Dear Parishioners,

Today has a very power Gospel that really gets to the heart of what we are called to do as Christians. I believe more than ever we have to proclaim Jesus Christ to all of our friends, family, neighbors, strangers, etc. The Scriptures teach us that Jesus Christ is the **WAY**, the **TRUTH**, and the **LIFE**. It is my firm belief that the reason so many people stray and so many people make choices so contrary to what we believe is that they do not know Jesus. I believe it all starts with Jesus!



Today we hear some incredible lines:

Christ Jesus is the image of the invisible God. So many people want to know what does God look like? I tell them He looks like Jesus Christ. The Gospels bring Jesus to life for us and I believe everyone can envision Jesus through them. We can see Jesus in the Eucharist, we can see Jesus in one another. It allows us to see a very personal and intimate Jesus who loves each of us very much and treasures us. He desires us to each recognize Him as our Lord and Savior and turn our lives over to Him 110%. We need not go it alone. He is there for us.

He is the head of the body, the church. I often say to the children in our day school, "who is the boss of our school?" The correct answer that I am looking for is Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ needs to be our lead in all that we do. Too many times I sense (even in my own life) that we put economics, political affiliation, comfort, prejudices, etc. ahead of Jesus. An example of this is we are hoping that the recent overturning of Roe v. Wade ushers in a *Culture of Life* from the first moment of conception. We must work to ensure a consistent ethic of life that nurtures/fosters a culture of life. For example, we need to get to the heart of why there is so much violence/killings/mass shootings in our country. How can Jesus Christ shed His Light on this to guide us to good solutions that protect each other and support each other? Bottom line: LOOK TO JESUS IN ALL THAT WE SAY and DO!

Through him to reconcile all things for him, making peace by the blood of his cross. As much as I would like to think that each of us will be perfect, we all struggle with sin in our lives. We all say things and make choices that we should not. The Good News is that Jesus Christ offers us reconciliation. He died for our sins and offers us the grace and new life that his blood on the cross offers all of us. He gave his Apostles the ability to absolve from sin and the Apostles gave it down the line to bishops and priests to continue this forgiveness/absolution in the Sacrament of Confession. Confession can and does Transform lives!

So I encourage you to take some time this week to really allow this Gospel reading to sink in and help set a mission for your life to bring Jesus Christ to your own life and the lives of those around you!

#### Luke Brown's Reflection

Many people bring their worries to counseling to process them and to see what they can do to change what they find stressful and anxiety-provoking. In our world, we can find many things to be worried about. If we let them, these worries can take control of our lives and become the sole focus of our attention. In both my personal life and in the lives of my clients, there is an exercise that can be very helpful for reducing worry. It is called the "Locus of Control." Get a piece of paper and write down all of the things that worry or bother you. Now, go through this list and separate it into two groups. One group is things you can control and the other is things you cannot control. We can stress about the weather and we can stress about how long the grass is getting in our yard, but we really only have control over the grass. If you learn how to control the weather, please let me know how! The goal of this exercise is to learn to dedicate our time and energy to the things that we can change and control. I have met people that are worried about so many things that they cannot bring themselves to take care of the grass. If we are able to focus on what we can control, we can reduce that list of worries and make a big difference in improving our anxiety. This week, consider doing this exercise and bring your focus and attention to the things within your control instead of the things that you cannot control or change.
