family in southern Italy and, ultimately, to awaken his slumbering faith.

I so wish we could take away the pain and struggle. I don't know about you, but I am fixer and I like to solve problems. I think this is where I (and many of us) are called to surrender to God. We have to cooperate and work to solve our issues and help our sisters and brothers who are struggling; but the starting point has to be surrender to the higher power – our Heavenly Father who loves and cares for us so much! I offer you this prayer that I learned when I was at St. Ignatius High School. I often say it. (I once read that St. Pope John XXIII included it in his nightly prayers, "Lord, I am tired and going to bed, you take care of the church for now!" This prayer sort of reminds me of that:

My memory, my understanding
And my entire will,

Luke Brown's Reflection

February 6, 2022



When I heard this week's Gospel as a younger man, the disciples leaving their boats on the shore and following Jesus was not noteworthy to

me. Half the people I knew had boats and if someone gave one away, it would not have been a big deal. Then I learned in a Scripture class that boats in Jesus' time were hard to come by, difficult to make, and relied upon for livelihood. For the disciples to leave the boats is the equivalent of someone today permanently surrendering a college degree, medical license, or other livelihood. Leaving the boats suddenly became a very powerful thing when I reread today's passage. I can only imagine how intimidating and scary it was for the disciples to be led into the unknown and simply asked to trust. When I reflect on this in regard to mental health, I think about how quickly our lives can change when we least expect it. Illness, an accident, death of a loved one, or losing a job can change our life in very dramatic ways. We are left feeling numb and, like the disciples, exploring unknown territory. I imagine that trust was difficult at times for the disciples. I'm sure that they second-guessed many things about Jesus and about their decision to follow Him. After all, they were still very much human. However, the continued trust that the disciples had in Jesus taught them new ways of thinking, loving, and praying that resulted in peace and their sainthood. When our lives take an unexpected turn, good or bad, it is important that we remain mindful of God's presence in all of it and our need to remain faithful, trusting, and prayerful. If you find that your life is different than you thought it would be or has recently taken an unexpected turn, consider reflecting on the disciples from today's Gospel and the uncertainty that was replaced with trust in Jesus.
